NPA Orders Governor Jordan Urges Legion To Continue Vigilance Program

WASHINGTON, July 27 (AP)—The government today ordered another year of pent-up cash in the production of automobiles and other civilian goods during the last three months of the year.

This means a total slash of 40 per cent below pre-Korea levels for cars and 20 per cent for other consumer durable goods, including refrigerators, washing machines, televisions, furniture and similar items.

Automobiles Announced

The cuts were disclosed by Defense Production Administration spokesman F. J. Schindler in an announcement of a new "control" program for the production of civilian goods in the fourth quarter of 1951.

Schindler said the new cut for automobiles is 40 per cent below 1950 levels. He said the program will be permitted to make "some" cuts in the production of other goods in the October-December period.

5,400,000 Total

The cuts would make 1,200,000 in the July-September period. NPA officials said that with 1,000,000 cars produced during the first half of the year, the permitted level of output for the second half would be 1,200,000.

They said the industry has second biggest production year, exceeded only by 1950, when 5,600,000 cars were produced. In 1949 the figure was 5,100,000.

Grumblers Marshall Hits U. S. Letdown For Defenses

WASHINGTON, July 27 (AP)—Secretary of Defense Marshall said today he is "shocked" at the dejected mood of the American people since the Korean truce negotiations.

In a plea to senators, Marshall asked that congress approve the \$1,500,000,000 administration bill for fiscal 1952.

He said if it comes to a choice it would be better to cut funds for the United States arm armed services rather than trim the military budget to strengthen western European forces.

Other Developments

Other developments in congress include: A Republican effort to cut Secretary of State Acheson's salary for fiscal 1952. A bill to the senate a \$1,049,940,113 appropriation bill to finance the state, justice and commerce departments and federal courts for the fiscal year which began July 1.

Solons Grant Tentative OK Of Price Cuts

WASHINGTON, July 27 (AP)—Senate-house conferees voted tentatively early today to permit price increases on non-ferrous metals to levels prevailing just before the Korean war, provided certain cost increases are taken into account.

The tentative decision came near the end of an all-night session. The conferees committee agreed to extend economic control legislation through next June.

The extension measure covers wages, price, rent and other emergency curbs.

Senator Maybank, D. S. C., joint committee chairman, told reporters the group will "again later in the day to decide finally on the non-ferrous metals price increase. A few other provisions also will come up for a final vote.

Those include a proposal to scrap the livestock slaughter quota by both the senate and the house.

The legislation would retain the 10 per cent beef price rollback already in effect, would have a national cutback. The OPS had planned two more reductions of 4 1/2 per cent each.

The conferees agreed prices for other farm commodities could be rolled back, but only if the price level of last May 15 or to the parity level, whichever was higher. Committee officials said, however, that in practice the farm roll-back section could affect only a few commodities such as cotton, wool, real and lamb.

In its tentative form, the committee bill would have the approval of President Truman's request. The separate bills passed earlier by the senate and the house.

The conferees also approved more liberal consumer credit controls than those now in effect on installment purchases of new and used automobiles and such household items as radios and television sets.

11 Reds Open Battle to Stay Out of Prison

LOS ANGELES, July 27 (AP)—Eleven of the dozen second-string communist leaders arrested in a raid last week today began a battle to obtain their freedom on bail.

Ben Margolis, attorney for four of the defendants, announced today in Los Angeles, said he would file applications for writs of habeas corpus for the four.

Defense attorneys for seven defendants arrested at San Francisco appeared before Federal District Judge Mitchell in San Francisco today for the \$75,000 bail set for each of four men in the group.

The remaining three men are the "women" arrested there and \$25,000 for Bernadette Doherty, 45-year-old mother of two children, and \$25,000 for Leonard Starnus, 31-year-old man of two children.

Assistant U. S. Attorney Joseph Kaitch, opened the government's fight to keep the party leaders in jail. He said the government would ask Judge Rios to increase bail for the three women.

Reds Given U.N. Treaty Line Terms

U.N. ADVANCE HEADQUARTERS, Korea, July 27 (AP)—The allies told the communists today they want to draw the cease-fire line in Korea—and why.

Vice Adm. C. Turner Joy, chief United Nations delegate, explained the allied position in detail as negotiators got down to the meat of armistice talks in their 11th meeting at Kaesong.

It lasted 52 minutes and gave the reds two marked military maps to picture his position. The five communist generals made no comment. Instead they asked for, and got, an adjournment until 10 a.m. Saturday (6 p.m. MST, Friday).

North Korea Gen. Nam Il, spokesman for the red delegation, presumably will answer the communist reply at that time.

Present Line

The general understanding is the United Nations is pressing for a demilitarized zone roughly along the present battle line. The communist view is that the line should be north of the 38th parallel on the east coast, the battle lines run roughly north-south for 200 miles. The United Nations is pressing for a line at the Kaesong armistice site. Joy's statement, opening actual negotiations for an armistice, took most of Friday's session.

Truce Named

The first 18 minutes were devoted to procedural matters. The two sides reached agreement in principle in just how to tackle the four major points of their truce talks. An announcement said named terms of officers to work out the details.

The joy leaned his elbow on the green-painted conference table and scribbled a prepared statement on a piece of paper. It was scribbled off quickly as an "apparently phrased and logical presentation."

Korean War Blow Halted Army Claims

WASHINGTON, July 27 (AP)—The army claimed today the allies had the communists in Korea "hanging on the ropes" last month but held off trying to deal a knockout punch in order to show "good faith" in the armistice talks.

At the same time, the army, which is leading the enemy-of-courtesy campaign, announced a withdrawal of troops, supplies and weapons at the front since the original peace proposal was made.

Unit Fought Out

In contrast, the army said: one unit of the 24th Infantry Division was pulled out of the battle area and sent to Japan. The unit was not destroyed.

The army's report was given in an annual briefing for newsmen at the Pentagon. Ordinarily, briefings of this nature are held to give reporters background information only. But this time the army spokesman read a statement for publication.

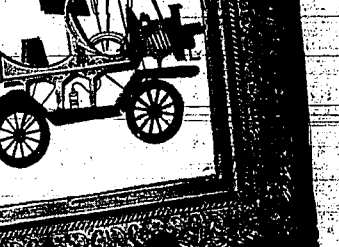

ACHESON IS IN THEIR CHAIR

Now that the heat seems to be over Secretary of State Acheson more than ever before, there are growing reports in Washington that President Truman is thinking seriously about dropping him from the cabinet.

According to hints from several sources, the President would replace Acheson with John J. McCloy, able U. S. commissioner for Western Germany.

If there is any truth at all to these rumors, they reflect a distinct change in Mr. Truman's attitude. Up to now he has been reluctant to accept any appeals for Acheson's removal.

A month or two ago, many worried Democrats high in party councils began knocking in the White House to beg for Acheson's removal.

Whatever the explanation, Mr. Truman is sure to time any acceptance of Acheson's resignation carefully.

There can be no question that Acheson has become a political liability to the President, and many believe that in his position as secretary of state, Acheson is a liability to the country.

There is little doubt that he played the leading role in getting us mixed up in the Korean mess, and as time goes on, more and more will be known of the part he played in such a move in the first place.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Bureaucratic raffles among three agencies and political log-rolling on Capitol Hill are responsible for the failure to build a federal control program that would have prevented the tremendous floods which have paralyzed and horrified so many cities.

PLAN—The army engineers, headed by Maj.-Gen. Lewis A. Pick, had formulated a definite and comprehensive plan for building dams and reservoirs on the entire length of the river.

POWER—The neglect of the power aspect, however, was a serious oversight. Secretary Oscar Chapman, his predecessor, Harold L. Tokes, and Reclamation Commissioner Michael J. Clegg, who were in the cabinet, were not interested in preventing periodical overflows of the kind from which the middle west has suffered recently.

CONTROL—With all these lobes operating on their friends in house and senate, funds for flood have been ordered or disapproved among the cabinet groups.
