Russians Talk Peace, Speed War Buildup

Russia may be talking peace, but she is preparing for war. Evidence is piling up that the Soviet Union and her satellites are building their armed strength steadily and setting their internal affairs in order for a showdown with the west on the battlefield.

As some recent straws in the wind:

1. War prisoners just released after six years of captivity in Russia report that Soviet war factories are operating full blast. They said the Soviet union "is as ready as Germany."
2. Poland and Romania have joined other Soviet satellites in forming ranks of suspected western spies.
3. Soviet Deputy Premier V. M. Molotov said in a speech in Warsaw that Marshal Tito's communist but anti-French government cannot survive much longer.
4. Incidents along Yugoslavia's border with Germany, Hungary, Bulgaria and Hungary have increased to the point where they are almost continuous.
5. Zhukov's retirement was supposed to be his greatest honor. Here, Marshal Gregory K. Zhukov, hero of Blagovest of Moscow and conqueror of Berlin.
6. When and if war really will explode, the Soviet Union will be the Kremlin probably know.
7. Marshal Tito believes the period from now through 1937 represents the "great hour of danger" for a new world war. By 1942, he thinks, the west will be strong enough to meet the Soviet threat.



Primary Vote In Minnesota Lists Truman

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—President Truman has received word his name will be entered in the March 18 Minnesota primary, second of 18 contests before national elections to be held next year.

If he runs again for the Democratic nomination—and he was quoted as saying that he was a bridge over troubled waters—and he is elected, the Republicans would like him with Ohio's Governor Frank La Follette.

In between these developments, Senator Douglas, D. Ill., whose re-election week ends by 10 and not 11 o'clock, will be a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination.

This presidential politics warmed up the national campaign trail for the second day in succession, less than seven months away from 1952's first presidential primary in New Hampshire March 11. Minnesota follows a week later.

Entered in Oregon

Monday Monroe Sweetland, Oregon Democratic national committee member and the President's opponent, will be entered in the Oregon primary May 15. This new campaign will be held in four days after the Democratic committee of the Democratic state central committee of California elected the President for re-election.

It was Senator Humphrey, D. Minn., who led the fight for a civil rights plank, which carried word to the White House that Mr. Truman's name would be entered to compete for Minnesota's convention delegates.

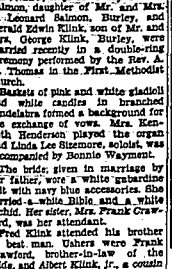

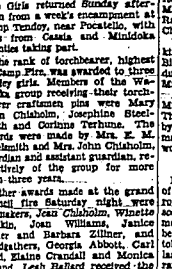

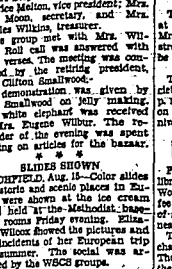

That was the day President Truman announced a new independent agency whose sole job will be to procure and to increase the supply of critical and strategic materials at home and abroad.

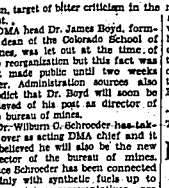

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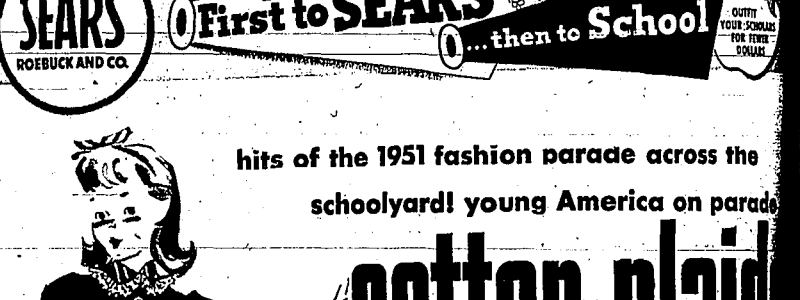
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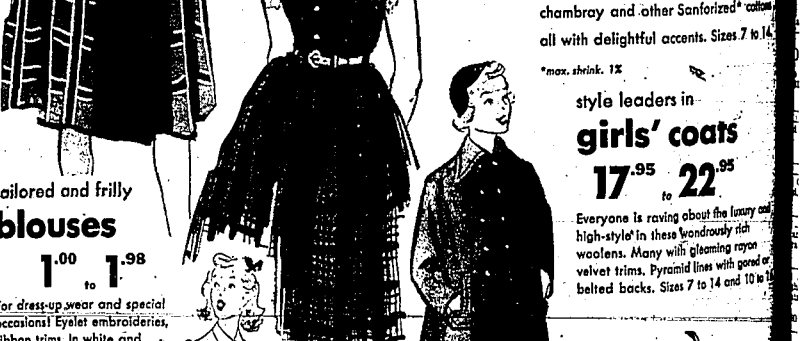
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
