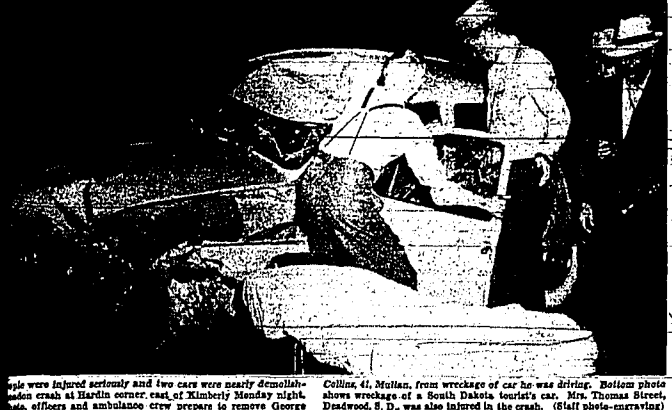

### State Senator Hits Economy Of Governor

RUPERT, July 3—Minkola county Pomona, Ore., at a meeting Friday night at Tapes school house, said the state economy was "a mess." Charles Collins summarized legislative activities of the session for the school district.

Senator Collins said he considers much of the school legislation particularly the moves to eliminate SIOE and NICE and failure to enact the 70 per cent transportation fund formula, ill advised.

The senator said that information from the school district would be used to operate the two normal schools separately from Idaho State University, which would then be used to consolidate operations at Pocatello and Moscow.

Efforts to economize in the state budget and failure to adopt the 78 per cent transportation fund formula would create hardships on small and poor counties in the state, the senator said. He pointed out that funds previously furnished at the state level will have to be raised within the county for education.

Minkola county will be a burden on the state, he said. It is impossible to maintain the established minimum standards for education in this county. Other legislative matters were reviewed briefly and an open discussion was held.

A Orange committee will be appointed in the near future to begin examining a plan of a canning kitchen cooperative.

T. E. Mabery summarized the activities of a special committee previously appointed to report on the kitchen. The kitchen nearly is ready to begin operations. It will be under the management of Mrs. E. U. Anderson.

At the peace conference following World War I, "self determination"—the right of a people to govern themselves—was strongly championed by President Woodrow Wilson. The peace treaties marked the birth of a number of new nations.

Some will say we pushed this movement for independence too far, that we assisted in creation of countries not yet equipped politically to govern themselves. We are not too zealous in guarding the freedom we too soon have to win nearly 200 years ago. With our long-heralded tradition of freedom and independence we have served the world as a model. More than this, we have lent our aid and sometimes practical support to other peoples struggling to gain their own independence.

The ultimate solution apparently lies in some kind of European federation which will give to the continent a measure of self-government and cultural distinction.

Of more pressing concern right now is the upsurge of independence in the Asiatic world. A long smoldering spirit that at last broken through the West, is creating a new national mold in the Orient, provided the final explosive force. It precipitated a social and political revolution that is engulfing Asia.

These Asiatics today are peoples who want a better life for themselves, and they want to be the ones to decide what sort of life it shall be.

This we must understand. Some of us see Asia as a land which must be "shown" the ways of democracy. But the Asiatics associate democracy with the loss of their independence—hope to eradicate quickly their bitter memories of past oppression.

In keeping with our tradition of helping others to independence, we must be wholly sympathetic to their self-governing impulses, without seeking to impose our own pattern upon them any part of our own pattern of life. They have to judge for themselves what we have that they might wish to copy.

So far we Americans have not been too aware of the depth and strength of Asia's power and influence. There is a good day to realize that once more the United States will stand with the seekers after independence—as we have always done before.

**FAMILY SQUABBLING**

The President is inclined to feel that those voicing the general opposition to Acheson are merely crying "wolf," especially as they have not found any wrong paths leading to the door in the past 1948. Hence, he has declined to act. Thus so now, many were lukewarm toward him.

But all this grumbling within his official family itself, that's another matter. He pins great hopes on men like Secretary Marshall, Mr. Symington and Herbert Gaston, head of the export-import bank.

He feels they are thinking of his administration's best interests, and that they have no personal or political axes to grind on Acheson's neck. So since he is unusually responsive to the influence of these loyal friends, he may take their grievances seriously.

This is not to imply that these men are carrying on a feud against Mr. Acheson. It is simply a matter of their own private talks or general conferences with the President, they find themselves opposed by the secretary of state.

Sometimes, as always between strict and easy men, arguments become heated. They do not always accept a pro-Acheson ruling with good grace.

So Mr. Truman no doubt wonders at times, in spite of his persistent support of Acheson, if he would not have a less untidy and more harmonious administration. If he got rid of the irritant, even though it would be a personal affront to the administration, would it streamline his many foreign aid agencies.
