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### TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The Truman-Acheson foreign policy will come under severe senatorial scrutiny as the Senate today begins a series of hearings to extend our military and diplomatic boundaries and commitments into areas so remote it is obvious we must have the most experienced marines with our present forces.

There is no or scant senatorial objection to the plan drawn in the Pacific, which runs roughly from the Aleakans to Japan and thence to New Zealand and Australia. It is generally agreed that we need this bastion to prevent the Japanese beach-heads posing threats to the Philippines, Hawaii and our Pacific frontier.

But the administration program worrying senate critics is the plan to include Turkey, Greece, possibly Yugoslavia and Spain, within the NATO Atlantic military pact. Their inclusion within the NATO Atlantic would mean, in effect, that we are establishing a military Russia, we would be forced to go to their aid, and possibly set off the spark of World War III.

**QUESTION**—Under the written provisions of the North Atlantic pact, these Mediterranean countries could become members of the alliance without senate approval. It is the senate's job to review the senate foreign relations committee, it was stipulated by Secretary of State Acheson that any amendments to the pact must be approved by the senate.

Therefore, any reopening of the treaty to approve the adherence of Turkey, Greece and Spain will furnish the senate with a serious review of the administration's foreign program.

The senate's first question will be: Where is our ultimate interest? Is it in the Balkans or in the Atlantic? Do we want to go to war?

**FACT**—The secret fact is that the Truman administration has not the slightest objection to the signing by the Russians what precipitate all-out war. Despite regulations of treaties designed to entrench the Bosphorus, the Russians have been known to say there they would decide to make a warlike stand in the event of Russian attack.

We are related communistic aggression in Korea. Although this offensive was inspired and reinforced by Moscow, we prefer for diplomatic reasons to overlook it.

We refuse to regard Stalin's bargain-basement war in this area as reason for a showdown with him. We have already said that we will not take any further steps to make Korea a test case on a large scale.

**RETALIATION**—When and if we ask admission of Spain, Greece, Turkey, and possibly Yugoslavia, to the North Atlantic military alliance, we will be saying to Stalin in effect that we are ready to meet any attack on the United States. In retaliation we shall defend them, even if it means the outbreak of World War III.

But it is not even if the U. S. senate will confirm any treaty which commits us to go to war because of an invasion from remote lands as Turkey, Greece and Yugoslavia.

**SHIVER**—Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas has demanded that the Chinese communists send a shiver through the Truman administration nerve centers. President Truman was particularly displeased when he knew how close Douglas came to being President of the United States.

When Franklin D. Roosevelt decided to run for a fourth term, Douglas was vice presidential candidate was Justice Douglas. He told all visiting politicians that, if he had to drop the radical Henry A. Wallace, he would support Douglas.

In his message to the convention on a running-mate, he proposed Justice Douglas and Senator Truman in Wallace's place. He was not elected to the presidency, the convention, Douglas instead of Truman might have been the vice presidential nominee, and eventually President.

But the late "Boss" Hendon, then Democratic national chairman, told FDR's message to the convention political situation. Douglas has no more chance of being President than the mud-over-Douglas. Otherwise, the pro-Moore Justice, would be our President today.

**FAVORITE**—Despite this shady record, Justice Douglas was Truman's favorite for the vice presidential nomination in 1940. But practical-minded Democratic politicians covered him, Douglas has no party or popular appeal, and his best political bet was to accept Sen. Alben B. Barkley as a running-mate.

Incidentally, there will be a strong effort to impeach Justice Douglas at the coming session of congress, based on his indecent remarks and magazine writings. But it is doubtful whether the justice's behavior on the court and abroad provides grounds for congressional impeachment or presidential removal. Plus, Mr. Truman was the object of a Douglas dismissal, although he does not dare to ask him to resign.

### "CRAZY HIGHWAY FOOLS"

The record high number of 461 highway fatalities over the Labor day week-end, as an Associated Press story in the Sunday Times-News pointed out, has given impetus to a new, nationwide campaign against "crazy highway fools."

The slogan fighter on American highways, in other words, is reaching such an appalling figure that safety officials and law enforcement authorities are starting to call spades spades.

There was nothing new as to the underlying cause of all this killing and destruction on our highways. An Associated Press survey in states suffering the heaviest Labor day traffic toll showed once more that speeding in one form or another was the greatest single cause of fatal highway accidents.

Now that those authorities chiefly concerned with this problem realize fully that the problem is getting out of control by leaps and bounds, we are hearing less talk about "educating the public" and "appealing to the people." The emphasis is being shifted along the lines of more rigorous enforcement.

Safety experts in different parts of the country are urging a reduction in speed limits, tightening of traffic law enforcement and more careful screening of driver privileges.

In urging that the nation's highways be ruled off as fast as possible, Ned H. Dearborn, president of the National Safety Council, issued the following statement for everyone to consider:

"I would be a quick doctor if I prescribed a single pill that could cure the traffic sickness that is claiming more and more American lives. The remedy isn't that simple.

"But I am convinced that we must stop being polite and get the crazy highway fools off the road—the rule reckless minority that makes only their own necks, but also are creating a terrible slaughter of innocents.

"There are two quick ways to do this—first, state drivers' license laws that make driving a privilege to be kept only as long as it is not abused, and second, uncompromising enforcement of all traffic rules, backed to the hilt by the courts.

"That's straight enough talk for all of us to understand, from an authority well qualified to arrive at a logical conclusion.

"At-home talk that says drivers are 'license law which is intended to serve the purpose Mr. Dearborn has pointed out.

It now remains for us to follow out his other recommendation—"uncompromising enforcement of all traffic rules, backed to the hilt by the courts."

### HOOVER'S APPEAL

A few days ago former President Herbert Hoover rose to his feet in his native Iowa and delivered an eloquent appeal to his countrymen to help find the way back to moral decency in American public life.

Hoover spoke of many things. But at heart his counsel was a simple one. He called upon us to restore the old virtues, to live once again by the old, tested codes of ethics like the Ten Commandments and the Sermon on the Mount.

His diagnosis of our moral ills was penetrating. His advice was thoroughly sound. If we are to find our way back to decency, what better guideposts can we have than the Commandments so many seem to have ignored in this troubled time?

We here set them down afresh, in service to the Christian ideals of honor and right living which must underlie our free way of life if it is to survive:

1. Thou shalt have no other gods before me.
2. Thou shalt not make unto thee a graven image, nor any likeness of anything that is in Heaven above, or that is in the Earth beneath, or in the water under the Earth.
3. Thou shalt not take the name of thy God in vain.
4. Remember the Sabbath and keep it Holy.
5. Honor thy father and thy mother.
6. Thou shalt not steal.
7. Thou shalt not kill.
8. Thou shalt not commit adultery.
9. Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor.
10. Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's house, thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's wife, nor his man-servant, nor his maid-servant, nor his ox, nor his ass, nor his anything that is thy neighbor's.

### PENNY WISE, DOLLAR FOOLISH

The senate finance committee has whiffed some \$420,000,000 of a house-approved increase of \$2,855,000,000 in personal income taxes. This plan, of course, has to run quite a gauntlet before getting full senate endorsement.

The big question may be whether the senate can understand it well enough to vote on it intelligently. The proposal calls on the taxpayer to submit to his gross income the "normal" exemption and deduction figures his tax due under present law, and then apply a new levy of three to four per cent on what's left.

Maybe this will save us a little more money. But we'll probably pay out to accountants and tax lawyers who will have to take our hands and lead us through the maze. Isn't there some simpler way?

### JUSTICE FOR FRIENDS

We bring what is the cause for regret but not for astonishment when occasional acts of barbarous inhumanity are perpetrated by soldiers over a fence post. Is it any wonder that in an atmosphere of violence and chaos crimes sometimes occur which also take place in peaceful and orderly communities?

But soldiers are traditionally "heroes," and it is peculiarly unpleasant to have "even a single" hero act as a criminal. Hence there is a public opinion sometimes to pretend that an atrocious act is due to leniency of treatment toward soldiers who, while fighting on foreign fields, have committed crimes against people who were justly convicted of being "cops" or "natives."

It is encouraging to note that Canada appears to be doing particularly thorough job in bringing to justice the several Canadian soldiers allegedly involved in an ugly case of attempted rape and calumny murder in Korea. It is particularly interesting that it is important at all times. It is doubly important in such a situation as this. For here the victims are men of a friendly nation which has committed crimes supposed to be "saving" and where "bad feeling" has been generated already by some United Nations troops treating the native population with contempt.

Better education of soldiers for their democratic responsibilities is needed, as well as the sort of military justice which is bringing into being a comprehensive educational program is now being carried on among U. N. troops. We think the fellowship and justice which are an inherent part of democracy may mean, inasmuch, far outweigh the lapse of individuals in the eyes of the patient and tragic Korean people.—Christian Science Monitor.

### TRUMAN USES T-H

Although President Truman seldom lets a week pass without uttering a reference to the T-H-Hartley labor law he is not alone using it when occasion arises.

At the President's direction an injunction has been issued by federal officials directing the copper strike, which threatens paralysis of the nation's defense program. As this is written the men are not returning to work. The last time they were ordered to come to comply with the order and they will probably be back to work within a few days.

The labor law has been in effect for four years now. It has not "enlarged" labor, for the unions are stronger than they were when it was passed. They have secured more wage increases than in any previous four years of their history.

The law has developed many flaws which its author had no way of seeing, with the result that the response from the administration which prefers the law as a whipping boy. But it does have definite value. The T-H-H law has been in effect for four years when other remedies appeared to have been exhausted. You may be sure he invoked it this time only as a last resort for he cannot do so without some loss of face—Nampa Free Press.

General Mills scientists, who have been working on cosmic ray and high altitude meteorology since the war, produced a balloon made of the same type of plastic American housewives use for wrapping food.

### Experts Tally Heavy Losses In Mine Row

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 (AP)—Government experts are counting up the cost of the just-ended nationwide copper strike in production of vital defense materials.

The national stockpile of copper was low before the Aug. 27 walkout. Now, although all 90,000 tin men are back at work, the situation is even more critical.

Copper Hill Hardest

Lead, zinc, sulphuric acid, manganese, molybdenum and other critical defense items were made more scarce by the strike, but it was copper output which was hit hardest.

Experts in the office of Mobilization Director Charles E. Wilson, in the national production authority and the defense department all are trying to determine how much of the loss can be made up without dipping into crucial stockpiles.

40,000 Ton Loss

One leading copper manufacturer, James J. Russell, of the Brevort Copper and Brass company, estimated the loss in copper output at 40,000 tons.

Wilson was forced to recommend to the President that 25,000 tons be taken out of storage to make up for the lack before the Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers' strike.

Wilson said the deficiency was due largely to a strike in July by the CIO Steel Workers at the Gardfield, Utah, smelting plant of the American Smelting and Refining company.

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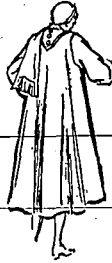
