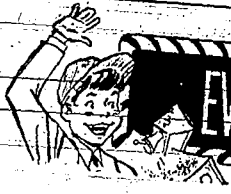

Senate Asked To Drop Rule On Reserves

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (AP)—Democratic chiefs have told the senate's little-noted rider in the military funds bill would force the premaria release of thousands of key reserves in all the armed services. They urged the senate to kill or modify the provision. It would release by Nov. 30 all inactive or volunteer reserves who served a year more in World War II and have been on active duty now for 12 months.

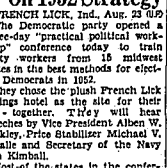

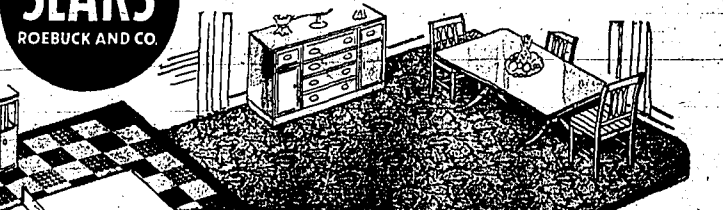

Great Range, Mileage Seen For Atom Sub

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22 (AP)— perfected as hoped, a submarine atomic engine of the type now being developed by the atomic energy commission...

At least, that is the potential "mileage" of a single "atom" reactor device to which it is perfected.

Contract Let And, the fact that the navy has just announced awarding of a contract to a Connecticut-based construction firm to build a hull for an atomic-powered sub would seem to indicate that prospects for perfecting the atomic power plant are very bright.

Building at Arco The atomic engine installation at the AEC's reactor testing station in Idaho is a so-called "ship thermal reactor."

This means that the reactor will be designed to generate neutrons, or atomic particles, in the so-called "thermal" or slow-moving type. It is called "thermal" meaning "slow thermal" reactor.

The AEC has had most experience with neutrons of the "slow" type.

New Type Planned But the commission also is planning another type of reactor, called "fast," which will be designed to operate in the "intermediate" neutron range. It will be called "intermediate" because it is between "thermal" and "fast" intermediate reactor.

There has been unofficial speculation that the intermediate type might be smaller than the "thermal" type.

General Electric company is the contractor for "BWR." The AEC desires to know this reactor will be built.

Dry-Land Models But the "BWR" and "STR" are planned as dry-land models of reactors designed to propel submarines. Westinghouse Electric corporation is the contractor for "BWR" with the help of AEC's Argonne lab.

As to what is actually being done at Arco on the "STR," the AEC in its recent semi-annual report to Congress said only that "some buildings and facilities" were being constructed.

An AEC official, in response to questions about the entire atomic-powered submarine project, said "we mainly are concerned on the problem of atomic-powered submarines."

Status of Kimama School Is Doubtful

RICHFIELD, Aug. 23—Place of school for six Kimama children still is an issue before the Richfield school board. The pupils will be permitted to attend school at Kimama if a building is available which will hold classes and a teacher can be found.

Approval of the state board of education's approval for the Kimama school was made at the Richfield school board meeting Wednesday. Alternatives are attendance of the students at school in Rupert or Richfield, or at school in Kimama.

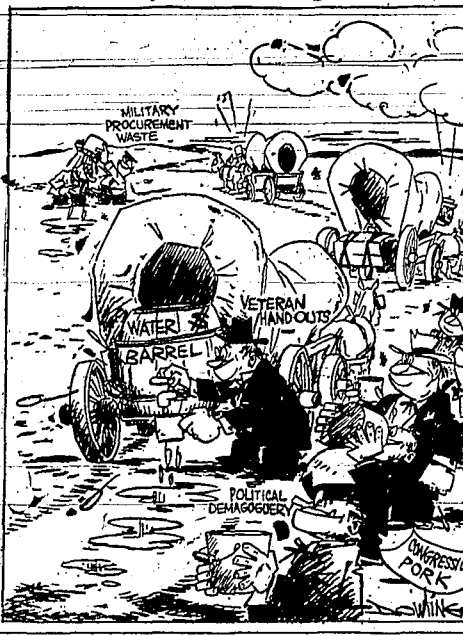

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (AP)—The navy created a sensation in announcing it has arranged to build a submarine driven by atomic power.

But this doesn't mean we've advanced so far in development of atomic energy that we'll be using it by the day after tomorrow. It may indicate instead of oil and coal and water.

Slips by side with its main job of producing atomic weapons, the atomic energy commission learns and develops other uses for the atom and it has made this much progress to date:

1. Right now it can use atomic energy to provide industrial power. The fact that the atomic submarine is to be built is proof of that. But the main point is this: AEC still hasn't found a way to provide atomic energy for industry or atomic energy in industry to use the usual coal-electric-water power used now.

2. Recently the chairman of the atomic energy commission, Gordon B. Dean, said in his opinion the use of atomic energy in industry is a good way off. And he gave some reasons for saying so:

1. Technical difficulties must be overcome first.

2. No immediate industrial need for atomic energy exists, which is so completely that industry would drop the idea.

3. Defense needs for atomic energy are still greater than the commercial needs of industry, and therefore need more work and attention now.

4. But the AEC said works were being done.

Doolittle, a military officer, was waiting for them with a group of communist newspaper correspondents.

"Evidence" Shown

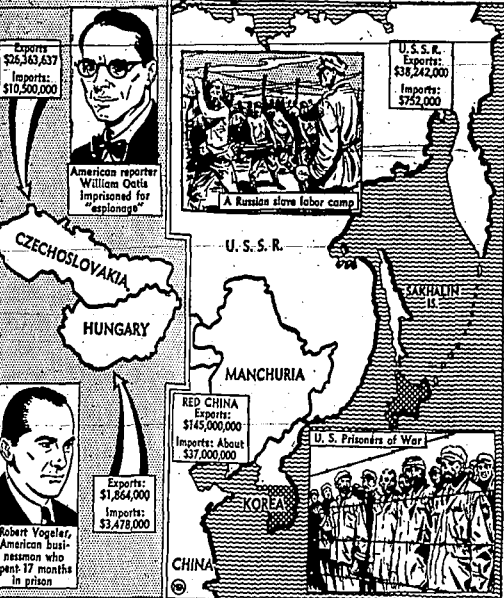

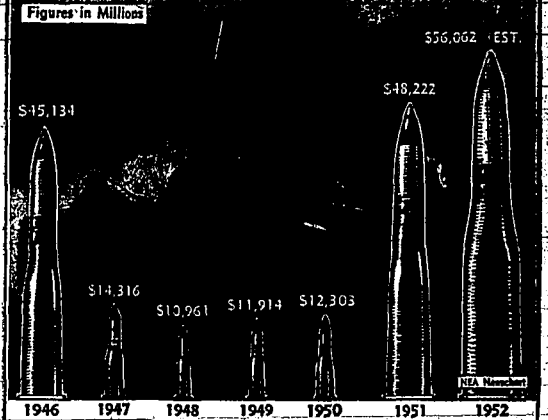
New V-2 Altitude Peak Is Attained

WHITE SANDS, N. M., Aug. 23 (AP)—A new altitude record for V-2 rockets was set when the army sent one of its latest missiles soaring 132 miles over the earth's surface yesterday.

The rocket went 16 miles higher than any other V-2, but fell three miles short of the navy Viking rocket's altitude record of 135 miles set here Aug. 1.

The army V-2, larger and heavier than the Viking, built up a speed of 2,800 miles per hour before reaching the 132-mile mark. It remained suspended at the same level for about five minutes before dropping back to earth 42 miles north of the firing platform.

Congressional experts on military affairs warn that even \$56,000,000,000 may fall short of the nation's demands, and that requests for more funds will come from the armed forces before June 30, 1952. Figures do not include amounts allotted to the office of secretary of defense, the national security resources board or the national security council. Neither do they cover military aid for our allies nor the cost of an armed force program of building bases around the world.

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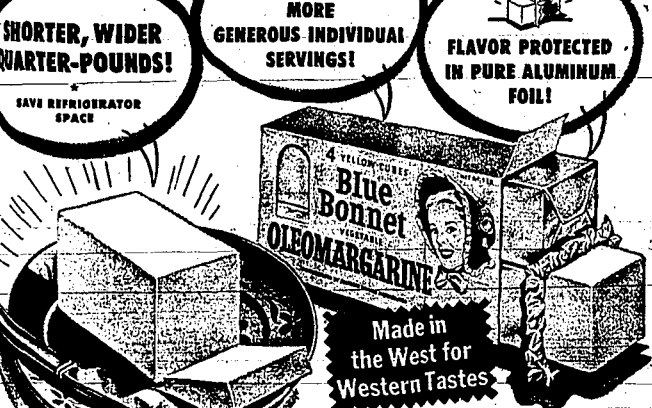

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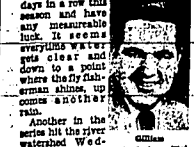

East German Youth Parley Termed Flop

Western observers seem to be pretty generally agreed that the communist youth festival started in East Berlin during the last few days was a flop.

From this distance it is hard to tell how much of this feeling is based on wishful thinking, and on youthful actions which can only be considered normal.

The supposedly regimented communist youth attended the meetings, dressed through all the "hell Stalin" motions, listened to a bitter campaign against the western countries designed by the party men, and then cut loose to see the sights in western Berlin.

Inference Cited
The inference is that the evidence of property in a free society, compared with the economic austerity of the Russian sphere, was enough to open their eyes to the fallacies of communist indoctrination.

The appeal of communism, however, is strong among youth when the background of Russian imperialism can be kept hidden. If you have seen "Hit" and "Eppur" - league members attend the serious atmosphere of their meetings to enjoy the pleasures of convention cities.

You can understand why the actions of the communist youth in Berlin during their off days may not be entirely indicative of their basic attitudes.

On the other hand, it seems fairly certain that the festival failed to impress western Germany, which was its chief objective. Communist agents to have been stopped fairly soon at the demarcation line in Germany.

Failure Claimed
John J. McCloy, U. S. high commissioner, reports failure of the communist campaign against the last spring to scare Germany away from the western European defense alliance.

This defeat of communism in West Germany, however, has not been accompanied by a similar disturbing aspect. Controls on communist propaganda go considerably beyond the usual limits of the United States.

The mayor of former East and communist interest in East Germany already has demonstrated how easily he can be misled by the propaganda.

Political victories have been won in Germany, but satisfaction over them can not be permitted to obscure the continuing strategic battle.

Solon Claims Gag Order on Loyalty Cases

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (AP)—Senator McCarty, R. Wis., accused President Truman last night of issuing orders making it an offense for any federal employe to "give congress the truth about communists who are in our government."

McCarty also charged that the President's ambassador—at large, Philip C. Jessup, had written a floral director of a communist-front publication which he said reflected "hundreds of dollars of communist money."

Order Cited
Broadcasting over the ABC network the Wisconsin senator said the "honorably fantastic order" barring employes from testifying on loyalty matters to congress was issued into effect on Aug. 21, 1948—"just 17 days after the Hiss case broke."

This was a reference to Alger Hiss, former state department official, who was convicted of perjury for saying he ever slipped government secrets to a communist spy ring.

After Hiss Case
McCarty said that when the gag order went out, "President Truman had just made his famous statement that he was not a 'red-baiter' and that those who uncovered Hiss were seeking publicity and 'endangering the life'."

"The President then says, 'but why doesn't McCarty produce the order which I, the President, have ordered withheld?'" McCarty continued.

Know of Reds
"Can any of you think of one reason on God's green earth why Mr. Truman had issued this order?" he asked his order on admission that they know about and are trying to protect the communists in government. Otherwise, why forbid the 2,000,000 government employes to tell what they know about communist spies?"

McCarty said he brought up the matter in the order to show "why it is so difficult to produce evidence against communists and fellow travelers."

Signing of Treaty To Add Japan to Free World List
NEW YORK, Aug. 23 (AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur said today that with signing of the formal peace treaty Japan will stand with the free world ready to repel international communist tyranny.

MacArthur's deposition for the commander made public an exchange of letters with Japanese Premier Shigeru Yoshida in which he offered the new postwar Japan this bit of advice:

Jerome's New Sewage Disposal System Comes Packed in Mud

JEROME, Aug. 23—Jerome's new sewage disposal system equipment Wednesday played second fiddle to some Missouri mud.

The equipment arrived Wednesday but before workmen could unload the sewage digester they first had to remove two feet of Missouri mud from the bottom of the freight car. The equipment was at Kansas City when the Missouri and Kansas rivers were in flood and the dirt was deposited in the freight car and around the equipment.

The dirt was packed so hard in the car that heavy equipment had to be used to remove it. One workman quipped that the city should bottle the dirt and sell it at the next Missouri picnic held in the area.

According to Floyd Stued, Union Pacific agent, the freight car left Decatur, Ill., July 9 and was routed through Kansas City. Sometime between July 10 and July 14 it reached Kansas City and became bogged in the mud.

City Engineer James Voelter said that the late arrival of the equipment has not delayed work on the sewage disposal plant and predicts that the unit will be completed in October. Although the mud-encased equipment did not present a very nice appearance to the spectators who wandered down to the siding to view the mud, no damage was done by the flood waters, Voelter said.

Germany, Aug. 23 (AP)—The war veterans' movement is expected to gain force in Germany as the result of the return of the German army to its homeland.

They may become a force at a time when the German government is expected to use its integration with the western community of nations.

The veterans' associations are expected to be a force in the country because of officers who were members of the associations in the past.

Hansen Farmer Averages 89.2 Bushels Of Peas Per Acre on 4.76-Acre Field

Operating a 40-acre farm, aided by his son, Frank, and helping the other farms in the Hansen area, Peter Mulder produced an average of 89.2 bushels of perfection peas to the acre on 4.76 acres contracted to Glen Trail, Twin Falls, for Pure Line Seeds.

According to Trail, Mulder's secret was produced 241 bales of pea straw, a net of 23,720 pounds. Trail says Mulder "a good farmer and very particular. He watches the soil and rotates his crops." Crediting the latter habit, Trail said Mulder has no fertility problem on his land.

Mulder says he used phosphate fertilizer on one corner of the field, but did not recall using any fertilizer on the remainder of the record pea field.

The record field was seeded April 1. Mulder says he irrigated four times, for 24 hours each time. Trail says this is about the average amount of irrigation per season for peas, although some farmers add by three and others require four. Trail says it depends upon the variety of peas being grown and other conditions.

Mulder planted 80 pounds of seed in his record pea field and here he established another record in Trail's experience. He gained a return of 24.6 pounds of seed for each pound planted.

The record pea crop was harvested by three men, one working the mower and two on tractors completed the task in a half day.

Trail, who began work in the area in 1933, says the overall pea crop in the best he has seen since that time. Lating production of other farms in the Hansen area, he says Bryan Harris, a neighbor of Mulder, has a yield of 71 bushels per acre. Von Heber, 72 bushels per acre; W. O. Russell, 73 bushels per acre; Melvin Switzer, 75 bushels per acre; and 76 bushels per acre, 70 bushels per acre.

Switzer produces peas compared with grain producing better alfalfa or clover. He says two labor is required to grow peas than beans. He also believes there is a greater profit in peas than beans.

Another indication of Mulder's efficient farming is the speed in which he picked up the bales of pea straw. Aided by his tractor-driving grandson, James, 11, he was making sufficient headway to complete the job by the end of a farmer's day. The tractor driver claims his grandfather can't farm without him.

Mulder will use the pea straw for bedding and stock feed. Trail points out the nature from this straw is better than from other straw, although that is not as much straw as from wheat. Mulder got 227 bales of pea straw of this 4.76 acre field.

Mulder harvested \$3,600 in potatoes of the same land two years ago. He raised beans in the field last year. In the present crop, Mulder raised 60 bushels to the acre of peas last summer. Mulder has been farming in Idaho since 1916 and, at his present farm for six years.

Witnessing Mulder's efficiency, the Hansen farmer added alfalfa to his pea crop this year and expects to harvest about a ton an acre, probably more, from the pea field.

Rush of Beef Is Urged for Fall Market

DENVER, Aug. 23 (AP)—Cattlemen have been urged by the board of directors of the American National Cattle Raisers' association to market as much beef as possible this fall.

This plea was announced by F. J. Mullen, association secretary, after a meeting of the council, composed of presidents of affiliated state associations.

The council urged marketing many cattle as may be available for beef late in the fall shipping season, but said this can be done only if congress refuses to permit pack slaughter quotas.

Association officers were instructed by the council to "fight to the bitter end against reimposition of pack slaughter quotas," a statement from Mullen said.

Mullen said there doesn't appear to be any way to avoid a short supply of beef for several weeks after the range run is over and before the new crop of short-fall cattle starts to market in any volume.

Wildlife Cash Allocated for West Projects

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (AP)—Secretary of Interior Chapman has announced the appointment of \$17,101,031 among the states for restoration and development of wildlife resources.

This is \$6,317,514 more than last year's appropriation of \$8,783,517.

The money comes from the federal "excise tax" levied on the manufacturers of sporting arms and ammunition.

The money is made available to state game departments under the terms of the Pittman-Roberson act. To obtain the federal grants, each state must contribute at least one-fourth of the cost of its projects.

State allotments include: Idaho, \$346,423; Montana, \$511,632; Nevada, \$328,250; Oregon, \$112,624; Utah, \$253,074; Washington, \$477,351; Wyoming, \$327,853.

KANSAS CITY, Kans.—(NEA)—The scene in Red Cross flood relief headquarters here, and the hub of heartbreak.

Steadily, for 25 hours a day there has streamed through this huge, bustling office the stunned and bewildered victims one of the nation's greatest natural disasters.

Many have lost everything they own, but the clothes they wear and the blessed resignation of the aged. Some come with utter despair.

They come here with their families for help—minutely to buy groceries, to repair damaged homes and to rebuild those destroyed.

Some of the personal stories of what happened to these people are almost incredible.

A man and his wife who began the flood with their children wound up with 16. The extra 16 were neighborhood kids who got separated from their parents when the Armadillo section levee broke.

The Red Cross sent 16 to care of its 10 shelters in Kansas City. The mother and some of her suddenly-acquired foster children came to flood headquarters to ask for help.

A woman comes in leading her blind and pregnant daughter-in-law, 41 years old. They've lost everything they have and can't locate the girl's husband. They, too, are taken to a shelter to be clothed, fed and housed.
