CRITICAL PROBLEM

When the first shouts went up for a 100-group air force, the idea sounded pretty fanciful to many sober analysts of military power.

The proposal has been debated hotly within the Pentagon walls, and has gained strength steadily in congress. Now it has been given its biggest boost to date...

At the outset we have to remember that neither Vinson nor anybody else is talking about the current military budget. The program, now under congressional consideration, calls for 95 groups. They would cost \$19,850,000,000 of a total \$55,000,000,000 defense appropriation.

How much would the bigger program cost? If started within the current fiscal year, only \$12,000,000,000 would be needed before next June 30. But while this would obviously signal our intent to rely heavily on superior air power, the heavy reliance on the other two arms' strength would not really be abandoned. Perhaps the key argument made by advocates of enlarged air power is that it is necessary for the third support of the land forces deemed essential for effective defense against military aggression.

In other words, they are saying that because equality in dollars will not produce the basic balance of strength which we seek. To get that, it is argued, we must spend considerable more on air power than on the other two arms.

CRITICAL PROBLEM

When the first shouts went up for a 100-group air force, the idea sounded pretty fanciful to many sober analysts of military power.

At the outset we have to remember that neither Vinson nor anybody else is talking about the current military budget. The program, now under congressional consideration, calls for 95 groups. They would cost \$19,850,000,000 of a total \$55,000,000,000 defense appropriation.

VIEWS OF OTHERS

WHILE INFLATION WAITS It is not easy to understand the economic policies of these days. If our senators and representatives were thinking in terms of economic law they would realize that when a nation divides one-fourth or even one-third of its strength to defense it needs some device to make the process an orderly one. Otherwise the government and the civilian consumer will be against each other for the same good.

Morevoer, both chambers have been under pressure from lobbyists whose representatives want their particular interests protected, regardless of what happens to other people's particular interests or even what happens to the national interests. The real lobby is a complex of interests and it is hard to understand, because most of us can visualize a trying pan without any steaks or chops in it. But other lobbyists are to be found in agriculture and industry. This year labor has been threatening to walk out of the defense agencies if prices are not adequately controlled. The unions are not so much interested in higher wages. But price increases, followed by wage increases, solve nobody's problem. For those with money now or in the future, incomes they may mean ruin.

It is hard to believe that the congressional majorities do not know or do not believe that the country is so perverted that what is right is also politically wise, and that the lobbyists do not speak for the whole of the people, but only for the few who will learn the lesson too late. There is not much time—New York Times.

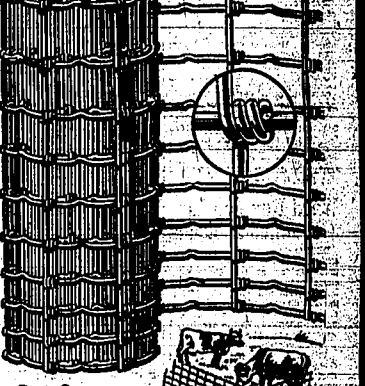
