Roads Group Okays Idaho Site for Tests

BOISE, July 31 (AP)—A site in southern Idaho has been approved for the construction of a \$300,000 road test section for experimental work in highway surface.

The announcement was made following a meeting of the standards committee of the Western Association of Highway Officials.

Site Near Malad
E. V. Miller, Idaho state highway engineer and chairman of the committee, said the test section will be built 10 miles north of Malad on the state U. S. highway 91. Construction will begin this fall with tests expected to be completed by fall of 1952.

Miller said the cost of the project will be shared by 12 western states, U. S. bureau of public roads, National Academy of Science and the oil and trucking industries. Idaho's share, he said, would be approximately \$200,000.

Road Tests Stated
The road will be between one and one-half and two miles in length. The tests will be conducted by the National Academy of Science through its highway research board. The tests are designed, Miller said, to determine "ability of bituminous materials to stand up under certain kind of loading of trucks."

Miller said a similar test had just been completed by the Eastern States Highway association in Maryland.

Other Members
Other members of the WAHO standards committee include W. C. Williams, assistant highway engineer of Oregon; R. H. Kenyon, Washington state engineer of highways plans and contracts; W. A. Anderson, assistant highway engineer of Utah; and G. B. Egan, highway design engineer of Nevada.

The committee met at the request of W. A. Egan, director of Washington State highways and legal advertisements.

WASHINGTON, July 31 (AP)—"Too much confusion and red tape" are holding back production of metals needed for national defense, Senator Dworshak, R. Id., declared yesterday.

One government agency should be given responsibility for procurement of minerals—a job now shared by about 40—Dworshak said in the Senate.

Production Retarded
"One government agency, unnecessary red-tape agencies, unnecessary overlapping agencies have retarded domestic mineral production," Dworshak said.

"The metal mining industry... Just know what metals are needed, what price will be paid, how long the market will continue and what, if anything, will be left to them after taxes," he said.
