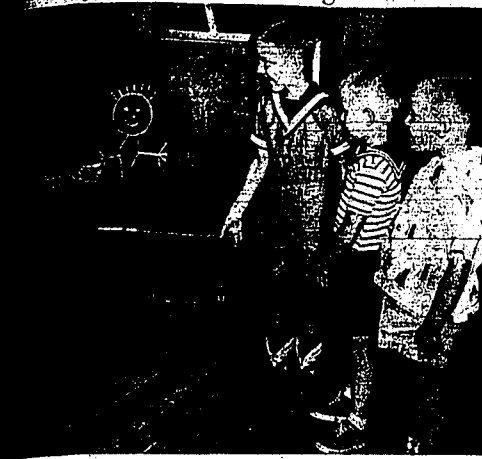

Prison Lacks Good Spot to Execute Five

POINT OF THE MOUNTAIN, Utah, Aug. 20 (AP)—Officials of the state-prison Utah state prison today looked over the new, walled facility to find a place for five men to be shot—barring legal intervention—during the next 10 days.

Utah's unique capital punishment law permits the state to choose between the firing squad and gallows. Only three of the more than 100 men sentenced in Utah in 70 years have been hanged.

At the first trial in Salt Lake City, abandoned five months ago, five marksmen took their places in an open catwalk doorway and fired four bullets—no gun was loaded with a blank—at targets over the heads of condemned men seated in an antique chair against the prison yard wall.

## Soil Surveys Start This Week In T. F. Conservation District

W. A. Laughamer, chairman of the Twin Falls soil conservation district, announces the start of soil surveys in the district this week. He said surveys are being made by H. Dale Munk and Richard Salzman, soil scientists of the U. S. soil conservation service.

The soil surveys provide basic information needed for working up conservation practice recommendations for farm and ranch lands. The surveys are made on aerial photographs and will show the type of soil, depth of soil, texture and slope of the land. The maps also will show erosion that has occurred on the land in past years, rock outcrops, shallow spots, and other physical

land features that may be needed by farmers in land-revealing or other types of conservation work.

A combination of these factors will be available to use of farmers and will be used by the farmer and technicians in working up changes in irrigation systems, land leveling, new ditches, crop rotations, range improvement and other conservation problems, Laughamer said.

The supervisors decided at their last regular meeting to start the soil surveys on the irrigated farm land in the north end of the district. It is hoped that enough conservationists will be available to complete soil surveys

**Supervisor Testifies**

She said she first saw the child shortly after 7 p.m. Aug. 1 in the emergency room. She described the injury and said she kept the child locked except when she admitted police officer "Roward" Gillette. Deputy Sheriff James Bennett, two doctors, the coroner and Kalker. She said the body was not moved until Kalker took pictures. Gillette identified the pictures which he took in the emergency room. Mrs. Hanby, who was in the room, said she appeared nervous as she clutched a handkerchief and her husband's hand, cried quietly as she looked at Dunn examine the pictures of the dead boy. # Filipino-U. S. Defense Pact Signing Held

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 20**—The United States and the Philippines bound themselves together today in a new defense pact, pledging each to help the other in their common defense.

Speaking at the signing ceremony, President Truman called the treaty a "strong step toward security and peace in the Pacific."

The others, with Japan and with New Zealand and Australia, are to be signed in the next two weeks.

### Labor Party Retains Plan To up Arms

LONDON, Aug. 18 (AP)—The Labor party is sticking determinedly to its policy of arming Britain fully, in defiance of serving critics by former Labor Minister George Lansbury.

It has published a policy statement regarding the nation's armaments, \$13,100,000,000 arms program as "the minimum required to deter aggression and so prevent a third world war."

"No other aim can take priority over that," it said.

The statement was prepared by the party's 27-member executive committee, which includes Foreign Secretary Herbert Morrison among its leaders.

The statement will be submitted for debate at the party's annual convention at Glasgow in early October and will become the basis of an election platform, if, as many politicians expect, a general election is called this fall.

In approving the policy declaration several weeks ago, the committee overrode objections of four committee members—Bryan, Ian Mearns, Mrs. Barbara Castle and Tom Driberg.

Bryan and two other laborites quit their ministerial posts last spring in protest against a budget providing money for the first year of the arms program, but forced patrons of the state health service to pay half the cost of false teeth.

Wrote Frankham:

Recently Bryan and his left-wing associates wrote a pamphlet called "One Way Only" urging the government to cut arms spending in order to stem inflation and try to protect living standards and social services.

These differences have threatened to split the party and perhaps break it up. But the party has managed to hold together in a split over economic policy in 1931.

The party statement was called "Our First Duty—Peace." It runs to about 3,000 words and will be sold on news stands.

### Flying Saucers to Supply Troops Are Tried Out by Army

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18 (AP)—The army is experimenting with flying saucers—yes, flying saucers—to supply troops in the field with gasoline and other liquids.

It announced Tuesday that also sharp containers made of rubber and rubber have been dropped from altitudes of 400 to 2,000 feet without bursting and spilling their five gallon contents of liquids.

When they hit the ground, the saucers do not shatter. They double their normal size, bounce back into the air and then settle down near a point of contact.

## West German Scribes Face Odd Dangers

BERLIN, Aug. 28 (AP)—Non-communist German newsmen in West Berlin have a decidedly odd life. Beating the deadline and the kidnaper.

Since 1947 at least 30 newspaper workers have disappeared into Russian-controlled territory. Some of them left their offices to check a story in the Soviet sector and never have been heard from since.

Others were arrested openly and word has filtered out they have been given stiff sentences in Russian zone jails and concentration camps.

**Part of Campaign**

It appears to be an important part of the communist terror campaign against the west, especially designed to scare off anti-communist German journalists.

While the kidnappings go on, the communist press continually reviles western newspapermen as "criminals and the like."

One of the earliest and best known journalists to disappear was Dieter Froede, 41-year-old employee of the West Berlin paper.

West Berlin authorities tried in vain to save him after he was tricked into entering the east sector in October, 1947. Froede is reported serving a 25-year-sentence in an East German labor camp.

**Never Came Back**

Wolfgang Hanke, 23-year-old West Berliner, went across the sector line to cover the life of a big communist pitch which split the city. He never came back.

Ernst Hager, a newspaper cameraman, driving from Berlin to West Germany, was stopped inside the Russian sector by communist "control boys" they were tried, convicted and sent to prison, or to Berlin travel by plane.

Some West Berlin editors have been publicly marked for their work, but venture near the sector boundary even in broad daylight.

## Complete Records Taken For Patients at Hospital

If you happen to be unlucky enough to require hospitalization, you may be lucky enough to enter the new Magis Valley Memorial. You'll be handed a long questionnaire to fill out. You'll find it similar to those you may have filled out in seeking a job.

This first in a series of medical forms is the usual list of personal history questions—occupation and employer, date and place of birth, past illnesses and surgical history, address, sex, marital status, closest relatives, religion, and so on.

The records even tell how you were brought to the hospital, which is of importance to an ambulance driver in case you were in an automobile accident or a victim of an auto crash or other accident.

And unless you want a "bad report card," it's best to do so as the nurse says, for she, too, keeps a record of things at time and type of medication, amount and kind of food, general condition, time taken to get and brought from surgery are included in her report for the records.

The physicians keep records on your history of your illness and your daily progress.

Other records include reports from the laboratory, X-ray department, anesthetist, as well as reports of physical examinations, daily temperature, blood pressure and pulse rate. In the records, too, are permits for operations and, where necessary, autopsies.

Why the emphasis on records? Because they're valuable to you, your doctor, your insurance company and statistical agencies. If you're in an unusual illness or operation, information about it may aid in the medical profession's understanding of the disease.

The importance of complete up-to-date records is emphasized by your hospital's by-laws which provide suspension of a physician from the hospital staff until his records are brought up to date if they're more than two weeks behind.

Medical records are more heads-ache in most hospitals, haven't been too much of a problem to pretty Gretchen Leick, records librarian. Even before passage of the law, she was keeping an honor roll of doctors who were up to date on their records.

"It seems like another doctor turns over a new leaf every month," she says. "Although the physicians joke about her honor roll she believes they like to see their names on it."

Mias Leick can see how delinquent records could be more of a problem in larger hospitals, with more patients and less opportunity for friendly contact among members of the hospital family.

You don't have to worry about your personal data becoming common knowledge. Just like in some of the less popular institutions, you're a patient and not a number, and your clothing and valuables are checked in when you're admitted.

Stickers instead of names are pasted in less confusion involving patients with similar names and provide further anonymity where a case file may be studied for its unusual medical aspects. The records are cross-indexed.

Study of medical records supplements medical books and permits physicians to compare results of various types of treatments. Records also eliminate the necessity for duplication of work when non-hospitalized patients already have been established and are on record.

Insurance companies frequently check medical records for final diagnosis. The records are the basis for monthly statistics and annual reports, prepared by the librarian.

Medical records often are the only source for the state bureau of vital statistics and aid the department of public assistance.

Although medical ethics forbid the hospital from giving detailed information on any specific case to the general public, the medical records library does supplement the information.

There are several reasons details cannot be released to the public. A patient's condition at the time may make it best for him not to know the nature of his injury or illness. And besides, what you tell the doctor and the doctor tells you is the business of no one else.

Even when you know where the hospital merely reports you are a patient in the medical, surgical or obstetrics department, what your condition is good, satisfactory or poor.

Names of patients may be given other information such as whether or not you slept well, but the nature of your dreams again is your own business.

Operation of the records library in the new hospital is being aided by adequate space and office equipment. It will have the convenience of having the records housed in the same building.

Formerly, the records library was housed in the old building and the records were under the care of the former maternity building together with a medical library.

The medical records library, which will become the nucleus of tests for a nurses training school, is being financed by doctors. It is housed in the hospital board's main entrance and includes medical texts and magazines.

The medical records librarian, Mias Leick, joined the staff of the old hospital in June, 1950. In the old hospital she had a part-time assistant. Now she has a full-time assistant.

She is one of six registered record librarians in Idaho. Boise has three, Wallace and Pocatello one each. A registered librarian is required to have the hospital fully approved.

A national registration examination is required. Before Mias Leick joined the hospital staff, the institution had a registered librarian for about one and one-half years.
