



Airmen Perish As B-29 Crashes At Area Airbase

UNTAIN HOME AIR FORCE BASE, Sept. 5 (AP)—An B-29 crashed and exploded at a time just after take-off from the airbase here today, killing five men on board.

Investigation is under way to determine the cause of the crash. The plane was on a mission to drop atomic bombs on Japan. The crash was the worst in Idaho since the war, when a B-29 crashed near the town of Arco.

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Order by Court Return to Work

DENVER, Sept. 5 (AP)—A temporary restraining order issued in U. S. court today to halt the strike in the strategic copper industry.

The order was signed at 11:07 a. m. (MST) by Circuit Judge Alfred P. Murray of the 10th circuit court. He was assigned to hear the request in the temporary absence of District Judge William Lee Knous.

Murray set Sept. 14 at 2 p. m. for a hearing on issuance of a preliminary injunction. Officials at union headquarters have issued a statement denying the injunction "unfair and unjust."

It added, however, that work is going on now and that the union is recommending they comply with the terms of the restraining order. The action is viewed as a brief check on the union's activities.

Down Fast in Bid to Ask Red China to Act Parley

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 5 (AP)—The western powers today broke up Russia's first big attempt to torpedo the Japanese peace conference.

The President didn't disclose what he had in mind, but he left no doubt about the response he will have against the Republicans in 1952. He said he would not be a party to the peace settlement.

He said Soviet China had an "indisputable right" to participate in the signing of the treaty. Secretary of State Acheson ruled him out of order, but Gromyko bled right back and said "we challenge" the ruling.

The shouting and confusion continued until Acheson, who served as presiding officer of the conference, ruled that each delegation should have but five minutes to raise points of objection.

Again Russia challenged the ruling, so it was put to a vote of the floor, and it was carried by an overwhelming majority. "Only Russia, Poland and Czechoslovakia—the three iron curtain countries represented—voiced objections to the treaty, believed on the fence on the treaty, believed."

By voting against the Soviet challenge, the conference voted against Russia's demands that the body consider immediately the invitation to re-open the conference.

After the five-minute ruling was put in effect, there was a brief intermission. The Polish and British delegates, Polish Delegate Stefan Wierzbowski, refused to give way when the minutes were read to British Delegate Kenneth Rogers.

The vote recommended appointment of a seven-member committee to consider rules of procedure and report back to the conference tomorrow. That would stall the meeting another day.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5 (AP)—The air force announced today the award today of a contract to Consolidated Vultee Aircraft Corp. of San Diego, for development of an atomic powered airplane.

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Truman Luncheon Talk Hints He'll Run in 1952

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 5 (AP)—President Truman appeared today to have hit the reelection campaign trail with a 1952 picture virtually written.

He did everything but formally announce his candidacy at a Democratic rally here where he called his opponents names ranging from "special privilege boys" to "economic fossils."

And he conducted his 1952 platform under the familiar "fast deal" slogan. He said he would be re-elected a President next year.

He didn't say it would be Harry Truman who would be re-elected. He stood up and cheered—and his own obvious wish of the applause—was loudly proclaimed.

Mr. Truman headed for his home in the west after a couple of San Francisco speeches, in which the off-the-cuff political talk at a party luncheon created more excitement than his more foreign policy address opening the Japanese peace conference last night.

Senator Magnuson, D. Wash., who was among those cheering the President on at the luncheon speech, told a reporter, with a grin, "I thought he threw his hat into the ring."

Inflation Is Cutting Into Nation's High Standard of Living, Survey Discloses

Editor's note: Here's the first of two dispatches that present the real picture of what inflation is doing today to your pocketbook. You'll see why your living standards aren't what they used to be. It's not drawn by lowered real economic activity, but by military armaments all over the globe. It's reported by NEA reporters on the major cities from coast to coast.

NEW YORK—(NEA)—The question was "Has inflation caused you to lower your standard of living?"

An Atlanta postman replied: "Yes. Not only have luxuries been lopped off, but I'm getting along with old clothing and have had to sell my car."

A pharmacist in the same city: "I've had to cut down on everything, including baby food, which I can buy at reduced prices."

A Dallas policeman: "My standard of living is kind of shaky."

A living in Cleveland: "Yes, considerably. For example, it's cut out just about all of our entertainment. We used to go out occasionally, but can't any more. We don't entertain at home any more. We've been losing ground since 1939."

A Chicago businessman said: "No, it has caused an increase in my standard of living."

And a San Francisco housewife responded with: "It will remain just about the same."

The question was one of half a dozen put to housewives, businessmen, factory workers, teachers, cab drivers, public—service—employees, widows and pensioners in a sweeping survey covering major U. S. cities from coast to coast. NEA's reporters asked people

about their living standards, their savings, the effect of taxes on their living habits, what they are or are not buying in the way of food, clothing, automobiles, household furnishings, and why.

The replies drawn from ordinary Americans all over the land contain no evidence that inflation has yet gotten steadily into the nation's economy, but neither do they offer cheering news for business, for congress, or the administration.

This dispatch will deal largely with the inequities about savings, taxes and living standards. A second will scan the reports on people's current buying habits.

About four out of every seven who answered the standard of living question said they were indeed worse off than they had been before. And of those who did not complain, many indicated they were just managing to hold their own, because pay increases had matched price rises.

In the New York City area, the survey learned that people generally felt that, were it not for inflation, they would be enjoying a much better standard of living, since in many cases salaries haven't kept pace with price increases.

In every city the survey touched, the answers to all questions conveyed the notion that money is tighter, or at least that people believe it is. They were more stingy with what they have to spend. If the survey is an accurate reflection, they have less of it in reserve than they did a year ago.

Power Lack May Hamper Basin Work

NEW YORK, Sept. 5 (AP)—There is "better than a 50-50 chance" of serious unemployment in Pacific northwest industrial plants this fall and winter, Edwin Felschman, consulting engineer of San Francisco, has predicted to the American Chemical Society.

The reason, he said, will be lack of water for the region's hydroelectric power plants.

600,000 KW Shortage
He estimated that critical water conditions at the Bonneville and Grand Coulee plants, on the Columbia River, and other plants feeding into this power pool would result in a deficiency of 600,000 kilowatts or more.

He said power to large aluminum plants would be cut off first. This cut would be 214,000 kilowatts. Other northwest industries, he said, would have to share a cut of 300,000 kilowatts with commercial and residential customers.

Ample Elsewhere
Even with average winter conditions, he said, there would be a shortage of 300,000 kilowatts. Elsewhere, he said, there would be a surplus of 300,000 kilowatts.

People's replies to questions about their buying habits under-score this situation. Two out of three aren't buying cars, furniture, refrigerators, stoves and other household goods. Many have given up eating expensive beef and are eating pork or cheaper beef cuts.

Overwhelmingly, they cite lack of money or high prices to explain why they've clamped a tighter lid on their buying.

WASHINGTON—Although no veteran European statesman or diplomat would pretend to interfere with the decision of the American people to support the United States in its fight against the Axis, several allied governments abroad have indicated to touring members of the American People's Party that they would prefer to remain in his present post instead of prostrating to the whims of the GOP's nominee next year.

This indirect intervention is a tribute to the American people's counter to the schemes of his political promoters on the side of the water.

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TESTIMONIAL—No other American has enough prestige and authority to make a testimonial to the newly to leaders of nations which once controlled the world, including our own continent.

It is a testimonial to Ike's kind of grinning diplomacy that, instead of resenting his managers, the Europeans cite his blunt behavior as the main reason for not removing him from the scene.

If it would be the best thing in the world like to use him as an example for an editorial subject which we believe is quite timely.

Now that the new Magic Valley Memorial Hospital has been formally dedicated and all who have seen it are thrilled with the building and the equipment, viewing the accomplishment from a slightly different angle should not detract from the main event.

As everyone in Twin Falls county knows, Clyde Bacon, as he is better known among all his acquaintances, has served as chairman of the hospital board ever since the hospital was first conceived. Throughout all the planning and construction he has held that important position in which he has been largely responsible for an unusually successful job. He will continue on in that capacity with his efforts heretofore devoted chiefly to the financial side of the project.

It would be a serious error, in making this example of Mr. Bacon, for us to underestimate the important work done by all the other members of his board—a highly qualified group of people such as you seldom see voluntarily engaged in the service of the community of this magnitude. It's a study in good citizenship and civic enterprise, to make an example of which is the purpose of this editorial.

If Mr. Bacon will continue to pardon us, we will point out that it's well known in these parts and throughout Idaho for that matter, that he's a man of considerable means, a good business head, successful and substantial.

He's the type of individual, for instance, who seldom seeks such things as political office, although it would be the best thing in the world that could happen to this country if more men of his stature were seated in such positions. Not only would he ordinarily be too busy with his own affairs to engage in such things, but there would be no point in permitting himself to be bothered with such things as are usually associated with politics. He would not be misled by those well-wishers who usually desire a political office, once he has made the decision to seek a political office.

This same type of individual quite often is accused of being selfish to the point of making no personal interest in civic affairs.

That's why Mr. Bacon's chairmanship of the hospital board serves as such a good example. It was recognized from the outset that the new hospital would cost close to two million dollars, which naturally demanded that a board of business men be selected to administer the expenditure of such funds.

The citizenry was interested to the extent that it forgot all about politics in looking for a man to head up such a board. And that man in turn thought only of the qualifications of those responsible individuals selected to serve with him on the board.

Rarely in this day and age, do you see such a combination—in the first place, such an array of substantial citizens giving of their time over a period of years, and in the second place, the public standing so solidly behind them all through these years—without all the usual political carping and penny-ante criticism.

We're fortunate indeed that we had such a hospital board and such a chairman to work with our county commissioners. We know to our own satisfaction that we got value received for every dollar invested in the hospital, and that as a result we have one of the finest institutions of its kind in this whole western country.

What a country this would be if all our tax monies could be administered in such a business-like manner, with such whole-hearted cooperation!

There is a real lesson to be learned from our experience in building the new Magic Valley Memorial hospital—one we should never forget.

"Would someone please explain what makes the honor of a white person more revered than that of a man of any other race, creed or color?"
