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Cause Related For Beauty of Harvest Moon

By HUGH J. FRAUETZ, Astronomer, Extension Division of the University of Idaho. One poetic soul has enthused, "There is magic in the autumn when the harvest moon hangs high. And I have seen it in the columns of your critical column."

However we labor at his apartment for two weeks waiting to bring us that coming of the moon, when the evening are as glow with an abundance of moonlight.

The term "harvest moon" is said to have originated in England and Scotland where the gathering of crops occurred in September. Then all were anxious to work long hours, and the many well-lit evenings aided greatly.

The present moon of the favorable night-to-night spacing of moonrise at this season, but likely know nothing of the scientific explanation of the phenomenon.

Throughout a year moonrise occurs on an average 50 minutes later each day than on the preceding day. This delay is known as the retardation of moonrise.

At the time of full moon in March this year, the maximum retardation in the latitude of Reno, Nev., is 1 hour and 17 minutes.

But this is quite different 6 months later, this year between Sept. 10 and 18, the retardation will be only 21 minutes. It is only a little more than this for several days around these dates.

Over a period of eight days, starting September 11, the retardation is 1 hour and 17 minutes. It will thus be in the early evening sky many nights in succession.

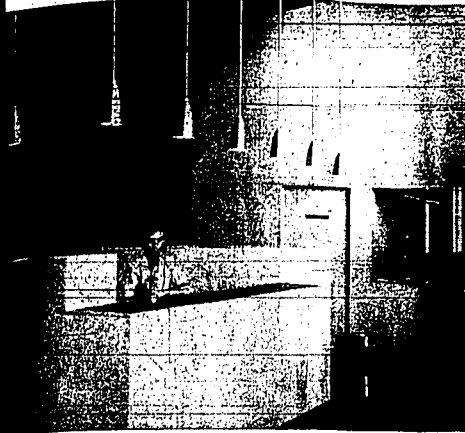

Admission Procedure Is Changed for New Hospital's First Usage Monday

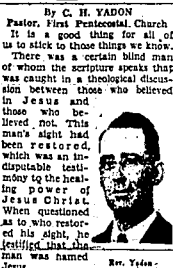
When the questions one by one marital status is necessary in order that relatives may be contacted. Identification of employer may be necessary in arriving at financial arrangements, dates of previous admissions merely lead doctors to case histories. It is necessary that the hospital know how the patient came to the hospital because in some cases the physician why a patient has been brought to the hospital and church affiliation is for the benefit of the patient and the clergy.

Magic Valley Memorial is a Blue Cross hospital, and that organization pays expenses of member patients and deposits are not required. The hospital must know when a patient is covered by insurance in order to help the patient with financial arrangements. In most cases the patient is responsible to the hospital, but the hospital may then collect from the insurance company. The hospital also lists a preliminary diagnosis on its entry questionnaire. This consists merely of generalities describing the patient as surgical, observation, maternity or medical.

Birthdates are among the most important questions because a person's age helps determine the type and amount of anesthetic that will be used. The place of birth is merely identification, just in case two patients are admitted at the same time with the same surname and with the same name. It is unlikely they would have parents by the same name or the same place of birth.

Admission and discharge procedures are about the same in all hospitals, Mrs. McLean points out. Only the physician may bring about a patient's dismissal. If a person

AS YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

It is a good thing for all of us to stick to those things we know. There was a certain blind man of whom the scripture speaks that was caught in a theological discussion between those who believed in Jesus and those who believed not. This man's sight had been restored, and which was an indisputable testimony to the healing power of Jesus Christ. When questioned as to who restored his sight, he testified that the man was named Jesus.

His enemies said, "We know this Jesus is a sinner. You give God the glory." The man answered, "Whether he is a sinner or not, I know not, but one thing I know, whereas I was blind, now I see." The lesson we get from this incident is this:

Here was a man who had had an experience; therefore, he was not at the mercy of his enemies who had an argument. He was not versed enough in theology to discuss whether or not Jesus Christ was a sinner or not, but he stood on that which he knew to be true.

In order to provide them with the necessary night care. Arrangements are made by the physicians, and the laider must arrange for surgery facilities. Emergencies are handled any time.

Accident patients are treated in the emergency room. If they are unconscious, their clothes are searched for identification and all valuables are placed in a bag in the presence of at least two witnesses. Whenever possible, the nearest relative is called to act for the patient.

Care of valuables is the responsibility of the admission officer. In addition to accident cases, other patients often bring rings and other valuables which cannot be taken to the operating room. Valuables, as already mentioned, are placed in special envelopes in the presence of witnesses, one witness being sufficient when the patient is conscious and able to sign a list of the items. The envelopes are kept in a safe, and when returned to the patient the envelope is opened in the presence of the patient and an attendant.

The four switchboard operators, working in shifts, helped with the extra work of the business office employees at the old hospital. With less confusion and more space it is expected that the four holdover business office employees will be sufficient to handle the new hospital. It may be necessary to hire a night clerk to operate the bookkeeping machine, J. C. McClivary, administration, points out.

Holdover employees in the business office are George VanTuburg, purchasing agent and office manager; Marian Turner, head bookkeeper; Mrs. Vera Whitaker, bookkeeper, and Mrs. McLean.

Medical patients are admitted to the hospital whenever necessary and maternity cases when, as Mrs. McLean puts it, "God wills it." Surgery cases are admitted after 4 p.m.

We shall never triumph over all the conflicting opinions of men by indulging with them. We should be willing to settle on the conclusion that the scripture says: "Let every mouth be stopped; and the whole world become guilty before God."

I would like to leave you with the words of an old hymn: "The life's changing values may vanish away, and things that were real become dreams; how blessed to walk with the Lord day by day, and know He is real as He seems."

My reason the unseen can never discern, nor fully explain the unknown; but precious the truths of the Spirit I learn, when His Spirit speaks to my soul. Jesus is real to me, yes, Jesus is real to me; I never will doubt Him, nor journey without Him, for He is so real to me.
