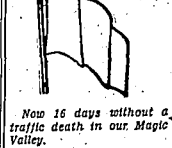

INGLEWOOD, Calif., Sept. 18 (AP)—Robert M. Hatfield, Jr., vice chairman of the defense department's munitions board, said today the "salvatory of agony" building must continue until there is "genuine evidence" Russia has abandoned its plans for world conquest.

Hatfield told a Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce procurement luncheon at the Hollywood Park Turf club Russia and her communist satellites are "powerful, relentless and ruthless" in their determination to "dominate the whole world."

The free world will be safe from communist aggression only if it demonstrates it has sufficient military power to deter Russia or defeat her if she plunges the world into another war, he said.

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AFTER IT'S TOO LATE

Is just so happened last week that several hundred citizens in which two lives would have been saved if a public relation than probably would have resulted had these victims been killed...
We are so accustomed to killings on Magic Valley's highways that we have become more or less calloused to any real feeling for the dead...
In this case, the public was moved by the thought of misery, misfortune and suffering. One of the victims, although not seriously hurt, happened to be blind. The other lost one of his arms when hit by a car driven by a drunken driver...
The public for once was truly aroused, because these two instances played on sympathy—sympathy for the living...
In the case of the man who lost his arm, it even aroused Justice of the Peace J. O. Pumphrey to impose his first maximum sentence in the history of the county...
This case calls for the maximum sentence. By your action and consent you have disregarded a human being, brought him mental and physical suffering and traveled a burden and handicap upon a fellow traveler of the highways, notwithstanding the great expense it will have to bear without any compensation whatsoever...
We believe Justice Pumphrey was quite right in handing down the maximum sentence in this particular instance, because it will serve as an example for all other drivers who persist in driving recklessly, without due regard for others...
It is our hope, however, that this will give the victim back his arm. And this brings us to the point of our editorial. In extreme cases, after the damage is done or the life is lost, it is only logical that the guilty parties should pay the maximum sentence. But we wish there was more determined effort to prevent such accidents in the first place, to prevent as much of this death and destruction as possible...
The potential killers, those who defy all the traffic laws, who should be cracked down before they do injury or kill someone...
We have observed, however, that Justice Pumphrey hesitates to deal harshly with them. He's more inclined to be lenient...
It's in those states where they are striving for prevention by cracking down hard on violations—states such as Pennsylvania for instance—where they are actually getting results. They think of results only in terms of saving people's arms, legs and lives...
OUTLOOK FOR JAPAN
Anyone who imagines everything in the Far East is going to be in the hands of the Japanese peace treaty has been signed has another thought coming. If not the worst, there is at least plenty of pay yet to come...
Everything will have to go on as usual till the treaty is ratified by the governments of the countries whose foreign ministers signed it. In the case of the United States, that means the treaty has to be ratified by the U. S. senate...
There is a little chance the senate will get around to hearings and ratification before the scheduled Oct. 1 adjournment. That means the matter will be held over as unfinished business for the new session convening in January, 1952...
There is a provision in the treaty that it must be ratified within nine months by a majority of the signers. That would put the date off till July, 1952. If not ratified by a majority then individual countries may separately ratify this or any other treaty suitable to the Japs...
Even if the San Francisco conference had blown wide open, the United States would probably have made a separate peace with Japan. The U. S. had already begun to relieve Japan of some responsibilities as a defeated enemy and an occupied country...
The purpose of this was to help prepare Japan to stand on its own feet, economically. For several years, maybe longer, this is going to be nip and tuck...
Where the rub comes is that Japan's whole trade pattern has to be readjusted. Before the war, Japan sold silk to the U. S. and wool cloth by synthetic. But Japan still needs cotton...
Before the war, Japan got iron ore and coking coal from China and Manchuria. Those sources of supply are now out of Japan. They will have to buy from Canada or the U. S. Coal will be higher and dollar exchange will be required to make payments...
The problem this presents is the same as the European trade problem. The United States must increase its exports from Japan, or else figure on some kind of a semi-annual program. The peace treaty will merely make Japan a new economic frontier. Japan can't be turned loose if it's going down the economic drain...

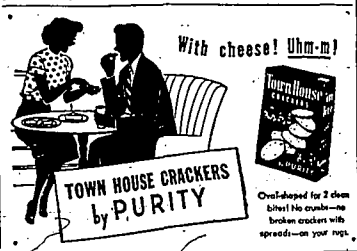

\$443,717 Said State Cost for Road Clearing

BOISE, Sept. 18 (AP)—It cost the state highway department \$443,717 to keep Idaho roads free of snow and ice last winter.

Highway Engineer Earle V. Miller reported today \$431,254 was spent for snow and ice removal and \$12,463 for sanding key routes.

The winter maintenance cost was less than the two preceding winters, but higher than the winters of 1947-1948 and 1948-1949. Costs for the past winters amounted to \$473,528 for 1948-1949, \$522,153 for 1946-1947 and \$474,948 for 1947-1948 and \$274,153 for 1946-1947.

Crews Ready

State highway department crews are ready to break the snowdrifts again this winter with 152 heavy trucks and additional equipment.

Miller said the snow removal and sanding crews operated on 4,403 miles of state roads and 45 miles of road not on the state highway system last winter. They involved 2,300 men and 100,000 gallons of fuel, the road to Atlanta in Emvor and Ada counties, the Siltwater road and one to Warren in Valley county.

Largest snow removal and sanding programs were carried on in eastern Idaho—highway districts five and six.

history both as to medical progress and as to the highlights.

After Mrs. Hogsett described the work of the primitive medicine man in impressing the gods or frightening away the evil spirits, Mrs. Malcolm Sawyer modeled the garb of a medicine man.

Costume Shown
The Egyptian dynasties of 5000 years ago constituted the first written records in the history of medicine, the narrator explained. The grand oldenness of this period was reflected in the costume modeled by Mrs. George Brown.

Mrs. Hogsett modeled Hippocrates as the father of medicine, stressing the moral influence he brought to the field of medicine and the fact that physicians of today take his oath. Mrs. Max Carter modeled the easy Greek gown to illustrate the dress of that period.

From early Greece, the scene shifted to the century Arabs, two philosophers, Avicenna and Rhazes, developed the use of drugs, creating surgery to be inferior to medicine. The first descriptions of diseases and the first medical text books modeling a costume of this period was Mrs. Mackey E. Brown.

First Experiment
Jumping into the middle ages in Europe, the narrator cited Galen, medicine's first experimenter, whose textbooks still were in use 1500 years later. He recognized tuberculosis as an infection and wrote a classical description of influenza.

Mrs. N. L. Larsen, Flier, modeled the drab all-covering costume of this period featuring a wimple over her head, neck and chin. Mrs. Hogsett narrated many footnotes of fashion along with the historical milestones of medical history.

The next period dealt with the renaissance, in which medical education was revived by Paracelsus the critic along lines of tests and observation instead of the old superstitions. A striking richly decorated renaissance costume was modeled by Mrs. David McCusky and the narrator pointed out tissue paper had its origin in keeping the metallic decoration from tarnishing.

Physician Gled
The next period dealt with the renaissance, in which medical education was revived by Paracelsus the critic along lines of tests and observation instead of the old superstitions. A striking richly decorated renaissance costume was modeled by Mrs. David McCusky and the narrator pointed out tissue paper had its origin in keeping the metallic decoration from tarnishing.

The scene changed to England of Elizabethan days when William Harvey began his studies of circulation of the blood. Mrs. Carl Irwin modeled an Elizabethan costume with an exaggerated hoop skirt and the first pumps.

Featured next was Thomas Sydenham of 17th century England first to use clinical instruction methods to effect old superstitions as science began in the harvest years of the renaissance. The Puritan influence was modeled in the 17th century English costume worn by Mrs. Vern Anderson, Flier.

Turning to the next century, the narrator described the work of John Hunter in basing surgery on pathology and physiology. He took surgery out of the barber shop. Mrs. Hogsett said, explaining the red stripe on present day barber's coats goes back to the bloodstained days.

Mrs. Harry Eston modeled an 18th century English costume reflecting the first usage of white in clothing, started the century before. The 18th century in England saw Edward Jenner's development of vaccination against the then inevitable smallpox. Mrs. Hogsett described how the Spaniards carried the live vaccine across the Atlantic to the lands where they had taken smallpox 300 years earlier. A 18th century English costume, striking in its simplicity, was modeled by Mrs. Frank McAtee.

Across the channel, Napoleon's physician, Crovisart, developed the use of "chert thumping" to disperse ing diseases. Illustrating the dress of the period, Mrs. O. J. Bohne modeled an Empire Josephine gown, rich and purple.

Shift to New World
Shifting to the new world, the narrator described the work of William Beaumont in studying the chemical processes of digestion and the interdependence of any one organ on all others. Appearing in the crinoline and flounces of the

GOP Leader Raps Truman Drive Tactics

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18 (AP)—Republican National chairman, Charles McNary, today rapped the "give 'em hell" type of political campaign—such as President Truman's conducted in 1946—amounts to "mean politics."

Speaking before a senate election subcommittee studying ways to improve the conduct of election campaigns, McNary raised these questions:

"Is it defamatory or scurrilous for a presidential candidate in 1946 to tell a Minnesota audience that Republicans in congress are the errand boys of big business and special privilege?"

Questions Talked

"How should we characterize this same candidate's speech in Chicago on Oct. 22, 1946, when we were told that 'powerful reactionary forces' wanted to destroy our freedom."

McNary said that his rival was a political Hitler?

As for the 1946 campaign, McNary told the senate:

"I can not make perfectly clear our determination to account all of the 'give 'em hell' election with all of the issues, including communism and corruption. It won't be necessary to combat the distortions of the left's truth of the record."

"Character Assassination"

"If this candidate's political assassination," he continued, alluding to a recent phrase used by Mr. Truman, someone more worthy should cast the first stone."

"What is 'mean politics' but the 'give 'em hell' technique?" he asked. "Many times in President Truman's 1946 stump speeches, persons applauding his caustigation of the Republican Party in the cry of 'give 'em hell, Harry' and it has become identified with his race of that year."
