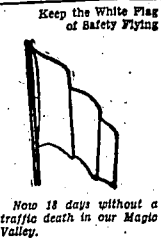

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# Aptitude Test Being Started For Students

Employment security agency vocational aptitude tests for high school students are starting this fall instead of next spring. It was announced Thursday by Ronald R. Cutler, local manager.

The tests are given Thursday to Jerome high school students by Joseph Weidner, counselor stationed here with guidance duties in Twin Falls, Jerome, Cassia and Minidoka counties.

Attends More Time: Cutler said the tests are being given at the start instead of the end of the school year to allow seniors more time to think about vocations in terms of their aptitudes, employment opportunities, wages and required training.

"Crusade for Freedom is one of several successful organizations devoted to combat communism," Nielsen said. "Through a program of propaganda and information, many unenlightened people have been given the strength to resist its progress effectively."

"The Twin Falls Bank and Trust company considers it a privilege and an obligation to support a group such as this, dedicated to the purpose of suppressing the threat of communism in the world, and which has evidenced such a high degree of success in its efforts."

The schedule of Crusade for Freedom motorcade appearances in Magic Valley was announced Thursday by Ivan Skinner, county chairman for the crusade, who said the motorcade will be in Magic Valley Thursday and Friday, and in the week-end at Boise and in Magic Valley all next week.

**I. F. Reaction Varies in Rent Curbs Ruling**

IDAHO FALLS, Sept. 20 (AP)—The Twin Falls municipal council today agreed generally the imposing of rent controls in this area, but varied in some aspects, but differed on the extent of the impact.

Resolutions are to be rolled back as of July 1, 1950, according to Tighe E. Woods, rent stabilization director.

L. E. Johnson, Idaho ABC operations manager, and A. W. Brunt, president of the Idaho Real Estate Board, expressed belief rents generally have not increased the past year, and in some cases, have lowered. They believed the sharp rises took place immediately after the city council banned rent controls during the spring of 1949.

Mayor E. W. Fanning and John Homer, president of the Idaho Falls Real Estate Board, and the Idaho Brokers board, agreed the effect would not be drastic. But they declared it would work a hardship on several cases. They stated rents on a number of homes and apartments were increased within the past year.

Homer pointed out that under the rent control law the city council is empowered and has control even though the national director invokes them. He also noted that the controls do not apply to new homes.

He said the most impact would be the curtailment of new home construction. Prospective builders, he explained, do not desire to erect new homes or apartments under a rental control situation.

Brunt commented that a comparatively large vacancy factor last winter forced lower rents at many points.

Completion of the 300 new Bel Air homes, declared Homer and Brunt, will fill pressing needs.

Building records show about 1,000 new homes were built last year and 500 are completed or proposed for this year.

and the whole nonsense by dropping a string of atom bombs.

Well, to those who cried nonsense, I still recall saying, "Wait until we have had 50,000 casualties. That got a big laugh at the time. But today we have had more than 80,000 confirmed casualties in Korea, and that is no figure to laugh at."

I spent six bitter months there and saw some of those men become casualties, from fighting and frostbite.

Some of the American deaths and maimings, I cannot but feel, came from the failure of the U. N. to use the available weapon of decision, I mean the atom bomb.

This week a U. S. senator said it was possible to mass-produce atom bombs now at a price making a single atom bomb less expensive than a tank.

Also, bombs even a year ago were so plentiful they could have been given to the Koreans. Certainly they are available today.

### Filer Officer Is First to Land From 'Copter on Korea Peak

EASTERN FRONT, Korea, Sept. 20 (AP)—Giant helicopters lifted a company of battle-weary soldiers onto a rugged mountain on the eastern front today.

It was the first time helicopters have moved troops into combat. The job was done without loss of a single man or plane.

It would have taken two days to climb the mountain and occupy it. But in four hours the giant Sikorski H-19s landed a reinforced marine company and supplied it with food and ammunition.

A helicopter even airtel- phone lines linking the almost inaccessible hill with nearby headquarters in the rear.

In all, the copters delivered (combat) personnel and (combat) gear to the mountain which is not accessible by road.

Lt. R. L. Johnson, Pter. Id., was the first man to alight down a rope from a helicopter and land on the 3,000-foot peak.

The first six helicopters hovered about eight feet above the mountain while marines climbed down cleared 25-foot square landing areas. The remaining 16 helicopters landed to clear their men and gear.

The marines were landed within sight of communist-held hills but were not fired on.

The copters took an average of 20 seconds to land, unload and take off again. Each helicopter made several trips.

The big machines used today can carry as many as 10 men each.

### England Buys Oil From Red Nation

LONDON, Sept. 20 (AP)—Great Britain, cut off from its main source of oil in Iran, has made a deal to buy 200,000 tons of oil from communist Romania; it was disclosed today.

The deal was made by the government-owned Anglo-Iranian Oil company, whose immediate interests in Iran have been nationalized.

It was understood the price would be \$1,000,000 (\$2,000,000).

### Attlee Starts Labor Party Bid on Votes

LONDON, Sept. 20 (AP)—Prime Minister Attlee today launched the Labor party's campaign for the Oct. 23 general election today by telling the House of Commons that it will go "backward with the conservatives or forward with labor."

At the same time Winston Churchill and his conservatives, sensing victory for the Tories in the air, began shaping their election strategy.

See Good Sign  
Conservatives considered a good omen the development of the Labor party's bid on votes on the London stock market in the wake of Attlee's broadcast announcement that the government would be ending six years of socialistic rule.

Attlee spoke to reporters before starting an autumn trip to North Berwick, Scotland, where he will address a Scottish Labor party conference Saturday.

Great Party Line  
He laid down what is likely to be the Labor party line in the campaign:

The Labor party will go to the country with confidence. For six years under the leadership of the labor government the British people have carried through an immense task of social and economic reconstruction.

The government has played a leading part in the promotion of peace in cooperation with all the free people.

The conservatives have constantly belittled these achievements. They have no alternative policy. All they can do is to oppose.

No fair minded man can deny that the mastery of this people of this country are better off and more secure than when the conservatives ruled.

### Solons to Hear Idaho Mining Complaints at Hailey Meeting

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (Special)—Members of congress will hear complaints of the Idaho mining industry at the mine operator's conference in Hailey next month, Rep. Hanger Budge said today.

The congressman said many mine operators have informed him that they will have to close down unless present selling prices on lead and zinc are lifted.

"Mexican lead, produced by cheap labor, is now selling at 21.00 cents a pound," Budge declared. "World prices on lead and zinc are even higher, but the OPG ceiling prices are 17 and 17.5 cents, respectively."

The OPG metals and mining chief, Sam Ewing, has announced ceilings will be held even if world prices hit 30 cents. With U. S. production cut, Budge predicted, the government probably will be forced to subsidize purchases for defense manufacturers here unless the OPG relents.

"Chairman John Murdock, D. Minn., has assured me that members of the house interior and transfer affairs committee will be present at Hailey," the Idahoan said. "I am sure we can get action when the facts of the situation are known."

### Policy Is Justified By Soviet Threat, Taft Says in Talk

ST. PAUL, Minn., Sept. 20 (AP)—Senator Taft, R., O., said today American foreign policy in the present emergency can be justified only because of the "Russian threat."

"The various programs into which we have been forced," he said in a speech prepared for a businessmen's luncheon, "should be re-examined the moment the Russian threat relaxes, and abandoned unless they are in accord with our permanent interests."

Taft, chairman of the senate Republican policy committee, said current programs—such as defense alliances, economic and military aid to other free peoples, and extensive rearmament at home—do not warrant the possible danger of war with Russia.

But, he added, there seems to be no alternative in view of the fanatical spirit of communism and the truculent manner in which Russia itself conducts its foreign policy.

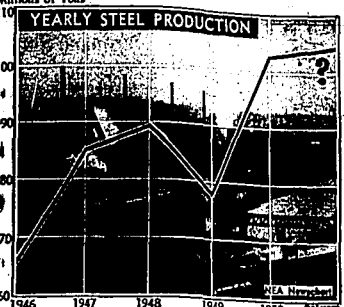

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# Any Doubt on Flying Saucer? Here Is Proof of One Passing Scientific Test

NEW YORK, Sept. 20 (AP)—A "flying saucer" that passed a scientific test is described in "700 Miles Up," a book on conquest of the upper air.

The author is J. Gordon Veach, U. S. navy aeronautical engineer. He does not claim the thing was a saucer, but he does not know what it was. It happened on April 24, 1949, and Veach says this is the first time the details have been published.

He describes the flying saucers which fooled thousands—namely the new skyhook balloons. The skyhooks were fooled aviators.

"Saucer" personnel," he writes, "had come more or less to the conclusion that their skyhooks were the primary source of saucer sightings. They accordingly placed their stock in these reported sightings; that is to say, they took little stock in them until April 24, 1949."

On that day Veach was one of the officers in charge of a skyhook balloon flight from White Sands, N. M. Skyhooks are instrument-carrying balloons, for observations at about 15 miles altitude.

Some distance from White Sands Charles B. Moore, Jr., an aviator, engineer and balloonist, set up a station to observe weather and upper winds as an aid to the skyhook.

night. Four enlisted men completed his party.

Moore sent up a weather balloon, watching it with a 25-power telescope, an M-47 theodolite, to track balloons. After 10 minutes, he took his eyes from the telescope, for a naked-eye look at his balloon.

He saw a white object which was not his balloon. He turned the telescope on it and saw an ellipsoid about two-and-a-half times as long as it was wide. It was gleaming white. It did not have a metallic shine. Toward the underside, near the tail, the gleaming white became a lighter yellow.

The sky was cloudless, there was no haze, no report of trail or exhaust from the thing, nor any noise of any kind.

Yet it was traveling too fast to get a hard clear focus in the telescope to see details.

This amazing feat developed later, namely that this thing probably was many miles up. It could not have been a balloon moving on the course it followed, unless it was higher than 17 miles, for the lower winds were not blowing in the direction this thing traveled.

The winds below 17 miles were in a southerly direction, but the thing moved, first out of the south, then turned north, and then made a sharp climb up out of sight.

It was in sight for about one minute, its course was traced scientifically with the theodolite.

"It represents," Veach writes, "one of the best substantiated and authentic unidentified object sightings on record."
