### Three Men Use Cat to Hedge On Wager in Greyhound Race

WATFORD, England, July 11 (AP)—Three men were accused today of tossing a cat into a greyhound race to save their bets when the dog they backed was running last.  
 The incident occurred at the Watford track last Jan. 27. The court was told the men bet \$86 on a bond called "My Size" in the fifth race. They then took up posts near the hound into the home stretch, one of them with the cat tucked under his arm.  
 "My Size" ran wide at the first turn, hit the fence and dropped far behind the field.  
 As the dogs entered the home stretch, the cat sailed through the air and landed in front of them. The dogs quit chasing the mechanical rabbit and took off after the cat. The race was declared void and all bets were refunded.  
 The defendants, who pleaded innocent to a charge of fraud and cruelty to animals, were John Tracy, 24; William Day, 36; and Thomas Dalton, 37. They were ordered to appear for trial at the November session of the magistrate's court.

### Crop Outlook Hints Goal Is Within Reach

WASHINGTON, July 11 (AP)—The nation's crop outlook favorably in June and are within reach of the government's defense production goal of 100,000,000 bushels on record, the agriculture department reports.

Officials here described as among the most favorable—the country has ever known.

Reports for 1934 are official figures to fill bins, elevators, and warehouses with bumper crops of wheat, corn, cotton, and soybeans; farmers planned the largest acreage since 1924. Plantings totaled 17,500,000 acres of wheat, 14,000,000 more than last year.

Reports as of July 1 indicated that the total gross acre of all crops will be only 1.8 per cent short of the record set in 1924, but seven per cent higher than the 1933 record during the remainder of the growing season could well boost production above the goal mark.

The only largest crop ever grown—3,225,143,000 bushels—was forecast.

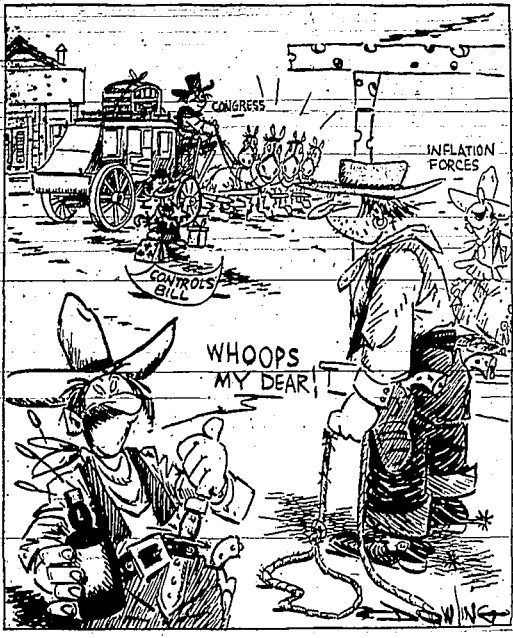
With prospects, which looked unfavorable early in the spring, improved further. The crop was estimated at 100,000,000 bushels, or 16,000,000 more than indicated a month ago.

With major crops, new production records were indicated for rice and hay. Others will be of record.

Potato production may be down about 20 per cent from last year's crop, reflecting further reduction in plantings following government withdrawal of price support. The indicated potato crop is only slightly larger than indicated needs. Last year a big surplus was produced.

With a large average crop of sugar beets is expected.

American parents who have children "leave up" to see that their little ones take music lessons.

Mary must learn to play the violin. Robert must master the cornet. Clarence needs to become a virtuoso on the clarinet.

That fact that the children have no talent for music does not enter into the picture. A musician under their tutelage.

When I was 7, my father, going on 8, Mama and Papa tapped me as a musician. There wasn't enough money in the house to buy a cornet. "Your two sisters play the piano," they told me. "And your oldest brother plays a tub fiddle; and so, Henry, you are going to learn to play a musical instrument—and you to have a cornet do it."

This was in Rochelle, Ga. Great teachers of the cornet do not graduate to Rochelle, Ga., naturally. The teacher they sent me to was Mr. Grant. Mr. Grant and I learned to play the cornet together. Mr. Grant cost my parents a dollar an hour, and after one solid year of taking lessons, Mr. Grant could play a cornet better than I could.

Parents are not going to pay for their children's music lessons unless they can show 'em off.

The day came when they showed me off. It was in a church, my father was the minister of the church, and the occasion was a Christmas party. For days mothers in the town had made costumes for their sons and daughters. I was tipped out as an angel, and it pained me to stretch my imagination to imagine me as not even faintly resembling an angel.

I was not a boy, but I was a cornet-blowing angel. It was my duty to stand before the congregation with my wings sticking straight out and play "America" in 28 flat major.

Parents will never know what they do to children. With every best intention in the world, parents hurt children. Once a man or a woman has grown up, it is impossible for them to understand children. Every grown-up person was once a youngster, but you can't tell it by watching them now.

The older you grow, the more wounds you accumulate. But there is nothing in the world that can hurt you as much as being hurt when you're a child. Nothing has ever happened to me that was as tragic to stand upon as the cornet before the Baptist congregation in Rochelle, Ga. I played it for only one reason—Papa and Mama were determined to have every one of their children a musician.

If you're just starting out to give your boy a baseball bat instead of a violin, and your daughter a doll of horns instead of a tub fiddle. But if you insist on staving your children music lessons, send them to Mr. Grant, in Rochelle, Ga. Here are the directions as to how to find his house: Get off the Dixie Flyer at Rochelle—hand what's left of your—lunch in the W. L. Douglas shoe box to the mayor, who meets all the trains at Rochelle; walk up Third street till you come to the corner of Elm, turn left, and the third house down on your left will be Mr. Grant's. Don't be afraid of the bird dog which will be sitting in Mr. Grant's yard. Walk straight to the piazza and say, "Mr. Grant, I have been sent by my parents to take a cornet lesson."

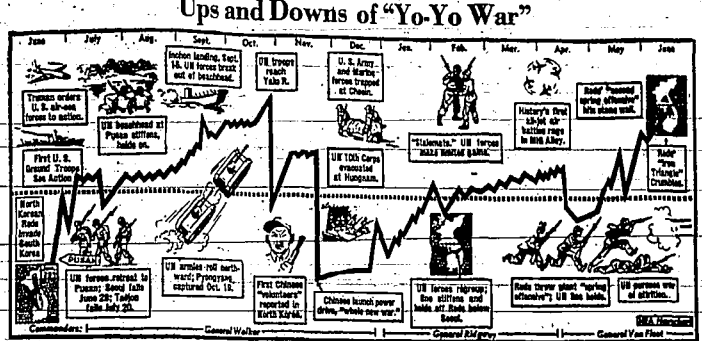

### Extra Session Suggested for Law on Relief

BOISE, July 11 (AP)—A special session of the Idaho legislature is suggested to sign property agreements under the state new lien law, it was reported today by Rep. Jesse Vetter, D-Kootenai, unless a remedy can be found under the law.

Vetter said he understood some old age assistance recipients have refused to sign the lien agreement. 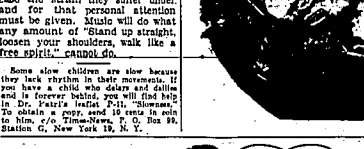

### Added Crises Are Expected By Diplomats

MOSCOW, July 11 (AP)—Diplomatic observers stationed here are predicting new crises in western-Soviet relations—possibly a new Berlin crisis—over the west's move on the German and Japanese questions.

Some observers here add that if the western powers follow up the action ending their state of war with Germany by moving toward a separate German treaty, they may make their position in Berlin most difficult, if not untenable.

They add there is almost sure to be some way in which the Soviets could retaliate for actions they are certain to consider as a violation of international understandings.

As for the western plans for a peace treaty with Japan, Moscow newspapers are saying that the Chinese people—meaning the Chinese communist government—will "never permit the resurrection of Japanese militarism."

Japan and Germany are the two "great evils" in international relations so far as Moscow is concerned.

### Welker Seeking Added Funds on Onion Research

WASHINGTON, July 11 (AP)—Sensitors who have been hearing about Idaho potatoes for years learned something about the Idaho onion yesterday.

The information came from Senator Welker, R. Ida, who presented the slim appropriation made for onion experiments in his state.

Welker told an appropriations subcommittee: "Some of the finest onions are produced on the Snake river plains of Idaho and in nearby Oregon."

"At Parma, Idaho, experiments have been made in the planting, raising, harvesting and storing of these onions. But the house appropriations committee has allowed a pittance \$2,500 for the onion research in Idaho. An appropriation of at least \$50,000 is necessary."

Welker said the government is pulling up \$25,000 for onion research in California.

"It's not fair to spend so much there and so little in Idaho, he said."

# Long Flight From Communism Over

# White Russians Living Here After Years of Running From Communism

The International Refugee, an interdenominational committee on overseas refugees of the United States after their flight from Communist rule in China.

Methodist church had little information about them until they arrived in Twin Falls, parts of three families, instead of one, June 10.

E. A. Kneck, who with Elmer Bennett operates Scott's cafe and employs the two men as dishwashers, takes the story from here. He was a neighbor of Tallock for many years.

When the five white Russians arrived in Twin Falls, they tried to contact the Tallock family, and eventually found Mrs. Maurice Tallock, daughter-in-law of Kent Tallock. She learned the newcomers had not eaten since the previous day. She contacted Kneck who provided meals. The Methodist church took over, and Mrs. Albert Parrett, wife of the pastor, has been the constant friend of the Kislovas ever since.

Obtaining quarters and work for the two men was not difficult, ac-

cord to short-time help, immediately put "Little Nick" to work.

A few days later another opening developed and Kneck told Voploff to bring his friend, soon to be known as "Big Nick," to work. There has been some language difficulty, but Kneck says the men have been doing good work, considering they are in a strange land, at least here. He has found dish washers who will stay awhile.

Mrs. T. G. Kislova, who speaks English, Russian, Japanese and Chinese, is a maid at the Magic Valley Memorial hospital, 215 E. 21st. Her husband was killed in the Philippines after their marriage, was a Coast newspaper correspondent in China. He has died since then.

The elder Mrs. Kislova is doing a little housework in Twin Falls at present and is accompanied to work by her granddaughter, who speaks almost perfect English. The latter is employed in a Protestant convent in Peiping, China. She speaks a little Chinese and French, and Russian, but prefers English. The Kislovas are members of the Orthodox church which cooperates with the other Protestant churches in the interdenominational clearing-house.

The flight of the Kislovas goes back when the Kislovas, an engineer in a Siberian coal mine, was murdered by the reds. Asked why her father was murdered, Mrs. T. G. Kislova, a lady at the time, said, "He had money and they wanted it."

After killing her husband, the reds put his widow in prison, but she escaped across the river into Manchuria three months later. Meanwhile, her children, the daughter and Victor, an 11-year-old son, were taken to safety in Manchuria by friends.

Mrs. Kislova later rejoined her daughter in China, but she never saw her son again. One Christmas he disappeared, no one knows where. Some people said he went toward the border to see the Russian guards, got too close and was kidnapped. He was last seen in Manchuria.

By housekeeping, making dresses

for opera, singers and cooking Mrs. Kislova supported herself and her daughter in Manchuria and China until the daughter was married and Olga was born in Peiping, she said. Mrs. Kislova cared for her granddaughter and took care of the house while her daughter worked. The younger woman speaks only Russian, but understands Chinese.

The younger Mrs. Kislova says the family got along all right during the Japanese occupation. She even taught herself the Japanese language to keep on working. There was "no little fighting" when the Japanese came into the sections of Manchuria and China where she lived. She worked for an English family and taught herself English from a dictionary and from magazines. Later, she worked in an American post exchange in Peiping.

When the Chinese reds came to Peiping, the older Mrs. Kislova and Olga had one hour to pack what few belongings they could and leave the city. After the sun was up, the reds closed the gates, turning many white Russians. They went by train to Tientsin, then took a boat to Shanghai. The younger Mrs. Kislova, working in Tientsin, was taken to Shanghai by landing ship. She joined her mother and daughter there and they were taken to the Philippines on a Chinese boat under the auspices of the International Refugee organization.

The Kislovas spent two and one-half years on the island of Samar, a former naval base. There the younger woman worked in a camp hospital. She considered the Philippines dry.

The grateful feeling of the Kislovas on arriving in Idaho may easily be summed up with a statement little Olga made when she arrived in Twin Falls. Receiving her birthday anniversary was the next day and no gifts were ready, the little girl said, "I have my birthday gift, I'm in America!"

The story of the two men is similar to that of the Kislovas. Both, white Russians, fled their native land to avoid persecution by the reds.

Makaroff speaks no English, but

information received by the Methodist church here indicates he is a graduate of the Russian military academy, was an officer in the White Russian army, railroad worker for the Chinese government, policeman in China, managed a dairy farm, taught in an orphanage and was a supervisor in a great plant.

Voploff was born in Troitek in the center of Russia in 1902. He finished up as a little English, while serving as a chauffeur for the British and American armies in Shanghai. He points out that he was a truck driver, but the occupation is considered a "profession" in China.

Voploff was a student during his life in Russia, but fought against the reds as a civilian in the White Russian army. He fled from Vladivostok in 1923, going to Korea and making his home in Shanghai from 1923 until 1948 when he fled to the Philippines. He never married. He says his mother died in Russia in 1923.
