ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Sept. 13 (AP)—United States troops in the Korean peninsula captured a vital strategic spot today, a bitter local fight that raged east of Kumhwa to the vicinity of Kamsong on the east coast of North Korea.

The battleline in the east is roughly 25 miles north of the 38th parallel, old dividing line between North and South Korea. The fighting of the past few days has pushed Allied positions forward as much as three and one-half miles in some sectors.

On the rolling hills and plains of the western front, action was slow. Allied patrols scanned red positions for signs of a strike from their built-up positions.

AP Correspondent Blair Carter reported at least 250,000 tank-supplied in position of the western and west-central fronts for a possible thrust at Seoul, South Korean capital.

Sparkling clear fall weather gave Allied weapons their best opportunity in weeks for close support of ground troops and long-range bombing from over North Korea's rail and highway system.

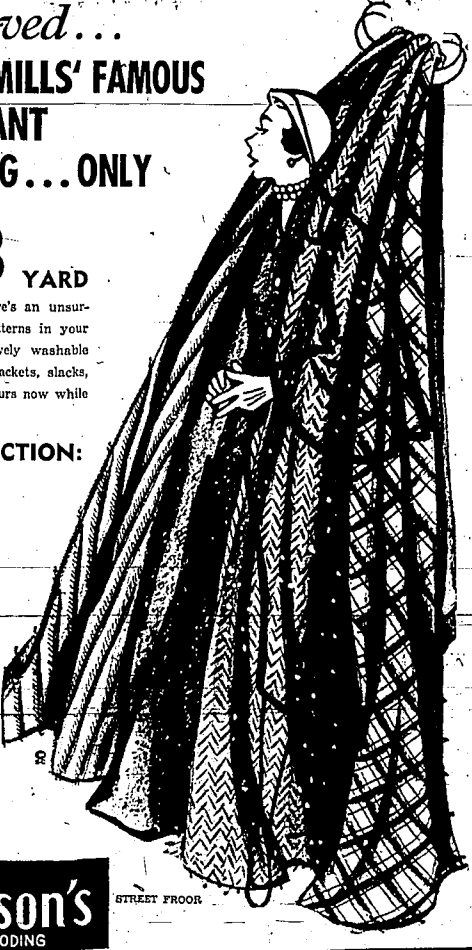

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Although events in Korea have forced President Truman and Secretary Acheson to back away from any vague idea they may have had of sending a fleet of United States battleships to China, officials of four leading American banks, two in New York, one in California and one in Chicago, are not so dubious about the administration's proclaimed hostility toward China.

These four banks have more than a billion dollars of deposits registered in the name of the Chiang Kai-shek government, or in the names of the generalissimo's family members. They do not know whether it is money honestly come by, or whether it consists of "gifts" which Chiang Kai-shek quietly siphoned out of American loans, and deposited here for insurance against their eventual expropriation by the Communists.

BOB HOPE

"WASHINGTON CALLING" BY MARQUIS CHILDS

WARREN—Now that the Japanese and the United States are at peace, the facts of life remain unaltered. With a peace formally concluded, they present a formidable challenge for the future.

In many respects the treaty is a triumph. The United States has been primarily responsible for pushing to a conclusion a peace more generous than the Japanese themselves would have dared to hope for, even two or three years ago.

This was possible because of the foundation laid down by Gen. Douglas MacArthur in his administration of the American occupation.

CRIME IN AMERICA

Tumult and shouting over the senate crime investigations have died. The television has faded away. Still, the most important job of passing new laws to do something about the evils exposed.

Chances for action during the present session of congress aren't too good. Other "must" measures have priority and the lawmakers want to go home.

Under the two committee chairmen—first Senator W. C. Clegg of Tennessee and now Herbert R. O'Connor of Maryland—some 23 anti-crime bills have been dumped into the legislative hopper. Hearings have been held on a few but none has been reported out by committee for floor action.

Some of the more notable bills go through in addition to the senate bills, there are 27 independent narcotics control bills before the house. Four tax reform measures aimed at criminal practices may go through as sections of general tax legislation.

Bills intended to tighten alien control will be made part of an omnibus immigration bill, but has little chance of passage this year. Against other anti-crime bills, there is such determined opposition that reform legislation may never get passed.

Most important of the crime committee proposals are two bills aimed at control over the transmission of gambling information. What the hearings disclosed above, everything else was that organized crime, since the days of prohibition, has moved into other fields. Evidence of the old Capone gang, now grown to really big business proportions, was found everywhere. It was in the black market during the war. It organized prostitution and narcotics sales. And it controlled gambling, with a gross take of \$20 billion a year.

Inherent in this business is the power to corrupt state and local governments, to push them around and to muscle into legitimate activities. It is in the black market during the war. At the center of this vast racing communications network is the senate crime committee. Whether it is in the form of a gambling operation and a monopoly protected by blackbacks. It services racing information to bookies at high rates. Furthermore, it makes "comeback" and "layoff" bets with such skill that it is impossible for the bookmakers to lose.

Last year, after a senate interstate commerce committee investigation, Sen. Ernest McFarland of Arizona introduced a bill to try to control this operation by making it a federal crime. It was to be enforced from track within one hour after a race. The measure was beaten.

Senator Kefauver has felt from the outset that a permanent federal crime commission should be created to keep a constant eye on criminal conditions in gambling. Its duty would be to call to the attention of congress and the White House any further reforms needed to assist the apparently never-ending war on crime.

WE NEED ENGINEERS

At the time the future broke over the government's controversial draft tests to determine deferments, a prime argument for the examinations was the need to assure the nation of sufficient trained scientific and medical personnel.

In its latest issue, Fortune magazine documents that need in just one field—engineering. According to Lawrence Lasing, one of its editors, industry needs 30,000 engineers a year for normal growth and replacements. Besides that, it currently has a deficit of 60,000 engineers.

Lasing found that the number of engineering graduates is expected to taper off from 25,000 next June to a possible low of 12,000 in 1954.

Engineering enrollments are down sharply, and there appears little that can be done about this critical shortage in the next few years. Fortune's analysts blame for the scarcity on:

The low birth rate of the 1920's; a "national lull" after World War I, marked by a turning away from "potentially destructive science"; the slowness of congress in establishing national science foundations to organize and direct basic research; and misleading government reports suggesting a surplus of engineers when the reverse was true.

A committee of congress has proposed a national scientific personnel board to help the President channel test results and direct critical areas of industry, government research, teaching and military service.

These seem sound proposals to deal with the immediate dearth of engineers. But attention must be given to the longer range problem of luring more American youths into engineering as a lifetime career.

DRAFTS—Mao Tse-tung periodically makes a demand that these funds be transferred to "a depository fund" that is a kind of Chinese government assets, and it belongs to him, inasmuch as he controls China. These drafts, naturally, bewilder the U. S. government.

If they turn over the money to Mao, and if he should be unseated through a Chiang Kai-shek victory, they would be in a hole. They would then have to pay twice, for Chiang would claim they were in honoring the red's drafts.

DILEMMA—The bankers have laid their problem before the state and the federal government. They have asked Secretary Acheson whether these deposits belong to Chiang or Mao.

It is a dilemma because the government is in exile on Formosa, and it is at war with the red regime. Acheson refuses to give an unequivocal answer. He says that he does not want to assume the responsibility in the financial field, although he now recognizes and farms Chiang.

His answer does not give the Chinese government a revolution or change of government in Latin American states. As a rule, state decides in favor of the government in power. But the China money problem is complicated because the penny deposits of Asia, Nicaragua.

When west coast politicians were invited to the luncheon, they wondered whether National Chairman Boyle was tapping them for a \$50 or a \$100 contribution to his political office, imagine their surprise when, the first item on the menu was a \$5000 check. Boyle notified them that he was picking up the \$5000 check. It is probably the first check he ever has picked up.

VIEWS OF OTHERS

A FINE PIECE OF WORK

For once the United States looked good in a diplomatic conference for which Secretary of State Acheson sent a message to the Philippines, where he did the advance work.

We not only refused to take reparations for damage suffered but we have and will continue to indemnify the Japanese, such as the Philippines, out of our own pockets. Knowing that Japan can't pay, unless we provide her the means of paying.

Only time will tell whether this great aim will be realized or whether it will come to grief like some of our previous efforts in this line. But it will stand for the long future as a magnificent example of enlightened self-interest, the hope of profiting by helping others to improve their lot. Training Autos Given to Schools in T. F. County

Twin Falls high school gives use of new Ford training autos to the T. F. County Safety League. The cars were donated by H. W. Hansen, manager of the Union Motors agency here.

Demand for training is greater than can be satisfied. According to Hansen, 41 students have enrolled in classes in Twin Falls, but the size of individual classes will have to be reduced when practical training starts. "We can't teach all the students who want the course and still meet state requirements," Hansen said.

Brown feels driver training is as useful as any other class in school because the students will put their knowledge to immediate use. He believes driving habits are formed and don't change thereafter, so favors teaching the proper habits early. Brown says statistics indicate 90 per cent of accidents are caused by inexperienced drivers.

Power Slash Order Slated In Northwest

PORTLAND, Sept. 13 (AP)—Power companies in the northwest are set to slash power rates this week, the Bonneville power administrator has announced.

Unless there is rain to increase the stream flow, users of interruptible power may start getting notices suggesting they arrange for steam-generated power if they want to continue using it.

Interruptible power is that which is not under firm contract with industrial users.

W. L. Maclell, assistant Bonneville administrator, advised the defense electric power administrator that he would be sent to customers who use some 200,000 kilowatts of power, unless the stream flow of the Columbia river.

The impending cut was announced earlier by Bonneville administrator Paul J. Sawyer. Ten of those who would be cut off include aluminum companies, pulp mills, and chemical plants, most to discuss the possibility of getting power generated by their own plants.

The Bonneville administrator also appealed for power on the grounds that they were essential to the defense program.

Alfred Corbett, attorney for the DEPA, said on a visit here some of those plants would continue to get interruptible power. But he said that cooperative power methods, such as a brown-out control, save enough power to keep more than a small amount going to aluminum plants.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (Special)—The return of 1,300 acres of land taken from the Nez Perce Indians of northern Idaho 10 years ago now is under consideration by the senate committee on interior affairs.

Sen. Herman Welker, R., Ida., introduced a resolution calling upon the federal government to quitclaim the land near Lewiston to the tribe. He hopes to get action on the matter before the end of the present session.

"After the Indian war of the 1870's, the land in question was appropriated temporarily by the government," known as the Post Legal reservation. It has recently been used as the site of the northern Idaho Indian agency.

Chief Joseph Blackledge, present leader of the Nez Perce and a descendant of Chief Joseph, visited Washington recently to confer with Welker on the problem.

"Most of the tract is good farm land," the Idaho senator said. "The Nez Perce are willing and able to make good use of it for the betterment of the tribe and its individual members."

Judge Avows Jury Had No Other Choice

BOISE, Sept. 13 (AP)—Federal Judge Chase A. Clark says the seven-man and five-woman jury that found a 21-year-old Idaho youth guilty of violation of the selective service act had no other alternative in its decision.

He made the statement yesterday in a lecture he "didn't intend to give," according to Fred C. Granden for denying "any obligation" (Granden) owe to this country.

Clark then sentenced the youth to two years and six months in a federal prison.

Objectioned on Beliefs.

Granden says he is a member of the followers of Christ church, whose religious beliefs did not call for military service. He had been classified by the Blaine-county draft board for non-combat duty and the jury found him guilty of failure to submit to induction.

The board didn't order you into battle, they gave you a non-combat classification, and you refused that . . . Clark said.

"I don't see how you can on your religious beliefs or your religion . . . I don't see how you can refuse to attend the draft . . ." Clark said.

Given Safety.

Commenting that Granden would be safe in a prison compared to Americans fighting in Korea, Clark said:

"I cannot punish you, there is no law to punish you like you. . . . All I can do is put you in a place where you will be well fed, you will have an opportunity for recreation, you will have a good place to sleep."

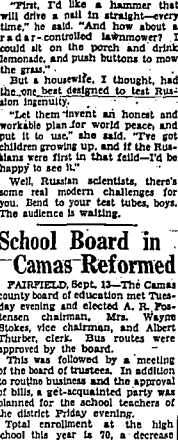

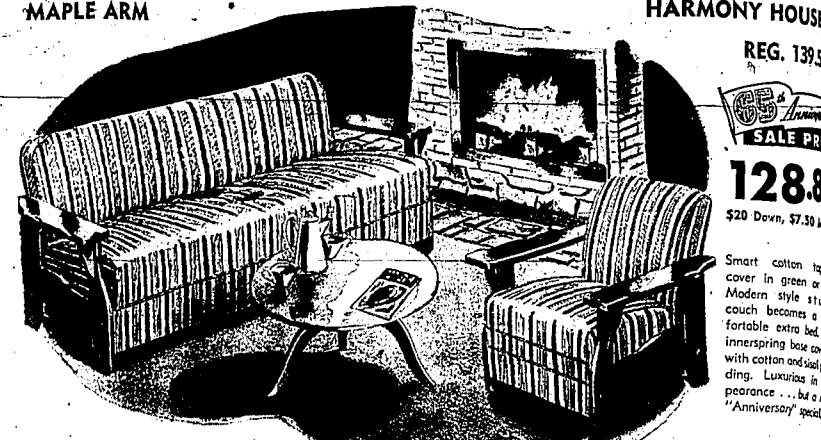

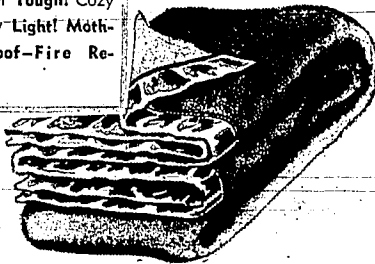

Persons who desire to work only Saturday and Sunday also can be placed, Cutler said.

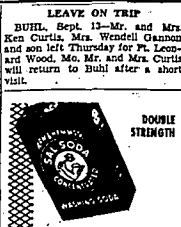

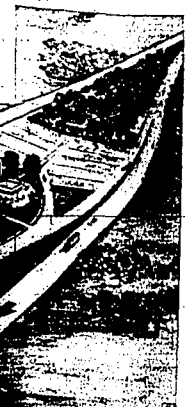

Filling stations and rest areas would be built between the traffic lanes so slow traffic could turn in without crossing the fast lane. Head-on collisions would be avoided by keeping fast lanes for sport, say



Revolutionary Highways Idea Seen as Answer to Accidents

BALTIMORE (AP)—An engineering firm has come up with what it believes is a revolutionary idea for stepping up safety on highway stretch-out roads.

It involves, primarily, the reversing of traffic flow. That is, you'd use lanes opposite from the ones you now use.

The scheme is the brain-child of John E. Greiner, Jr., a partner in the J. E. Greiner company, consulting engineers.

Although there's the question of public acceptance, the company says engineers in various highway departments have enthusiastically received the plan.

Here's the way it would work: "Visualize, for a moment, the traffic movement on today's super-highway. Let's say you're going west. In that case you'd use the northern lanes. Going east, you'd travel on the southern lanes.

Greiner's idea is to reverse this. Westbound, you'd use the southern lanes, eastbound, you'd use the northern lanes.

However, there'd be no change in the use of individual traffic lanes. That is, the right-hand lane would be the normal traffic lane and the left-hand lane would be the one for passing.

In addition, the plan involves the locating of service stations, restaurants, maintenance buildings and highway entrances and exits between the opposite lanes of traffic instead of on either side.

The scheme also includes the construction of an extra-wide strip between the opposing lanes, which would include a combination drainage ditch and vehicle "trap."

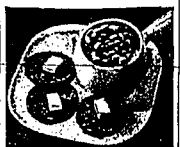
The Greiner company lists a number of advantages in the system.

First, it says it would completely eliminate accidents caused by

unauthorized left-hand turns. And it would reduce sharply the seriousness of accidents involving vehicles which accidentally cross into the lanes between the opposing lanes.

Motorists at times make unauthorized "right" turns on superhighways, crossing the median strip to get to a service station or restaurant on the opposite side of the highway. This involves pulling from the right-hand normal lane, into the passing lane, and then across the median strip and into the flow of opposing traffic.

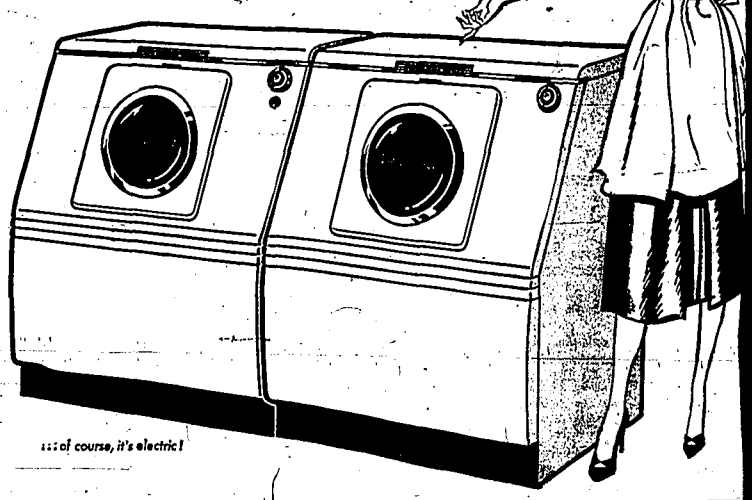

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School's Novel Experiment in One-Subject Plan Is Success

PORE UNION, Va.—Work Union Military academy has reduced the three R's to one—one at a time.

The academy is now starting its second year of operation under what its officials call the one-subject plan. In high school grades study a single subject for eight weeks. Completing this, a cadet goes on to another subject for eight weeks.

Results? "A great success," say academy officials.

Under this system the cadets "are learning how to concentrate and study," said Col. Harry M. Waldron, headmaster.

The day's schedule—8 a. m. to 1 p. m. is divided into four instruction periods and two study periods under supervision. At night, the cadets have supervised study periods in their quarters.

Four subjects are studied on this plan during the first four weeks of the school year. The remaining four-week period is utilized to permit a cadet to make up any failing work in order to receive a passing grade on a subject. Or, if his grades are high in all subjects, he is permitted to take an elective subject, such as radio electronics or basketball.

Headmaster Colonel Waldron says these results for the first year of the plan:

121 high school students, 101, or 83 per cent, made the honor-roll (meaning an average of A or B for the year) as subjects. The honor-roll mark was the highest in the academy's 53 years.

Lincoln Acts On '31 Levy

SHOSHONE, Sept. 13—Lincoln county commissioners met Monday to set on county tax levies for 1934. Other districts were granted written permission for additional time to certify their levies.

Education Board Will Allot Funds

BOISE, Sept. 13—The state board of education will meet here Friday and Saturday to approve appropriation of public school equalization and transportation funds to the school districts.

This has been announced by State Public Instruction Supt. Alton B. Jones. He said the funds will be distributed to the counties and by them to the school districts.

He said there will be some problems presented relative to the mothballing of facilities at Southern Idaho and Northern Idaho Colleges of Education.

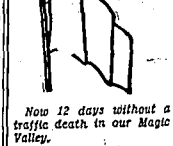

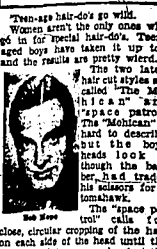

NATION'S HIGHWAY PROBLEM

Even if the United States had no rearmament program, its highway system today would be a shambles. But the defense effort has added a further handicap.

Highway officials fear that lack of steel for bridges and concrete reinforcement may reduce new road construction this year by a third. Hundreds of major projects already have been affected.

The highway problem has been growing steadily more acute each year. Neither new construction nor maintenance has kept pace with need.

But state and national lawmakers have not yet shown any disposition to vote that much money for roads. And, as noted in the beginning, the rearmament program would be a barrier today, no matter how much money is laid out.

The harsh fact is that highway deficiencies are likely to get worse. The 1951 traffic load is expected to be 10 percent heavier than the 1950's. Cars and trucks are bigger, faster, and far more numerous than ever.
