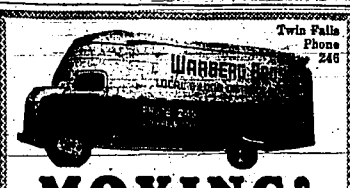

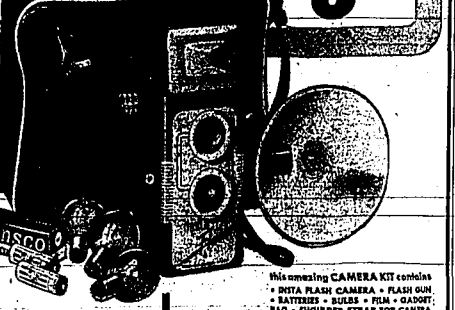

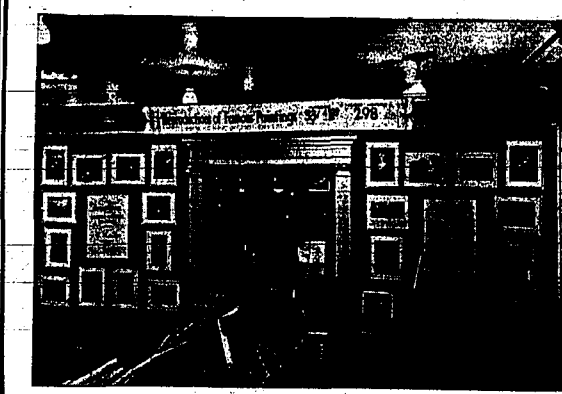

"WASHINGTON CALLING" BY MARQUIS CHILDS

WASHINGTON—The silence surrounding Gen. Douglas MacArthur's return in the lower States of New York's MacArthur's return. Obviously that man is Gen. Robert H. Taft, Ohio's MacArthur warmly and openly, but several months before the general's return he declared to his own return in the generally shaping America's military policy—the joint chiefs of staff.

It could be expected to replace these men with others of the MacArthur school. Among Taft's closest advisers are Gen. Douglas MacArthur, who served on the staff in the Pacific and shared the fate of hero worship in general history.

Does this mean MacArthur, himself, would come back to active duty? The impression gained by visitors is that he would not. Nevertheless, in all probability he would be one of the most influential persons in the administration with Taft as President. And he would consider he had made his contribution to the security of the country with the removal of general and admiral in opposition to his policy. On this last the names of Gen. George G. Marshall, now secretary of defense, and Gen. Omar N. Bradley, chairman of the JCS, would have a high priority as would that of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

As high-level military-diplomatic adviser, MacArthur would be in the background. His friends have suggested to him or three total state men that they look for a country place in nearby Virginia or Maryland suitable for the general and his family to spend at least part of the year. This would give him the privacy he desires, but also ready access to the seat of power in the capital.

This week MacArthur will make his first public appearance after his visit to Texas. He will go to

NEW DEAL "PROSPERITY"

Call it individual initiative, personal enterprise, or what you will, the underlying principle of our American economy is the one thing that has made this country more progressive and prosperous than any other nation on earth.

It has been the very foundation upon which the United States was built. In affording everyone an opportunity to make the most of his capabilities, this great democracy of ours fired a natural ambition in the average American.

So long as there was the feeling that just rewards would come from honest efforts conscientiously applied, there could be no stopping this country, because American enterprise and ingenuity had no bounds.

All that was the American way of life until distant clouds started gathering in our skies—clouds which later were to cast shadows of doubt, dissatisfaction and a growing feeling of unrest.

As the clouds were brought over the horizon by the so-called new dealers whose "master planners" figured they could improve upon the American system of free enterprise and personal initiative.

They started subsidizing the people themselves, making them feel that government owed them a living, and that all should share alike, irrespective of what they might contribute personally.

With it came a growing trend toward individual responsibility, and an increasing tendency to depend upon government for all things.

Although the people actually knew better, it was much easier to believe in all the "prosperity talk" coming out of Washington for their own good.

After all, there seemed to be a lot more money in circulation. Even though they knew much of this money was coming from the government, it was fun to pretend that it all was plucked from trees, instead of coming out of the taxpayers' pockets.

That was the beginning of a great spending spree, inspired by a shiftless government. The more the people could get from the government, the more they wanted, and the more the government was eager to give it to them, so the new dealing, bureaucratic master planners, could keep themselves in power.

Taxes, naturally, had to be increased to keep up this dizzy pace of federal spending, and the government naturally had to go deep into debt. But that was all beside the point, so long as we were on enjoying the "prosperity" the government kept calling to our attention.

Meanwhile, of course, inflation set in with prices and living expenses going sky high along with taxes. But as usual, there was always an emergency to keep this false economy soaring. This time it was Korea. Artificial demands could be counted on to maintain employment, and where there is employment there is always a payroll to keep business booming.

Of course the people wanted to believe it would last forever, and with repeated new deal assurances, they lulled themselves into a false sense of security, spending their money for rambling homes they didn't need and luxurious cars they couldn't afford.

What better evidence could we have of an unprecedented "prosperity"!
