WE MUST REMAIN 'TOUGH'

The climax of the "Get Tough With Russia" policy should come soon. On half a dozen fronts, relations between the United States and the Russians are headed for a showdown and a new perspective.

Japanese peace treaty signing at San Francisco and cease fire negotiations at Kaesong head the list. In a secondary role are American notifications on termination of "most favored nation" trade and tariff concessions to certain countries.

Severance of trade relations with Czechoslovakia will be the first of a series of conferences at Geneva, Switzerland, in September. Soviet Russia declares this is an act directed toward a further deterioration of American-Russian relations.

President Truman says he will send another message to Nicolai Siverny, Russia's titular president, trying to force its publication behind the iron curtain. This will be a follow-up on the first success of forcing Russian dispatches to the press.

It is the prospect, then the course of the United States should be clear. It is to continue the tough policy. This is no time to ease-up-in-response to the Russian offer of peace. If the get-tough policy has brought Russia to this point, more of the same should move that point farther along.

This is no time for cutting back or easing off. This is no time for falling to do any of the things that would mean a retreat. It is no time for any necessary sacrifices in taxes or prices or wages or rents or profits to give America a sound economy.

The United States doesn't have to retreat in any way to show Russia and to show the world that it means peace. As far back as 1946 the United States offered Russia a broad conference to discuss credits, a treaty of friendship, commerce and navigation, an exchange of aviation rights, expansion of trade, settlement of lend lease, world control of atomic energy and a sharing of its secrets.

QUORUM CALL: OUPDATED - The other day Senator Caperton of Indiana fell down while rushing to answer a quorum call in the senate. He apparently suffered but slightly.

TUCKER'S WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON-The politico-economic forces of organized crime, as represented by the National Labor Relations Board, the Congress of Industrial Organizations, the railway brotherhoods and John L. Lewis United Mine Workers of America, have been in a virtual partner in politics and government.

The principal reason for the new division is the determination of the AFL to operate independently of party and labor allies, and to loosen its ties with the Democratic party and the Truman administration. The man who heads this movement is George F. Willard, the AFL's executive secretary.

CLAMOR-Bureau's counterpart in the CIO is the tough and -tumble Walter Reuther, head of the United Automobile Workers of America. He also helped to break up the AFL's loose alliances with the major farm organizations, especially the Farm Bureau.

Both men have been irritated by the compromising politics of such outsiders as William Green and Philip Murray, respective presidents of the AFL and the CIO. In recent months, according to the Meany-Reuther theory, have resulted from their more belligerent and threatening position.

POWER-Labor has no special regard for the men now in the White House, especially Mr. Truman. He has fought for the price controls they regard as necessary to protect their purchasing power. They favor big foreign aid programs because war and military contracts guarantee high employment and wages.

PRODUCTION-Congressional determination to trim the foreign aid program coincides with the decision of European military experts and diplomats to reduce the number of troops and military equipment to be sent to Europe. They will make this demand-a conference-to follow the signing of the Geneva accords.
