Average yields quoted in his area are twice as heavy as those in Ireland, Gahan said, though sugar content of Irish beets is higher. Weather in Ireland is not warm enough to compete with Magic Valley for high beet yields, Gahan said.

North Korean soldiers were openly hostile or mistrustful. Civilians including even children seemed afraid. It was indicated that not soldiers but civilians not to be friendly.

Radically Changed

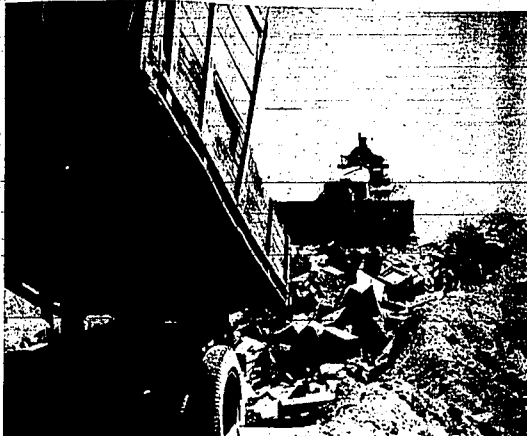

25,000 USAF Troops Used In Radar Net

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—Almost 25,000 air force radar men now are on steady watch at stations and control centers in the United States and Canada to detect the approach of any strange and possibly hostile planes.

The aircraft warning system has reached the point where it is 97 per cent manned, the Associated Press was told by officials today.

Three years ago, in the days of economy and before the swift build-up of military strength which started with the Korean war, only about 5,000 men were in the still primitive warning system.

However, the fact that warning stations now are almost fully manned does not mean the U. S. has all the warning system it plans or wants or that the equipment used at those stations all is necessarily modern.

The air force's air raid warning organization is composed of 12 groups of regular troops and three of federalized air national guard outfits.

Number, Location Secret The exact number of warning stations and control centers and their locations are secrets.

The stations in the U. S. and Alaska work with those of Canada under the mutual Canadian-U. S. defense plan.

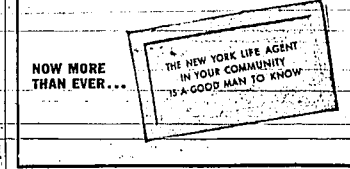

Odors, Unsightly Mess Eliminated by New Garbage System, Rules Required

Proper management of Twin Falls' new city sanitary landfill system makes necessary a new code of regulations for all persons hauling trash or garbage to that area, says James Inanly, city sanitarian.

All persons hauling trash or garbage for hire, if only an occasional load, are required to get a city license. Persons or companies operating their own equipment hauling their own waste material are exempt from this order, Inanly explained.

Operational rules are: 1. All trash trucks hauling to the land-fill must meet the following specifications: 1. Be made watertight to a height of approximately three inches on the sides and at the head of the truck bed; 2. Provide for the possibility of a watertight tailgate.

land-fill operator; 3. City trash haulers' license is to be carried in the truck.

These regulations are to be completed by July 31. Licenses will not be issued until an inspection of the completed truck has been made by the city sanitary inspector upon notification by the hauler.

A coat-of-operation fee will be dumped according to directions of charged persons hauling from outside the city limits. The schedule of fees is still pending action by the city council.

These rules, Inanly explained, are in keeping with the operation of a disposal system that is flyless, odorless, and eliminates all exposed trash.
