Factor cited by officials as the reason for the proposed reduction in the suspension system. Some transportation stations in the revenue department are to be closed twice a year on an average. Truman OK's Extension of Sugar Curbs

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (AP)—President Truman today signed a bill extending government controls over the sugar market until Dec. 31, 1952.

The sugar control program, which has existed in one form or another for nearly 17 years, is based on restricting domestic production and imports so the total supply will balance annual consumption, and provide a "virtual market" for both sellers and buyers.

Quota Fixed

To require the secretary of agriculture to estimate each year how much sugar Americans will buy and to fix production and import quotas on that basis. This year's quota was 2,250,000 tons.

Domestic producers who abide by their quotas are paid government subsidies provided by a special tax on sugar production. The subsidies have run to about \$70,000,000 a year. U. S. island territories and the newly-independent Philippine republic are classed as "domestic producers."

Quotas Raised

The new law makes slight adjustments in the formula for distributing annual sugar quotas among the various countries. This year's quota for the Philippines is raised from 210,000 to 2,000,000 tons and the Virgin Islands quota is raised from 15,000 to 150,000 tons.

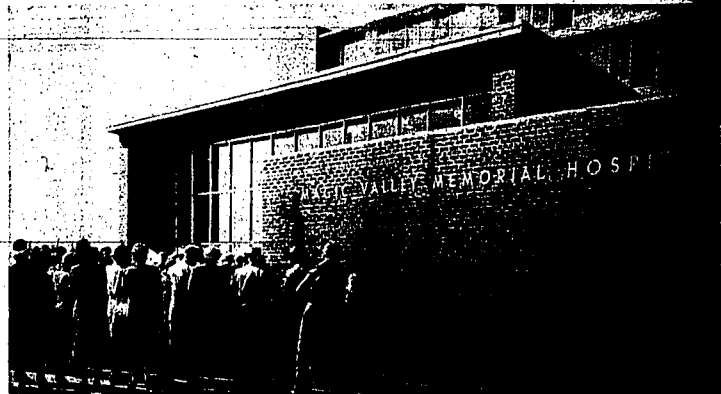

Planet Gives Star Review For Autumn

By J. HUGH PRUITT
Astronomer, Extension Division Oregon Higher Education System

The planet Venus is the delight of so many during the past few months, it leaving the western twilight sky Monday will pass almost between us and the sun, a condition known as inferior conjunction.

Near the end of this month, Venus may be seen in the dawn, low in the sky and about the Northern Cross. It will remain a "morning star" for the rest of the year.

But we are not without a splendid "evening star."

The planet Jupiter, although considerably less luminous than Venus, is a very striking object, and is rising about dusk each night a little over an hour after sunset.

It is a gorgeous sight during the rest of the night. By the end of the month Jupiter will be well up by the time the twilight sufficiently deepened for us to view.

Observe at 8 p. m.

For the brighter stars, let us observe the heavens around 8 p. m. Almost overhead bright, blue-white Vega shines splendidly. Further south—and eastward—Altair is conspicuous with dinner stars standing close by, both above and below.

At a lesser distance northeast of Vega, Deneb glows at the head of the Northern Cross. These three bright stars form the "summer triangle" as outlined by the Girl Scouts.

For the fainter stars, let us observe the heavens around 8 p. m. Almost overhead bright, blue-white Vega shines splendidly. Further south—and eastward—Altair is conspicuous with dinner stars standing close by, both above and below.

At a lesser distance northeast of Vega, Deneb glows at the head of the Northern Cross. These three bright stars form the "summer triangle" as outlined by the Girl Scouts.
