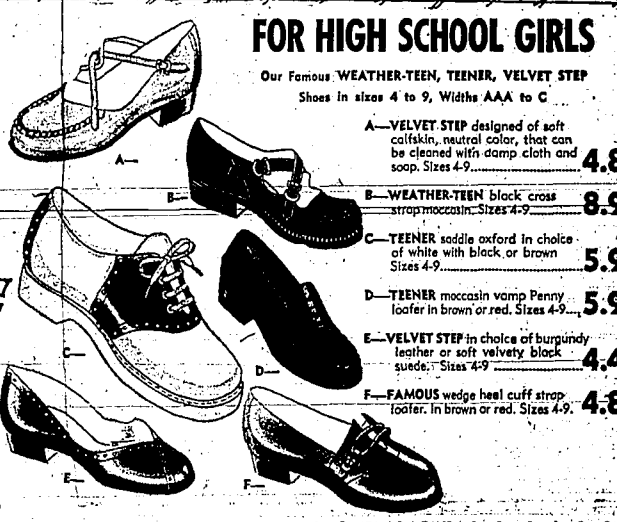

2 States Okay Agreement on Road Project

BOISE, Aug. 21 (AP)—Idaho and Nevada highway departments have agreed on a joint construction plan for the proposed extension of portions of U. S. 9 joining the two states.

The plan calls for reduced grade along the road from 1 to 27 percent and the straightening out of a sharp curve through a forested area on the Idaho side.

J. A. Redman, chief location engineer, Idaho department of highways, said the connection will involve the stretch between Rogerson and the state line into Nevada.

He said Nevada has agreed to pay construction costs for the one-half mile strip in Nevada.

Redman said a similar plan is being considered by Idaho and Wyoming highway officials involving construction in both states on U. S. 90 that would eliminate Webb hill on the Idaho side.

Hospital Switchboard Takes Maze of Wires

Telephone System of New Hospital Is Elaborate, Designed to Reduce Costs

"This is the most elaborate system I've ever seen," is the comment of Ed Clarkston about the telephone installation in Magpie Valley Memorial hospital. Clarkston is the telephone company's resident engineer here.

And Mel Dolling, Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company manager here, points out it is better than the telephone systems in a number of larger western hospitals.

But despite its complexity and size, it is designed to save the taxpayer money.

Conferees between hospital and telephone officials developed an installation fully adequate to meet the needs of the hospital and its patients but not extravagant either with wire or material or in cost of operation.

As part of its outside installation, the telephone company brought 20 lines from its downtown exchange to the new building. These include eight to the hospital's switchboard, six to administrative offices, five to the pay-telephones on each floor and a leased line from the hospital to the fire department.

To serve the needs of the new hospital and to relieve other congested lines, the telephone company has completed its expansion program in the northwest part of the city. The telephone company was ready to install equipment inside as soon as the building was ready for it.

Inside, the company installed 1,187 feet of cable. The biggest holds 202 pairs of lines, the smallest contains 28 pairs. These cables serve some 72 telephone instruments and 160 pay telephones in 81 rooms and wards for patients.

The installation includes 50 permanently installed extension telephones and 17 portable telephones which may be plugged into connections in the wards and rooms for patients.

Most of the extensions in the new hospital go through the switchboard which also handles the lines to the old hospital, the old maternity home and the nurses' home. In all, 80 lines are handled through the switchboard.

To provide a cheaper rate for the hospital, the telephone company charges on the basis of outgoing calls, on what it terms a semi-published rate, except for long distance calls made from a hotel room. No charge is made for incoming calls to administrative offices.

Again to provide quicker and cheaper service for hospital departments, the telephone company there are six administrative lines not going through the switchboard. These are handled on a flat rate.

Using five of these lines are the superintendent, assistant superintendent, dietitian, pathologist and radiologist. The sixth line goes to the doctors lounge for their use in calling their offices. Extension lines from the switchboard also go to these six places.

Other extension lines in the new building go to various key administrative centers which have occasion call either inside or outside the building. Wherever you are in the hospital you're not far from a telephone.

The company didn't stop at installing the system. Considerable time is being spent in teaching hospital personnel how to get the most of it. Mrs. Margaret Smith, chief operator of the local exchange, will spend parts of several days in teaching three operators how to use the switchboard, one for each shift.

Production in U. S. Soars to Record Highs

NEW YORK, Aug. 21 (AP)—America's production of goods and services has soared to a record high and exceeds that of any other nation in its history. But Uncle Sam is paying out for the increased production out of its own pocket.

The extent to which the present prosperity reflects the shift from civilian support of the economy to support by government spending is shown here by two reports.

The first is by the department of commerce. It says the total production of goods and services in the nation reached a record annual rate of \$12,500,000,000 in April, May and June. But output is now dropping from the rate of January, February and March.

Typed by Government and government spending accounted for the increase in production, while government outlays showed the greatest proportionate gain in the rise in personal income.

The second report is by the President's council of economic advisers. It revealed industrial production dropped sharply in July. The drop was credited to a decline in output of civilian goods to make way for increased production of goods for defense. The shift continued in August, as Uncle Sam's tax dollars played an increasing part in the nation's business.

As government spending rose, the summer purchasing dropped.

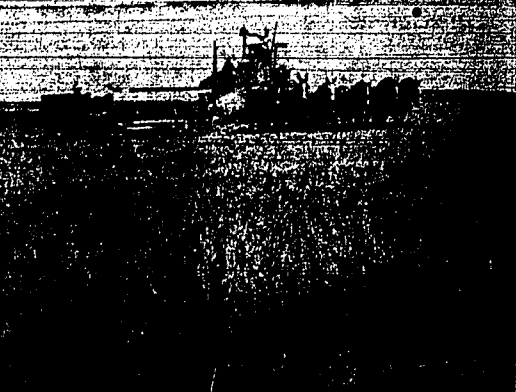

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British Racer Sets 15-World Speed Marks

BONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, Utah, Aug. 21 (AP)—A British man who has been racing for a quarter of a century, divided across these sun-baked salt flats in his tiny "Magic Midget" yesterday set 15 new American and international land speed records.

"I enjoyed the ride," said Lieutenant T. (Goldie) Gardner, after drawing his six-foot, three-inch frame out of the glass-hooded cockpit.

Gardner, erect and energetic at 60, registered 139.3 miles per hour on a one-hour run from a flying start. This was his best time, and one of 10 new American records. It more than doubled the old standard of 69.04.

Top's French Mark

He set a one-hour international record of 137.4, topping the old record, set by a French car, of 119.03 miles per hour.

His five other new international marks ranged down to 127.8 of 50 kilometers.

All the new records were in class F, a division for small cars.

The veteran of two World Wars and a medalist in the 1912 Olympics said he was "sorry I couldn't go on longer."

Oil Line Plugged

The race was a plugged-oil line. As a result, the motor heated and "Colonel Gardner couldn't push the car all the way," a spokesman said. He abandoned plans to keep lapping the circuit track for two hours.

Gardner described the hard, salt course as in "perfect shape." When he was about half way through the record run, the sun broke through the clouds, reflecting brightly on the emerald green streamlining racer.

The amiable Britisher brushed sweat created salt off his sports shirt at the end of the run and appeared in top condition for another try at some new marks on Thursday.

Jerome Girl Gets College Funds From Raising Purebred Old English Puppies

As the five six-week old black and white pups scurried with each other or flopped in corners for a snore following their first daytime per shots, college secured an unlikely thing to associate with them. Yet that is what these purebred Old English shepherds puppies mean to Betty Bovey, 15, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Bovey, 417 East Fourth avenue, Jerome.

"When we lived in Seattle," Mrs. Bovey recalls, "Betty wanted a puppy, but the streets were crowded and busy, so we got her a puppy instead." The purebred Old English shepherds, Adria of Wedgmore, called Pan by the family, is now 5 years old and weighs more than 100 pounds. When Pan reached adulthood, Betty decided that it would be fun to have puppies, and this was the beginning of her college fund. Pan has had another litter of purebreds and one a mixture of Newfoundland and Old English shepherds.

The current litter was sired by Shipton Great Bon, best of show winner at the recent Rocky Mountain area dog show in Cheyenne. The pup's father won first place over all other breeds and breeds in the show.

Pan's maternal instinct has worn a bit thin now that the puppies are weaned. Occasionally she naps at them if they come too close, or are too annoying. But if her interest is flagging, Jupiter, her son, more than makes up for it in alertness.

"Jupiter is the pup's male nurse," Betty explains. The huge 15-year-old black curly-haired dog lumbers down the basement stairs at the first whimper from the puppies. Mrs. Bovey says. He breaks up their quarrels, washes their faces, bathes them dog fashion and gives them all the maternal care Pan now refuses. Jupiter is from Pan's previous litter, a cross between Newfoundland and Old English shepherds.

A banking college fund is drastically different from interest-gathering money tucked away in a bank vault. At 6:30 a.m. Mrs. Bovey says the pups start lumpy demands for breakfast. They are fed two bowls of dog food and milk three times a day. Anyone having one puppy can multiply his problems-by-five-and-see what the Boveys are up against.

But these puppies are no ordinary creatures. They are the only purebred Old English shepherds in the Intermountain area. There are less than 50 of the breed in the country registered with the American Kennel club, with which this litter is registered.

They also are unusual within their kind. One of the puppies was born with no tail at all, three have only short ones and only one has the usual long shepherds tail.

The mother of the pupa received her nickname, Pan, from the fact that at about 5 months Old English shepherds bear a close resemblance to pandas. Until they are about 2 months old, the puppies will be black and white spotted and then
