Operations in Full Swing at Buhl Cannery

BUHL, Aug. 25—Canning operations are under way at the Buhl Green Giant cannery. Two shifts are working at low pressure.
 Oren Scholl, manager, says the peak of the season will be reached about Sept. 6. Three hundred employees are required for the two shifts.
 Processing begins with corn being fed into husking machines. From there it goes onto a sorting belt. Very few women are required on the belt this year as there are virtually no worms in the corn this year, Scholl says.
 After the corn has been sorted it is taken to the cutting room where it is cut from the cob, washed, run across a shaker and cannot. Sterilization of the product is completed in the canner and the finished product is ready for labeling and packing into cases.
 Approximately 250 farmers in the Buhl, Twin Falls and Wendell areas are growing corn for the cannery. A pack of about 400,000 cases is expected this season, Scholl said.
 Both the yield and the quality this year are exceptionally good, officials of the Greiner company announce. Approximately 25 men are employed in picking, handling and trucking the crop.

VFW and Auxiliary Seek Funds to Buy More Home Nursing Equipment to Loan

Beginning Monday, Twin Falls area residents will be receiving phone calls from 25 VFW and auxiliary workers who will be raising money to provide more home care equipment and materials for persons who are ill in their homes, according to Elizabeth Kelly, secretary of the local VFW post auxiliary.
 Equipment includes wheelchairs, invalid walkers, commodes, crutches, bed pads, hospital beds and all types of linen and blankets. Especially needed at this time are wheelchairs and walkers, according to Mrs. Mary Ann Knight, supervising nurse at the southeastern district health unit.
 VFW supplies are available free of charge to any county resident who is at home. Locally the first supplies were purchased Nov. 13, 1940, when between \$800 and \$1,000 in supplies was purchased at cost of \$500.
 The health unit is in charge of loaning, care and return of equipment. The demand always exceeds the supply in the case of some articles, according to Mrs. Knight. The availability of such supplies permits many persons who might otherwise be confined to hospitals and to beds for long periods of time to get about more easily. In some cases, they could not be released from the hospital without the supplies.
 "This is especially advantageous for chronically ill and old persons where long periods of illness are anticipated," says Mrs. Knight. "The health unit had five wheelchairs at present, but needs more. Additional linen and blankets are also required."
 An example of what can be accomplished if home care facilities are available is given in the case of Carol Ann Burns, 44-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Burns. They live four miles east and a half mile north of Twin Falls.
 Stricken with a spinal bone disease about 18 months ago, the little girl underwent considerable surgery and hospitalization. Little hope was given for her survival, but last April she was permitted to return home, sustained by a brace and road bars.

However, a VFW wheelchair was provided and Carol Ann was able to wheel herself about the house and walk for four months. Today, she is able to walk. She still requires a brace, but even this is expected to be torn aside and complete recovery reached before school age.

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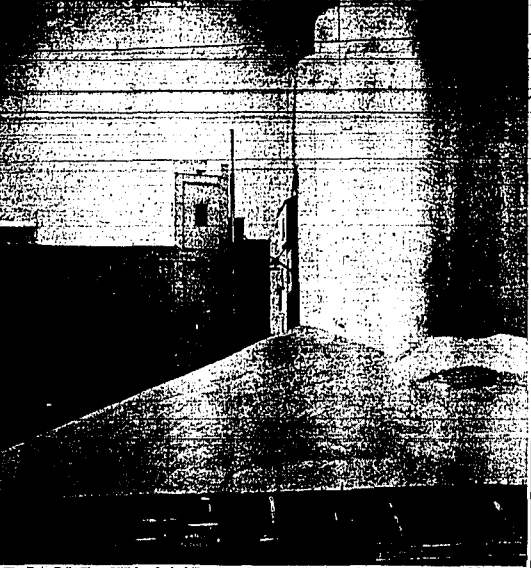

Larger Acreages, Big Yield Per Acre Bring Flood of Wheat in Magic Valley

Magic Valley's golden harvest—wheat—is almost completed. And when all the little grains have been weighed the harvest will amount to one of the largest in the history of the valley. The enormous size of the yield is attributed to two things, says Charles Kelly of the Twin Falls Flour Mill. Farmers planted larger acreages this year, he pointed out, and the yield per acre has been greater than usual. In recent years, Kelly said, it has been the normal thing for elevators to dump wheat on the ground because of a lack of storage space and a lack of freight cars. The same is true this year, he continued, the only difference being in the amount of wheat on the ground. This year it's larger, much larger. Kelly also blames the combine for the large pile of wheat on the ground. Kelly said that before the combine was used generally it took six weeks for the harvest to be completed. This gave elevators a chance to handle the grain as it came in, he said. Since combines have come into general use, however, all of the grain reaches elevators in approximately 10 days. "Even if there were sufficient combines," he said, "it would be impossible to handle so much grain in such a short time. Elevator operators in Jerome said the yield this year is between 20 and 25 per cent higher than in previous years. The elevators there have approximately 400,000 bushels in storage and another 100,000 bushels on the ground. The best yield reported in the Jerome area was from the D. Patterson ranch where 80 bushels to the acre were tallied. Many farmers reported yields of 90 bushels to the acre. Jerome elevator men agree with Kelly as to the quality of the wheat and point out that the price this year is 12 cents a bushel greater than it was last year. In Fairfield, in the northern part of the valley, the harvest is only about half finished. Despite this, elevator operators already have started to pile wheat on the ground. 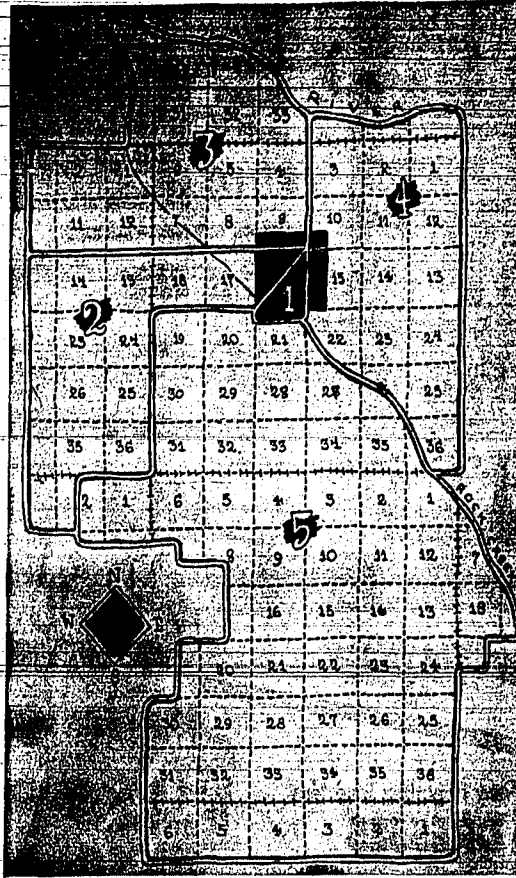

Expectant Fathers Given Space to Pace

Plenty of Lounges, Facilities Planned At New Hospital for Patients' Visitors

Lack of space even for patients in the present Magic Valley Memorial hospital resulted in a scarcity of accommodations for their relatives and friends, for their doctors and nurses and for various administrative and instructional functions. Such is not the case in the new Magic Valley Memorial hospital. In addition to a spacious and comfortable lobby at the entrance, there are three lounges for visitors, one for doctors, a large assembly room, an obstetrics classroom on the maternity floor, a hospital board room and medical library, a large playdeck for children, outdoor sun terraces and decks for patients, and a snack bar and soda fountain. Perhaps the greatest improvement, particularly for expectant fathers whose wives presently have been confined in the old hospital's maternity ward, will be the father's lounge on the obstetrical floor. At the old structure, anxious fathers could spend their time as best they could on a couple of chairs backed up against the end of a blocked off hall. If someone else decided one of the two chairs was needed elsewhere, there would be only one chair, sometimes for more than one father-to-be. Not so in the father's lounge in the new hospital. Comfortable chairs and cheerful surroundings are designed to keep the fathers out of the way and give them space to pace without getting underfoot. Like the lobby and other lounges for visitors, the father's lounge has chairs and decorations to make it a warm friendly place instead of being cold, austere and cheerless. Lounges for visitors also are provided on the medical floor and the surgical floor. On the children's orthopedic and isolation floor are located a large playroom and an outdoor playdeck for children. They will be equipped with toys and books and will be supervised by a practical nurse or nurse aide. A snack bar and soda fountain is a new departure for general hospitals. Children well on the road to recovery aren't the only patients for whom added facilities are provided. Adult patients will have use of a sun deck on the west side of the medical floor. It will be equipped with chairs. On the west side of the front of the new structure, on the first floor, is a sun-terrace for use by patients, staff members and visitors. It will have tables and chairs. Centrally located on the first floor is a snack bar and soda fountain. Hospital officials are considering stocking it with a line of sundries and self-merchandise. Again this is an innovation in hospitals. Officials saw the need for it in the frequent cases of automobile and other accidents which would keep relatives or friends waiting several hours while the victims were in surgery. The old hospital had no facilities to take care of these anxious visitors to take care of patients who were hastened to the hospital without time to bring along a toothbrush.
