# Only 3 State Jailbreakers Plude Police

Sept. 17 (AP)—Seven of the 10 federal prisoners held out by the Canyon county jail Saturday were squeezed back in, and the search goes on the remaining three.

It was not an organized search. Roadblocks remained set Sheriff Ray Luuekenge figured the men, two of whom probably have slipped through the police net.

They were alerted last night as a man answering questions of James H. Casena, 21, one of the men still free, was reported seen near Salt Lake City. He was thought to be armed, and was termed "dangerous."

Fred B. Grath, 31, was the latest to be reported seen. He popped to freedom through a jail ventilator the size of a sheet of typing paper. The Sheriff of who was convicted of assault and robbery in Japan, was captured last night near the stockyards where he had hidden since the break.

Moss Guards — As they were picked up singly and in pairs, the "troublemaking" convicts were being bedded down some collock from which they broke out. More guards were present, but they were not present.

The men, about 100, were transferred from Leavenworth, Kans., to McNeil Island, Wash., had been held in the jail since they broke out last night in the jail. After supper, they removed a 7 1/2 by 12 inch ventilator from the wall, and stomachs, struggled through this hoopering aperture.

## State Hits Overloads On Roads

BOISE, Sept. 17 (AP)—A get-tough policy on highway overloads is being announced today by State Highway Engineer Earle V. Miller.

He said it will be a firm policy of state highway department not to post any more heavy loads in excess of legal limits. Added Miller, the department intends to "strictly enforce" the load law.

Had Been Exposed — In the future, under other regulations, the department occasionally relaxed enforcement of the load law, but it is now being enforced for loads in excess of legal limits. Miller made public the department's get-tough policy in a statement made today.

It said: "It will be the policy of the Idaho state highway department to post all state highways requiring protection from heavy loads in excess of legal limits. These postings will supersede all previous postings and strictly enforce the load law."

No Exceptions — "It will further be the policy of the department to not post any state highway under any circumstances in excess of legal limits as defined by chapters 2 and 317, Idaho code annotated, or to post any load in excess of legal limits as to height, width, length and weight. Checking and weighing stations are being installed on all highways throughout the state. All matters necessary to accomplish enforcement will be effective Jan. 1, 1952."

# Ridgway and U. N. Chiefs Sift Strategy

TOKYO, (Tuesday), Sept. 18 (AP)—Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, supreme United Nations commander, conferred with allied military chieftains in Korea Monday after telling the communists he was ready to resume cease-fire negotiations.

He was announced late last night that Ridgway had returned at 9 p. m. Monday, (MST) from Korea. Until then nothing was known publicly here or in Seoul, the South Korean capital, of his visit.

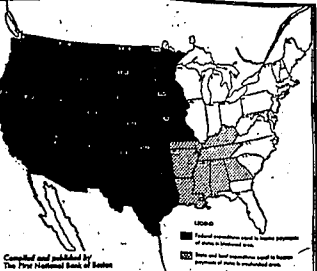

### Test Near on Atom Charge For Missiles

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17 (AP)—Atomic warheads may be ready for the air force's new guided missile program by the time it makes its "fantastic new weapons."

Despite official secrecy, there were indications today that the atomic energy commission has turned out production models of missile warheads for testing even at the AEC proving grounds in Nevada.

"Fleeting Bomber"  
The air force disclosed last week that it will put in operation Oct. 1 the first "fleeting bomber" squadron in U.S. history. For the time being it will be equipped with the supersonic rocket-powered "Matador," a jet-propelled guided missile.

The Matador is believed to be capable of carrying an atomic warhead in its explosive nose. President Truman said it is one of the "fantastic new weapons" he referred to in a recent speech.

Tactical Use  
The new missile is designed for tactical battlefield use. But rocket-driven bombers of much greater range are being developed for long-range strategic targets behind enemy lines.

In announcing the new missile squadron, the air force—in an apparent bid to even more fantastic weapons to complement the unit—will be equipped "initially" with Matadors.

Expensive Program  
It previously had been disclosed that the armed forces will spend around \$1,000,000 this year on several different kinds of guided missiles, strategic and tactical.

The AEC is believed to have in production's already compact A-bombs for delivery by light aircraft, including the carrier craft. These weapons—supplementing the huge bigger bombs in the atomic arsenal—could be used tactically or strategically.

### Idaho Crops Show Drops, Report Says

BOISE, Sept. 17 (AP)—Idaho's 1951 production of fall lettuce is forecast at 154,000 crates compared with 154,000 crates for the 1949-1950 average.

Although yields per acre are slightly above those of last year, the crop is limited to 1,600 acres—about 35 per cent of 1950, the U.S. department of agriculture disclosed today.

Corn state-wide production is estimated at 2,030,000 bags of 56 pounds—20,000 bags less than last month. The yield of 100 bags is 10 less than forecast in August.

Production of sweet corn for processing is estimated at 60,000 tons compared with 51,000 last year and 57,000 for the 1949-1950 average.

This year's yield of 3.4 tons per acre is the same as the 10-year average, but slightly less than last year.

The department forecast Idaho's dry crop at 1,030,000 hundred weight—19 per cent more than the 1950 crop but 40 per cent less than the 1949-1950 average. Yield per acre is estimated at 1,400 pounds.

### Decline Is Noted In Regular Staff Of U. S. Workers

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 17**—The permanent staff of federal executive agencies declined by more than 94,000—about six per cent—during the year ended June 30, the civil service commission said today.

Most appointments to federal jobs since the start of the defense boom have been made to avoid the problems encountered in cutting the permanent staff of the federal agencies back to peace time size after the last war, it is explained.

On June 30, only 60 per cent of federal workers held a permanent civil service appointment, and 20 per cent held indefinite appointments. The remaining 10 per cent were appointed for short temporary periods or were outside the competitive system.

In June, 1950, 83 per cent were permanent and only six per cent indefinite.
