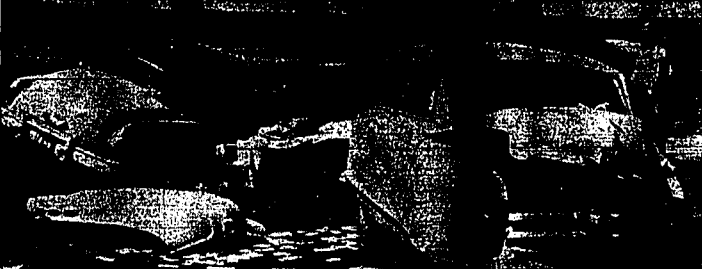

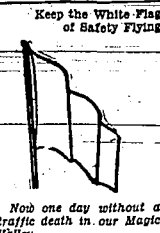

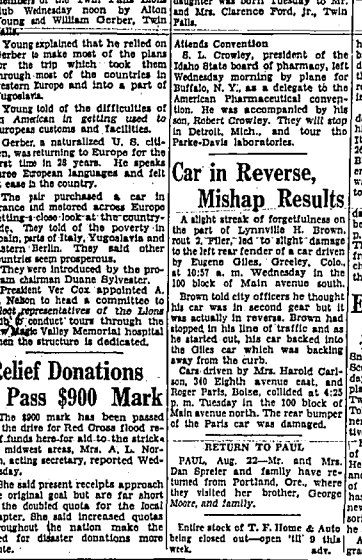

"WASHINGTON CALLING" BY MARQUIS CHILDS

WASHINGTON—This showdown with Soviet Russia over the Japanese peace treaty is expected to bring the two powers closer to each other than anything that has happened in the five years of the cold war. No possibility of compromise is considered.

At a White House conference President Truman, Secretary of State Acheson and John Foster Dulles, who has brought the treaty to its present stage, are expected to discuss the course to be followed. They were agreed that either direct or alteration of the treaty's terms.

Dulles, who has carried on preliminary negotiations with most of the powers invited to San Francisco, pointed out that the invitations to the conference stated precisely its purpose was to ratify the treaty and to discuss its general terms. This was in line with the understanding reached with most of the prospective signatories on general terms of the agreement.

The final decision was that the United States would stand and sign a treaty with Japan even though no other nation goes along. It was agreed that comminatory have been made too publicly to permit any retreat, even if there was an inclination to make concessions.

She Prefers to Grind Her Own Flour

Flour Is No Problem for T. F. Woman; She Grinds Wheat in Small Home Mill

If you would like to use flour freely ground every day, containing all its original vitamins and minerals, you can follow the example of Mrs. Velma Hooton, 311 Third avenue east, who has her own flour mill in the corner of her front porch.

"I never buy my own bread, cookies and pastry," she says, "and I think they are a lot better than products made from commercially milled flour. The flour doesn't lose any of its vitamins and it's made from untreated wheat."

When asked how she started grinding her own flour, she replied that she had had a sinus infection and had been advised to use whole wheat flour in her cooking. Not one to do things by halves, she got a small mill to grind her own flour. She believes her use of whole wheat flour did much to improve her sinus condition and also to prevent her three sons, Allan, 9; Daniel, 8; and Richard, 4, from having the usual number of winter colds.

"About a year ago she decided the small mill was not grinding the wheat too well and so purchased her present mill. Though it looks like a complicated machine, the operator has only to put in and pull out an electric plug to make it work. The wheat is poured in the top and comes out as flour. The machine will grind anything from a handful of wheat to 100 pounds and nothing is lost in the process. Mrs. Hooton uses dry-farm hard wheat from Carey because, she says, it keeps better than soft wheat."

At present Mrs. Hooton says she has seven steady customers who furnish their own wheat and pay for the electricity used in the process. She says people curious about her process frequently bring wheat to be run through it.

Products made from the home-milled wheat are more filling than bakery products and so go further, Mrs. Hooton claims.

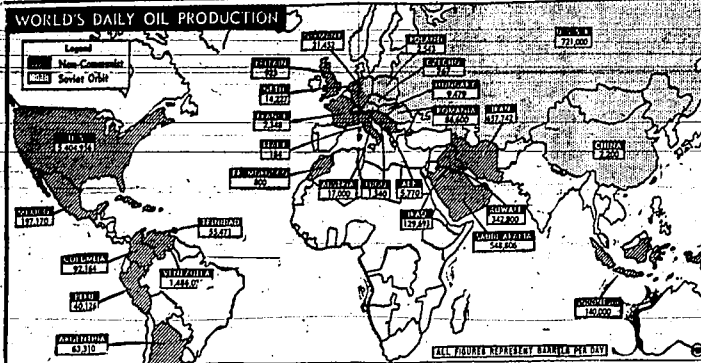

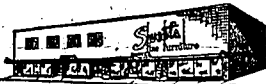

Effects of Sub Plan on Arco Job Uncertain

IDAHO FALLS, Aug. 22 (UP)—The awarding of a contract for the first atomic powered submarine left officials at the Idaho Falls Arco plant uncertain as to what effect it might have on the Arco reactor testing site.

The navy announced in Washington the awarding of the contract to the Electric Boat company of Groton, Conn. No details were given. The awarding of the contract, however, was believed in Washington to indicate the practicality of building a nuclear powered submarine.

Atomic energy commission officials here said they lacked sufficient information on the scope of the project to make definite comment.

They observed that construction is under way for buildings and facilities of one land based prototype submarine reactor, one of the three reactor stations at the Lost River site near Arco. The officials said the AEC has been making approaches to a submarine reactor. One approach is the submarine thermal reactor assigned to the Idaho project. The other is known as the submarine intermediate reactor at the Knolls atomic power laboratory at Schenectady, N. Y.

Attorneys' Fees, Alimony Pay Set In Divorce Case

Temporary attorneys' fees of \$5,000 and \$100 per month temporary alimony were awarded Mrs. Myra Johnson, Buhl, pending the outcome of her divorce suit against Peter B. Johnson.

The settlement was ordered by Judge Felix E. Lowe following a district court hearing Tuesday. Both parties to the action testified as did John J. Callahan, California resident, who claims an interest in property involved in the suit. Mrs. Johnson claims community property is worth approximately her former name, Norma J. Kelly, community property at \$25,000. The court award for Mrs. Johnson's attorney was half of what she had sought. She also had asked for \$1,000 monthly support. Her attorneys are Rayburn and Rayburn. During the hearing, Johnson identified a check for \$5,000 which she said represented a down payment to his attorneys, Harry, Keenan, Robertson and Daly and Guy Kinney.

Control Eased for Food Processors

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22 (UP)—The government has allowed processors of canned and frozen vegetables, fruits, juices and soups not yet covered by specific price controls to work out their own prices with buyers. The office of price stabilization said the permission is temporary because production of seasonal packs is at its peak and the food must be moved to markets immediately.

Native of Idaho Is Designer Of New Type Airplane in Utah

BUHL, Aug. 21—Center of interest at the Buhl air breakfast Sunday was an experimental airplane built by Thalmann Aircraft, Salt Lake City. Harry J. Thalmann is a native of Chilly. The airplane was built in his experimental shop at Salt Lake City, but he expects to have them in factory production by next spring. The four-place craft has a 100-horsepower motor and a cruising speed of 140 miles-an-hour. Thalmann says the double canopy serves a dual purpose. It increases visibility and also cuts air resistance 15 per cent. Emphasis has been on utility throughout construction of the plane, he adds. Thalmann ran tests recently at 10,000 feet and expects to do more at higher altitudes. Use of hydraulics has been eliminated for simplicity.

Pair Arrested on Man's Complaint

JEROME, Aug. 21—Robert E. Thompson and Roy Ernest Watson, Jerome, were arraigned before Probate Judge Theron Ward Tuesday morning on charges of embezzlement. The complaint was signed by Robert O. Simons, Kimberly, who claims he had entrusted them with personal property, including three tubes, fuel pumps and \$50 in cash, and that they converted the property to their own use. Thompson and Watson asked for a preliminary hearing which was set by Judge Ward for 2 p.m. Thursday. Bail was set at \$1,000 each and in lieu of funds both are confined to the county jail. Watson was taken into custody here by Sheriff James R. Burns and Chief of Police Fred Abrams and Sheriff Burns went to Wells, Nev., Monday to pick up Thompson.

The Thompsons were divorced in January, 1949, and Roy Thompson was awarded custody of their child. Thompson appeared at the hearing without counsel and informed the court he wished to represent himself.
