### Communications in New Hospital Are Designed to Conserve Time, Walking

A 50 per cent reduction in walking for nurses is the goal behind the audio-visual call system at your new Magic Valley Memorial hospital. The system has about 155 outlets, all but 20 equipped with two-way telephones. All patients' bedrooms are equipped with a bedside box-microphone arrangement to permit the patient to give or receive a message, lights and a buzzer connection. Labor, delivery and surgery rooms do not have speakers, but most other rooms are fully equipped.

The day is gone when a nurse must walk to the end of a lengthy corridor, find out what a patient wants, walk to another part of the hospital for the necessary item, return to the patient and then return to her station. At Magic Valley Memorial hospital, the patient pushes a button in his room. The light goes on outside his door and a buzzer sounds at the nurse's station. Nothing unusual about that. The new part comes when the nurse picks up a phone

at her desk and talks with the patient, determines what the patient needs. And the nurse doesn't have to listen to the buzzer while she attempts to finish adding a column of figures. She can turn it off without leaving her station. A light returns on at her desk to show in which room she is wanted. And if the nurse is filling out a routine questionnaire, she doesn't have to run to the patient's room to ask where he was born or how

many children he has. She can ask all the questions she desires over the two-way telephone connection. Of the 155 outlets, 10 are on the first floor, 85 on the second, 40 on the third and 25 on each of the fourth and fifth floors. There are eight nurses' stations or central stations. The system is equipped with duty stations. They are located in bath room, utility rooms and cleanup rooms. They are equipped with buzzers only. Duty stations eliminate the necessity of a patient waiting for a long time for attention. If a nurse leaves her station to go to a utility room or bathroom, she pushes a button at her station. When the patient rings, the signal is relayed to the nurse. She hears the buzzer and needs only to return to the central station to learn which patient desires service. Patients can call a nurse to the bathroom or to the bed.

The arrangement is not a new one, but is one of the more modern conveniences for hospitals. It is International Business Machines equipment purchased through the Magic Valley Memorial Hospital. It was installed under the supervision of Troy Brinson, chief electrician at the new hospital. The audio-visual call setup required an estimated 25,000 feet of wire and cost an estimated \$10,000. Four separate intercommunications systems supplement the hospital's call system. On one line, six stations are scattered between administration and engineering offices and the shipping department.

The second line is the doctor's page arrangement. The reception desk can page a doctor throughout the hospital or on one floor. Each doctor is required to register when he enters the hospital so hospital personnel won't have to waste time looking for him. A speaker is located at each nurse's station. If the nurse on duty knows which room a doctor is in, she can relay the call through the audio-visual call system. The kitchen has a line to the serving rooms on each floor. The nurse on the floor can order meals or special diets without taking the long walk to the kitchen. Dump trailers bring the orders to the serving rooms.

A final intercommunications setup connects the supply room on each floor with the central supply room. Again, the nurse doesn't have to climb several flights of stairs to get something. She can order a dressing, a bedpan, or whatever she may need, and it will be brought to her floor on a dumb waiter.

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**READ IT AND WEAP!**  
 This is one editorial we wish all readers of the Times-News would give some serious thought.

This is prompted by a story out of Washington for a federal sales tax. The one significant thing about this story was that those in favor of such a tax were arguing that it is needed to help balance the defense budget.

During the last 10 years, the United States has known, this country has been spending money like a drunken sailor to support an artificial, so-called planned economy.

But the grand strategist in Washington always has had a plan, and it is justly called the "defense budget."

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The figures already are so fantastic that the press services are attaching such transmission headings as (m) and (c) as a double check to differentiate between millions and billions.

All this money, the government is spending belongs to the taxpayers or is borrowed from banks, individuals and corporations. But the average citizen has no way to understand nuclear physics as to get the facts relating to the argument whether government is spending too much.

What everybody can understand is comparative figures, even large ones. For example, during the first business year of the new fiscal year which began July 1, the treasury spent approximately \$1,044,000,000. It took in \$720,000,000. It accumulated a red ink deficit of about \$328,000,000—all in all—red ink.

That billion dollars spent in a week would have run the government nearly four months 20 years ago. But a lot of things have been added to government since then. Millions of persons are getting relief and other checks, while the military budget has been cut. The government is in the subsidy business in ways which were unheard of 20 years ago. The spending on river basin developments and foreign aid, for instance, are without parallel in the history of this country.

Here are some comparative figures for our readers to ponder. They are budget estimates for several regular departments of government total and 20 years ago. They show where a lot of the taxpayers' money is going:

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**INTERIOR** 35,711,000  
**STATE** 37,384,000  
**LABOR** 13,448,000  
**TRAVEL** 21,069,000

And here is one final thought every American might well keep in mind: In the same 20-year period of steadily increasing spending, the government lived mostly beyond its means, and the national debt has swollen until interest payments for this fiscal year are expected to be \$5,800,000,000.

The reds say they are ready to relax, although there is no doubt that the long delay between the answer and the date they set for the talks is more than mere oriental face-saving. The communists would like us to relax, not us to relax, everywhere.

# WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Congress will soon write a final reply to President Truman's unfortunate letter in which he described the United States as "merely the navy's police force and compared their publicity ventures to the 'Joe J. Pater' of the Marine Corps organization."

Despite strains White House and Congress are almost certain to approve measures making the marine corps virtually a separate branch of the military establishment and giving the commandant full membership on the Joint Chiefs of Staff. It was believed that Mr. Truman will dare to veto the bill, even if approval is by a large margin.

**STRENGTH**—The senate already has passed a similar proposal by unanimous vote, but the upper chamber's version does not satisfy Rep. Carl Vinson, chairman of the House armed services committee and "the great Mr. Vinson." The bill, which was introduced by Sen. Paul H. Douglas of Illinois, an ex-marine, does not fix a minimum limit for the strength of the force.

Moreover, at the persuasion of the members of the joint chiefs of staff—Generals Bradley, Collins and Vandeventer—there will be a provision that the measure so as to make the marine commandant only a "consultant" to that body.

**REBUKE**—In a certain sense the controversy over the Marine Corps is a chapter in the Truman-McArthur dispute. The leathernecks, whose World War II strength reached a peak of 400,000, performed some of the most brilliant fighting of the war, although many units were scattered elsewhere.

Even more pertinent to the McArthur matter is the fact that the Marine Corps is a branch of the Defense Secretary Marshall, to the members of the joint chiefs of staff and to Secretary Dean Acheson.

**STRATEGY**—Aside from legal and technical arguments, congress believes that the Truman-Acheson foreign policies necessitate strengthening the marines as the "strategic reserve" of the United States.

**PRESIDIO**—Defense Secretary Marshall's vigorous objection to the Vinson bill at committee hearings may have been "a case of prejudice against the marines." The record shows that the Vinson bill was introduced by the secretary of the marines, had been considered regularly, when military bills are considered, and had been passed by the House.

**INVALUABLE**—It was also developed in the hearing that General Acheson, an ex-marine, is a man at Washington with broad and varied experience in amphibious operations. No JCS member has a more complete knowledge of the marines.

**HE** took part in 10 major combat operations in World War I and II. He was wounded seven times. He is one of the few officers who have commanded every unit from a platoon to a division under fire.

**HE** served in China for five years, with the navy for 11 years, four at sea and seven on land, and was in every military school. His advice, it is contended, would be invaluable to the rather specialized members of the JCS staff.

**AS** evidence of the jealousies and bitterness engendered in this dispute, it was brought out somewhat incidentally that General Marshall had once commanded the large boot camp in combat.

**Firm Indicted on 9,000 Counts as Explosion Result**  
 NEWARK, N. J., July 12 (AP)—A massive indictment containing 9,000 counts—possibly the most in U. S. legal history—accused an Ohio mill of illegal disposal of waste material, death-dealing explosion at South Amboy, N. J., in 1945.

The 2,000-page indictment names Kellogg Manufacturing Company of Newark, N. J., in connection with the explosion which took 100 lives and caused \$100,000 in damage.

It convicted of all counts, the Kellogg firm could draw fines of from \$50,000 to \$500,000, depending on the scope of the alleged violation.

Returned by a federal grand jury, the indictment charges the company of violating interstate commerce commission regulations by packing decontaminators in the same cases as munitions.

It said 9,000 such cases packed into 10 freight cars blew up South Amboy while being transferred to barges for eventual shipment overseas.

Daby, former senator who supported Gen. Thomas E. Dewey of York for whom the latter won the 1948 nomination, is looked upon by some as the unofficial manager of the "moral" campaign to get Eisenhower's nomination for Eisenhower.

Eisenhower declined to seek either the Republican or Democratic nomination three years ago and has said he was "not going to let any sort of talk by others make me a candidate."

"I believe the American people want him for President and when the time comes, I believe Eisenhower will answer the call, just as he has always answered all calls to duty," Daby said.

He thinks he also could help smokers and drinkers to break their habits.



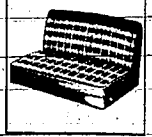
