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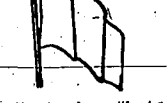

Plaque Painting Draws Crowd Of Children in T-F Program

Painting of plaster of paris plaques, feature of Twin Falls city recreation program is packing them in at the rate of 400 to 500 children each week, reports Ernie Craner, city recreation director.

South park alone listed 318 children in the plaque painting activity during three days of the past week, Craner said. Harmon park is expected to surpass that figure this week.

Plaques are cast by city recreation workers in 41 moulds of animals, fish and nature scenes. They are sold to children at cost, prices ranging from 3 to 20 cents. The youngsters apply paint to suit themselves.

Adults who might be interested in more advanced plaque work are asked to join the program.

Craner also urged adult participation in roller skating and tennis programs. Roller skating, with free skates on skates and instruction, is offered adults at 7:30 p. m. every Monday at the rink across from the new city hall. Divisions of skaters according to skill are to be made to encourage adult beginners, Craner explained. Roller Rhythm Skating club is furnishing instructors.

The adult tennis program, offered at 6:30 p. m. every Wednesday, still has openings for a good many players, Craner said. It is hoped enough additional tennis enthusiasts can be contacted to form a self-managing team. Persons want-

Butte Suburb Skips Ballots, Saves Money

WALKERVILLE, Mont., July 25 (AP)—This early-day copper mining town, a suburb of Butte, skipped its election again this year.

The money it saved, about \$1,100, was earmarked for a new fire alarm system.

Usual? Yes. But not for Walkerville, which has had just three elections in 30 years.

Walkerville's system of governing its 1,628 inhabitants has made the village a community unique among U. S. municipalities.

Dates Back to 1921

The system dates back to 1921 when Walkerville became the nation's first city to pass an election "vacuum" law.

It was the law that "was a wave of the taxpayers' money."

Only one primary candidate filed for mayor last year; since no election would settle nothing, the town council decided to skip it. Petitions were circulated and the residents

No opposition had developed at general election time. Petitions asking for a referendum to discontinue approval of disputes with a formal vote.

happened in 1938.

To round out the novel experiment, retiring aldermen declared their seats vacant and elected themselves at a reorganization meeting.

At the years went by the plan developed.

When a mayor resigned or died, the council simply elevated its president to the job and chose a new alderman.

W. H. Sweet, mayor when the turbo-house economy plan began, was followed by J. H. Hill, Henry Sullivan and William James Lytle, all advanced from the council presidency.

Eighteen years passed before Walkerville had another election and William Cook became mayor. He died in office and Council President Harold O'Neill succeeded him. James R. Shea, the present mayor, was elected in 1941 and again in 1947. He has served since without election.

At first, candidates filed petitions for reelection, notices were posted and other required steps taken. Then, if no opposition showed, the election was skipped.

Now, after years of polling to cut out all expense, candidates don't file unless there is opposition. Incumbents automatically retain their offices.

Report Notes Fraud in Vet Training Pay

WASHINGTON, July 25 (AP)—The general accounting office has reported overpayments resulting from "irregular and apparently fraudulent practices" in the \$175,000,000 of many of these overpayments were the result of carelessness in keeping records or in complying with veteran administration regulations but few unnecessary number resulted from irregular and apparently fraudulent practices, a report said.

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War Refugee Aid Program Is Near End

FRANKFURT, Germany, July 25 (AP)—The biggest planned migration of war refugees in history is nearing an end.

More than 1,000,000 men, women and children made homeless by World War II have been lifted out of the agony of Europe and resettled in new homes in America and elsewhere.

Thousands of others are still to be resettled by Dec. 31 when the United Nations-sponsored International Refugee Organization will terminate its humanitarian program in 1947.

IRO officials say that by the end of the year every qualified refugee who sought a new start in life will have had the opportunity.

Even so, an estimated 250,000 refugees failed to meet the IRO requirements or the difficult transit to Europe.

Most of them will have to shift for themselves, but IRO officials point out that after 7-8 day six years ago Europe had 8,000,000 destitute war victims.

The majority of these were able to take care of themselves, becoming absorbed in European recovery.

Millions of more emigrated through the IRO. Now, only a relative few—250,000—are still for the most part dependent.

Overcrowded Germany

Half of those are in overcrowded West Germany, an area smaller than the combined Texas and Idaho with 47,000,000 people.

Their future here isn't too cheerful. Underemployment is rampant. Food is costly and housing critical.

But not all the DIP or homeless aliens as the Germans call them, are in desperate circumstances. Some are relatively well off.

They have found jobs, married and are living comfortably. Reformed German industries employ thousands. Many refugees have moved to other areas. Some have built up their own businesses.
