U. N. ADVANCE BASE BELOW KAESONG, Korea, July 26 (AP)—United Nations and communist representatives formally adopted a program for cease-fire negotiations today and immediately began discussing the fixing of a neutral zone along the 135-mile Korean battle-front.

Meeting in Kaesong, the U. N. and communist teams agreed upon and then adopted a five-point agenda of program for the formal armistice negotiations, and proceeded at once with the bargaining. But U. N. officials emphasized the shooting will not stop until an armistice has been signed. How long that will take, nobody knows.

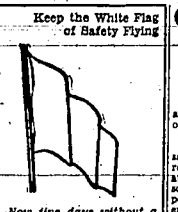

### Parking Law Change to Be Asked of City

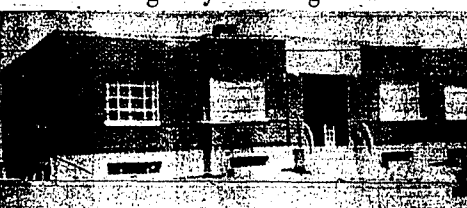
SHOSHONE, July 26—Parking area and parking time limits were discussed at the Shoshone Chamber of Commerce meeting held Monday noon.

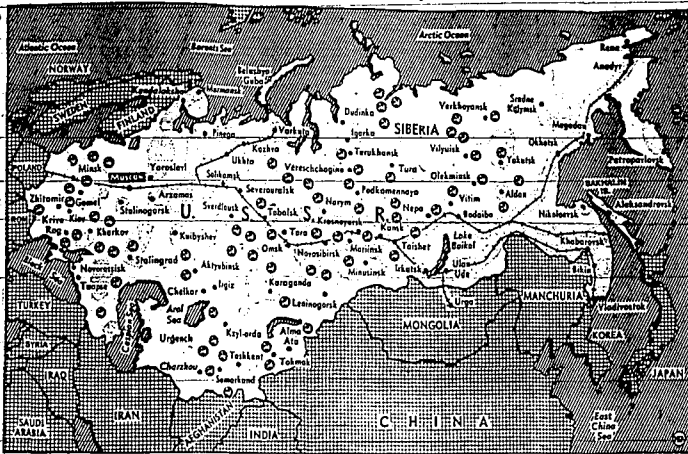

Tightening of GI Education Help Studied

WASHINGTON, July 26 (AP)—A bill aimed at correcting abuses in the future operation of the GI education program is being drafted by a house committee.

The special committee, headed by Representative Thomas D. Donnell, issued a report by the general accounts office on the GI education program. The study lists \$20,000,000 in over-payments to schools and numerous abuses.

The deadline for enrollment by World War II veterans has passed. Reports that the administration is preparing to ask for a "Korean GI bill of rights" is speeding up committee plans.

A spokesman for the committee said its members are opposed to a simple extension of the present law to make Korean veterans eligible.

Idaho's Highway Department Asks Bids on 4 Jobs

BOISE, July 26 (AP)—The state highway department has called for bids on four road projects. The bids will be opened Aug. 10.

Other bids called include: Constructing a plant mix bituminous surface on 7.57 miles of U. S. 20 north of Boise; and Lava Hot Springs in Bannock county.

Placing crushed gravel surfacing and a bituminous surface treatment on 6.8 miles of U. S. 85 alternate between Half Round bay and Turner bay in Kootenai county.

Under the present program, the government underwrites tuition, buys textbooks and supplies and pays subsistence allowances for veteran students and their dependents. It is aimed to cover all the costs of going to school.

Owner of Cougar Gives up His Pet

PORTLAND, Ore., July 26 (AP)—J. Kendall Hockensmith has decided he couldn't keep both a telephone and a cougar. So he gave his cougar away.

The 100-pound cat had been around since it was brought by the neighbors, until it jumped on a small dog last week and Mrs. Louis Miller, 101 1/2 years old, said the only thing that kept the cougar from jumping on her, too, was a handy bucket of fire.

### Toll Great for Flood Deluge; Check Shows

CHICAGO, July 28 (AP)—The floods that deluged the Midwest this season killed 65 persons, caused more than \$1,000,000,000 damage, and drove 42,000 persons from their homes, a survey showed today.

Kansas and Missouri had their worst flood disaster of all time with 41 persons dead in the two states as a result of high water that surged down rivers beginning early in the summer and climaxed by the big crest that hit this month.

Outbeared From Officials—The statistics gathered in today's recapitulation of the big flood of 1951 were gathered by United Press from estimates by army engineers, soil conservationists, Red Cross officials, and agricultural experts throughout the flood zone.

The state of Kansas alone bore \$738,000,000 damage to industries, homes and farm lands from the Kansas and Missouri rivers and their tributaries, army engineers estimated.

The Missouri and Mississippi rivers caused at least \$182,000,000 worth of destruction along their courses in Missouri.

Great Mowing—The big crest which poured through the Kansas City area this month still was moving down the Mississippi after clearing the Missouri and some further damage was expected.

Streams were still gorged with water, keeping at least 20,000 persons from returning to their mud-filled, water-damaged houses.

Most of the damage from this year's spring and summer floods was in the upper Mississippi basin states of Kansas, Missouri, Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa and Minnesota.

Some flooding was reported as far east as Pennsylvania and as far west as the Dakotas and Nebraska.

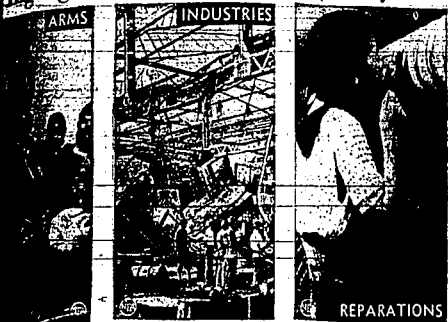

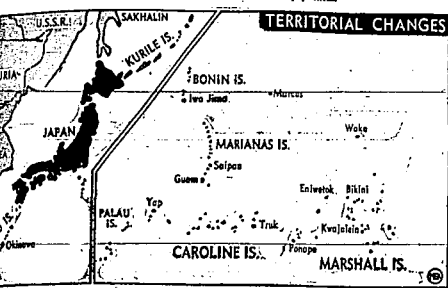
# Highlights of Japanese Peace Treaty



**ARMS**—Japan may build up arms to serve in Japanese defense alliance pact, will be separate pact, will be station military forces.

**INDUSTRIES**—No restriction on rebuilding of Japan's war-wrecked industrial plants. Britain was argued out of restricting Japanese textile and shipbuilding industries, which compete with British commercial interests.

**REPARATIONS**—Japan's reparations payments will be in the form of labor. Former foe will send raw materials to be processed and returned. No huge cash reparations imposed because Japan could not pay them.



Below are principle provisions of the proposed peace treaty between Japan and the allied nations. Formed a "treaty of reconciliation," it is unique in history because no punitive terms are on the defeated nation. It renounces all claims to Formosa, the Kurile Islands and South Sakhalin. The Caroline, Mariana and Palau groups (held by U. S. under U. N. trusteeship) and the Bonin and Ryukyu Islands, including which U. S. plans to keep under U. N. trusteeship.

### Movies Trim Out Needless Drink Scenes

HOLLYWOOD, July 26 (AP)—Screen writers in far from dry Hollywood are asking themselves: "Is this drink necessary?"

**Don't Drink**

Freeman says he got a lot of calls after that party, telling him how refreshingly different it was.

"I couldn't actually produce a picture if my life depended on it," he confessed.

However, he knows show business, and he's well aware that entertainment is the first requisite of a successful movie. He has no patience with pictures that preach, but sees a good deal of merit in films which offer a few worthy human impulses along with the fun.

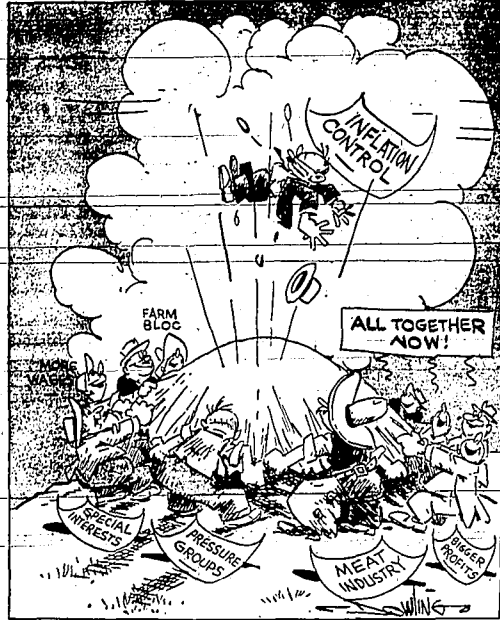

### Huge Gain Noted For Deposits and Loans by Banks

BOISE, July 26 (AP)—Deposits in national and state banks in Idaho increased nearly \$8,000,000 during the past year and loans gained \$2,000,000, approximately \$7,132,000 in the same period.

On the basis of a statement at close of business June 30 this year, assets and liabilities of national banks in Idaho totaled \$228,405,888 as compared with \$221,128,938 June 30, 1934. The total for state banks were \$109,114,888 for 1935 and \$106,472,715 for 1934.

Important changes listed for state banks included an increase of \$2,086,468 in cash and due from banks; an increase of approximately \$3,000,000 in all deposits; a gain of approximately \$1,000,000 in loans and discounts and a decrease of \$1,288,490 in government bonds.

For national banks cash and due from banks gained \$7,373,887; deposits gained approximately \$8,000,000; loans increased approximately \$2,000,000; U. S. bonds held dropped \$2,888,000.

### Method Used For Medical Teaching Hit

GENEVA, July 25.—A virtual revolution in the training of doctors is suggested by the world health organization of the United Nations, a report published by WHO sharply criticized present medical and nursing education methods throughout the world. It urged that doctors should learn to pay as much heed to the welfare of the community as to that of the individual patient.

The report was prepared by a committee of experts meeting here under WHO auspices to examine present medical training methods in the light of modern needs.

Modification Needed

"The committee found 'considerable modification of the education of the potential doctor is needed... to train a man capable of supervising the physical, social and mental well-being of the community within which he works.'

"The report declared: 'There is at present much emphasis on physics and chemistry... too little attention is given to such subjects as psychology, anthropology and sociology.'

Joint Study Urged

"Nurses and doctors, since the aim is that they should work as a team, should have planned opportunities to study together the total care of the patient. Students should get to know the surroundings in which the patient lives and works. From the very first the mind of the student—must be turned towards disease as a community problem."

The report urged that doctors, nurses, social workers, public health experts and sanitary engineers should be trained in different sections of the same school, and be taught to work as a team.

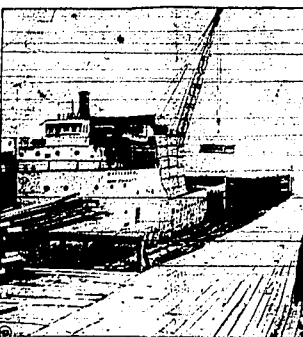

### Out of Lumber, Mill Has Put

### 80-Year-Old Town up for Sale

NAHMA, Mich. (NEA)—The folks who live here fear that their peaceful little village is doomed to become a ghost town.

Nahma, called Nay-mah by its 750 residents and Nah-mah by the Indians who live nearby, belongs to Jack Stock and tax bills to the Boy De Noquet (pronounced Day De Noo) Lumber company. Almost everybody in Nahma works for the company either directly or indirectly.

The company, which has worked the nearby forests since 1871, has now cut all the usable timber. It has sold this mill's big saw, and now wants to sell the town.

The oldtimers in Nahma, like Tommy Tobin, still have hopes that Charley Good will find a buyer. Charley is president of the lumber company and a far cry from the

### ell Nahma. Yet Warner has little hope.

"Lumber town is a lumber town. If you can't get a buyer for it, it could be changed into anything else," he said.

Most people feel that the town would cost at least \$250,000. Yet it's not the price as much as the buyer interests Charley Good. Most of all he wants to get the town so some manufacturer will put up a plant in Nahma and employ the townspeople.

"Charley Good isn't out to make money by selling the town," says Father Charles Reinhart, the Catholic pastor who counts 80 per cent of the village in his church. "He's trying to help these people. Most of them want to stay. They've moved away but they're learning the higher wages paid elsewhere don't compensate for the advantages of living here."

"As a piece of merchandise, as well as a place to live, Nahma has a lot to offer. It sits on a big bluff along the lake, a river nearby teeming with fish, and a landscape of thick woods abounding with deer, beaver, rabbits and wild flowers."

"The people have a good life. They pay the company from \$7 to \$10 a month rent for the 100 frame homes along the lake. Most of the houses have indoor plumbing. Nearly everybody has a radio and an electric washing machine. The town averages a car and a half per family.

"Food prices are about the same in the big general store here as they are in the biggest store by town, Escanaba, 35 miles east.

Nahma has a doctor and an eight-monthly hospital—a grade—and high school, a Catholic and a Protestant church. It has a community building with a large auditorium and gym as well as a tavern that sells only beer. There's a nine-hole golf course and a one-star barber shop.

The company's railroad—two low-slung locomotives, 100 log cars and 21 miles of track—links Nahma with Nahma Junction on the Soo line about five miles away.

"The company owns all the property, except the school and churches, and pays all the taxes. The company is including in the sale package all of its own buildings—such as a warehouse, machine shop, power house—as well as the railroad, an air strip and a dock.

Whether Charley Good can peddle Nahma to another company in an age when company-owned towns are as out of date as fringe-topped surveys remains the big question.
