### Idaho Crops Cut in 1951 Is Predicted

BOISE, July 14 (AP)—The U. S. department of agriculture has predicted a drop in Idaho's 1951 total crop production.

The department said the late dry and cold spring curtailed field crop production, but fruit yields were anticipated to be higher than last year's frost-damaged crop.

Increased acreage of wheat, beans, peas and clover hay offset decreases in barley, oats, sugar beets, potatoes and alfalfa hay to bring total Idaho acreage about even with last year.

Department forecasts for Idaho crops include: 28,265,000 bushels of wheat, an increase over the 27,250,000 bushels of last year; 2,331,000 tons of hay, a drop from the 2,434,000 tons last year; 23,850,000 bushels of potatoes, compared with 46,610,000 bushels last year; 2,028,000 bags of dry beans, compared with 2,460,000 last year; 926,000 bags of dry peas, compared with 870,000 last year; 1,088,000 tons of sugar beets, a drop from the 1,211,000 tons last year; 1,617,000 bushels of apples, an increase over the 1,260,000 bushels last year; 285,000 bushels of peaches, compared with 41,000 last year; 3,600 tons of cherries compared with 1,700 tons last year; and 23,000 tons of prunes compared with 10,000 last year.
