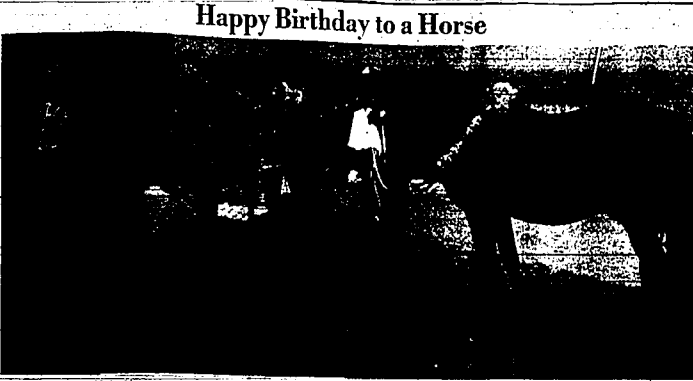

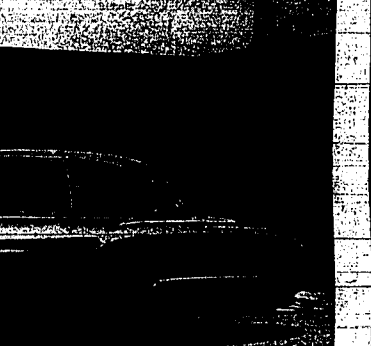

"I don't believe the new commissioner will be selected until the major league meeting this winter," declared Brooklyn President Walter O'Malley today. "We're still involved in listing all the qualifications for the job. I don't think we'll get around to actual-personality-for-one-time yet."

Meanwhile, several members of the St. Louis Cardinals revealed that they had been "rounded out" regarding their interest in the three-man council to permanently replace the office of commissioner.
