Water Washes Huge Gap in Bank of Highline Canal

Extensive property damage and considerable crop damage resulted Saturday from a flood, something the boosters say never happens in what once was a desert—Burrigro Valley.

About 2 a.m. Saturday, the Twin Falls Canal company's highline canal broke loose from its northern bank. Company officials were at a loss to know why, but marring rodents were high on the list of possible causes.

The water swept north along a coulee and washed out the banks of the lowline canal. Water from the two canals swept further north and were checked for a while by the grade of the Union Pacific branch railroad line to Wells, Nev.

Most of the damage occurred after 1:10 p.m. Saturday when the railroad grade gave way and the incoming water poured over and further to the north. Farmers in the flooded area said little damage would have occurred if the railroad grade had been blasted and the flood waters could have flowed steadily instead of all at once.

Repairs Needed
Canal company, railroad and highway crews went into their second night of repair operations early Saturday morning and their officials indicated things would be approaching normal shortly.

Alfred Peters, canal company manager, said normal flow would be restored in the highline canal by Sunday night and in the lowline canal by Monday morning.

V. Clarence Escobedo, Union Pacific railroad company division engineer, said the branch line will be "back in business" by 2 p.m. Sunday, providing the flow of water from the broken canals stops when canal company officials said it will.

The water supply of Twin Falls was not threatened because of two factors: the lowline canal was located out below where the city gets its water and enough water was being sent down the canal to take care of the city's needs.

U.S. Jets Clash With Red Planes

U. S. EIGHTH AIR FORCE HEADQUARTERS, Korea, Sunday, Aug. 18 (AP)—Scores of U. S. and communist jet fighters tangled in two swirling air battles over northwest Korea Saturday while the allies laid down the heaviest out-of-air-jet artillery barrage in the war on the ground front.

The flashing dogfights involved 11 planes six miles above the Sinuiju area, near the Yalu river boundary of Manchuria. One jet was reported probably destroyed, another damaged.

The far east air forces in Tokyo said there was no damage inflicted on the Sabrejets.

On the eastern front, allied artillery hurled a barrage of 18,000 shells at one target—a communist-held hill. U. N. infantrymen waited for the crest without opposition, after wards.

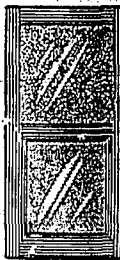

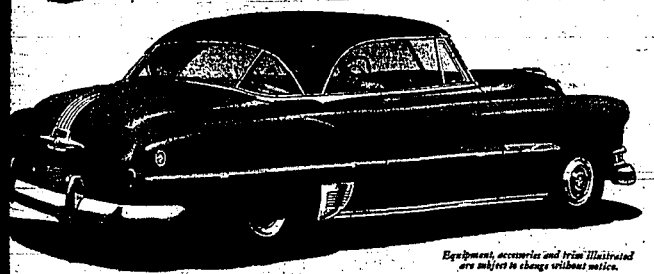

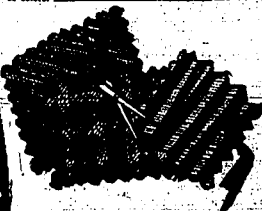

POT SHOTS

HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

NEW YORK—William Randolph Hearst has a new pet idea to keep the United States out of both wars—World War I and World War II. Hearst admitted to redeem the Democratic party's campaign slogan of "Keep us out of it."

Mr. Hearst was a fighter of tremendous boldness. His newspapers were burned and barred from newsstands. His supplies of raw paper were threatened.

He took boyboys and fought back. His reporters were thrown out of England. But he fought to warn the people of the United States of the horrible folly of Wilson's course.

Many young Americans who would prefer to be founding in mud, sleepless in his soldier suits, in drafty French bunks in winter, during the battle of the post-World War I era, where "he wiped out thousands of them," declared Hearst as a pro-German traitor.

He hated with furious intensity a man who was trying to save Europe and this country.

A week later, Mr. Hearst wrote: "It is at the gate but the lun comes, not ever has come, from Germany, nor from any part of Europe, will come, as it has, in the past, in almost irretrievable fits of invasion from the interior of Asia."

During Roosevelt's war the American and British military planners have kept the Atlantic-Russian line at bay on the eastern border of Poland and to keep going on the western border of Europe.

Roosevelt, Truman, and General Eisenhower made the western front hold back while Stalin first decimated the Polish patriots and then, equipped with sixty-one divisions, the gift of Anglo-American eastern European occidental troops had won for him.

At any time down to the very hour when congress yielded to British and French propaganda and declared by joint resolution, the people would have voted to stay out of Europe's war.

Germany was not threatening the United States, but American war profiteers, by selling food and munitions to the British while submitting to their blockade around Germany, were trying to starve it.

Naturally, the German U-boats began to sink the ships. Germany was hungry and our munitions were killing her boys, as fast as any crop of boys on earth although they suffered from their enemies in some superficial way.

"The white race are blinded by the fury of this inter-racial strife," Mr. Hearst wrote in 1918. "It is an utterly false idea that such things should be made possible by some class organization, that which they trade public."

TIP OFF SOVIET WEAKNESS

You may have noticed that Russia and the satellite countries are beginning to complain about some of the economic measures we're taking against them.

The Soviet union had some rather bitter words to say the other day about "unfair restrictions on trade" imposed by the United States.

This is interesting information. Knowing the Russians as we do, we can be sure they are very reluctant to admit to the west that the current economic pressure here would be effective in any degree. Their acknowledgment can only mean we are hurting them.

That damage must relate directly to parts of the Soviet economy involved in military production. Otherwise, the Kremlin would hardly risk the embarrassment of admitting we have inflicted pain.

The admission tells us even more. If any of us in the free world harbored the idea that the communist nations of Europe are self-sufficient, this news is absolutely devastating. The likelihood is great that they need us much more than we need them. You don't complain about losing something you don't really require.

He is a man of wit and capable of rattling off strong sea talk, yet he is a man who is not afraid to talk about his own job, the admiralty's sole response, was "I'll try, sir."

The jet age, which is also the atomic age, has pushed the high cost of high flying into the stratosphere, right along with the planes. It's a whopping bill, but we'd better make up our minds to pay it—and keep paying—until we've bought ourselves genuine security.

WILSON BACKS NPA

Old line government bureaucrats are finding Mobilization Director C. E. Wilson a tough man to deal with. The department of agriculture recently wrote him asking that allocations of aluminum for rural electrification cables and tin plate for canning be raised to help farmers.

Wilson told them to take it up with the mobilization authority, which was supposed to handle such things.

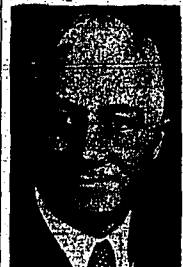

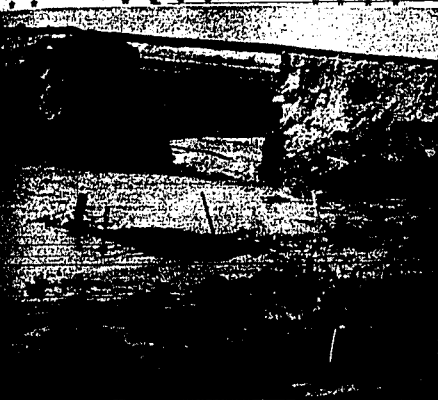

Non-Farm Work Gain Is Reported In Idaho Regions

Idaho's non-farm employment rose from 18 to 19 in July 1948, a gain of 500 jobs over the May-June period.

Largest increase, 40 workers, was shown in the food processing business. This is the usual seasonal trend, the Idaho employment security office reported Saturday.

Lumbering, transportation, service, miscellaneous, manufacturing and federal government also reported gains.

Decreases were shown in mining, construction, retail trade and state and local employment. The retail trade and government group reported the largest drops, though the drop in construction jobs also is called significant.

Seven of the 12 industry groupings checked in the state survey showed average weekly earnings increases from May to June. Construction led with an increase of \$14, from \$22.2 to \$36.7, a majority of the industries also revealed gains in weekly hours from May to June, from 36.2 to 36.7, and in average hourly earnings in June, 1948, than in June, 1947, the two years were mixed. Some increased and others decreased.
