TORONTO, Canada (INPA)—Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip, her mother and father (she is in for a shock. For the Canada she'll see on her visit in October is a country that has dramatically changed from the Canada King George and Queen Elizabeth saw in 1939.

Their trip has been arranged so that Elizabeth and Philip will understand the Canada of 1951. It is a nation that has grown from under 13,000,000 to over 14,000,000 people in a dozen years. Much of that growth is new immigration from Europe, including tens of thousands of farmers and a liberal sprinkling of scientists and craftsmen.

The royal couple will see how Canada's northern frontier is gradually being pushed back. Flying over northern Manitoba, they'll see the new railroads pushing through the bush to serve strategic metal mines discovered only in the past two years. In northern Ontario, they'll see oil at the model pulp and paper mill town of Kapuskasing.

They'll be shown how Canada is

moving ahead industrially. From the air, they'll be able to see mammoth developments of post-war housing outside cities like Edmonton, Winnipeg and Montreal. Big modern factories dot the landscape on the outskirts of such cities.

Canada's expanding military establishment will also be shown to the future queen and her consort. They will visit army camps, air force bases and naval yards. They'll see the big jet aircraft plants at Montreal and Toronto, the naval shipbuilding yards on the St. Lawrence river and on the Pacific coast, and possibly the atomic energy plant at Chalk river, north of Ottawa.

And, like the king and queen in 1939, they'll tour veterans' hospitals. These, too, have greatly expanded in 17 years, to take care of the injured veterans of World War II and the Korean war.

But, on their coast-to-coast-and-back tour, they'll see what the average tourist wants to see, besides what the Canadian government wants them to see. From Niagara Falls to the Canadian Rockies, Elizabeth and Philip will do some first-class, western hemisphere rubber-necking.

They'll travel by boat, train, air and automobile. Most of this will be on regular commercial carriers. They'll arrive in Canada on the SS Empress of France and leave on the SS Empress of Canada, both com-

### Resident Among First to Donate To New Community Blood Bank Here

The hospital's varied laboratory activities. He praised the hospital staff, community support, clubs and organizations for getting the new system off to a good start.

Under the new system, potential donors register with clubs and other organizations in Mack Valley. These clubs have chairman contacted by the hospital to arrange appointments convenient to the prospective donors. The various club chairmen contact the number of donors required at the hospital.

This system replaces the blood bank system used in the old hospital. Under the arrangement, patients needing blood were required to pay a fee. It was up to them or their relatives to find donors to replace the blood which they required. When the blood was replaced, the fee was returned.

Under the new system, there will be no fee for the blood—only a service charge for the transfusion itself. The new arrangement also will eliminate the confusion caused by an appeal to the public for certain types of blood. In this case, prospective donors can call the hospital without any particular system being followed.

Dr. Creed explains it is the aim of Twin Falls county to have a self-sustaining hospital, hence citizens are urged to donate blood to the bank. The hospital guild has contacted the various clubs to arrange donation schedules. All donors are given a beverage and a doughnut to give them a little energy booster after the blood has been donated.

According to Dr. Creed, 1,800 donors from several hundred different organizations already are on file. Under the system, blood will be on hand so that it can be taken to the patient immediately, rather than having what could be a costly delay during a public appeal for a donor.

All types of blood will be taken in the donations, and with sufficient donors, no individual contributor will be called frequently.

Prospective donors fill out a questionnaire to determine the physical fitness as donors. This is studied by Dr. Creed prior to the donation. The new system is followed by the larger blood banks of the nation, according to Doctor Creed. It provides blood as needed for any and all patients.
