**W. J. Adams, Boise,** assistant director of the Idaho employment security agency, and **A. D. Beaman, Boise,** superintendent of the Idaho office, arrived in Twin Falls today for a time study made at the agency offices throughout the state.

The study is made for budget purposes, Beaman explained, on the basis of justifying requests against work loads and ensuring funds are spent to the best advantage.

Beaman said that the study is being made in the agency's major offices throughout the state.

For the past two weeks all employees at the local office have kept track of the amount of time they have spent in taking calls, placing job applicants, conferring with employers and handling other duties. **Donald C. Cutler, local manager,** said the study so far has shown some interesting results.

The information produced in the study is being reviewed by Adams and Beaman. It was there that the study was made during a period of high activity in the unemployment placement program. To acquire uniform sampling, another study is planned for the first of the year in agricultural job placements.

### Young Driver Study Results Noted in Talk

**Vern Hulbert** gave teen-aged drivers a word of encouragement Wednesday as the Rotary club's September program of traffic safety education moved into its third week. "During the past few years," Hulbert said, "millions of motorists have poured forth in condemnation of the teen-aged driver. Actually, there are valid indications that a lot of this vitriolic criticism is unjustified in the light of actual facts and figures."

**Study Reviewed**—Hulbert cited conclusion of a traffic-accident investigation study recently conducted by the New York University center for safety education and the Connecticut motor vehicle department as one basis for the current change of opinion in favor of the younger driver.

On an examination of the conclusions reached in this study," he said, "it would appear that the accident experience of the teen-aged driver compares quite favorably with the 20 to 25-year group."

**Warnings Given**—Hulbert warned teen-agers, however, that conclusions are not necessarily true in all states, at all times, with all types of young drivers selected at random.

"In the final analysis," he said, "it is up to the teen-aged driver himself to disprove by performance the reputation his group has of being costly, irresponsible and reckless."

**Caution Urged**—"Caution, courtesy and just plain good sense on the part of the young driver, plus supervised driver education, will do much to improve the record of the teen-agers to an even greater degree than has already been noted."

The Rotary club's September traffic safety education program this month deals with both child safety and the improvement of young drivers. It is being conducted in cooperation with the National Safety Council and the efforts of the two groups are being coordinated in Twin Falls by the Twin Falls Safety Council.

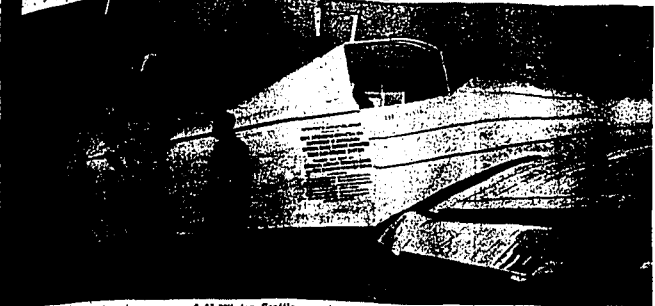

### Inspectors, Pilots Inspect New Airplane Designed for Dusting Crops, Spraying

Inspection of the craft's features were made by J. R. Douglas, entomologist in charge of the local station of the U. S. bureau of entomology and plant quarantine, and his personnel as well as representatives of other farm agencies.

A large number of farmers came from Magic Valley and eastern Idaho to see the plane and compare its features with those available in more standard types of aircraft used in agricultural work.

Twin Falls was one of 65 towns in the United States and three in Idaho chosen on the itinerary of the evaluation tour for the airplane. The towns for demonstration were chosen on a basis of their agricultural needs and their dusting and spraying activities.

The plane was brought here by H. P. Hill, assistant to the regional CAA administrator, and all regional officials in charge of aviation safety. Hill described the craft as a "flying test bed" and not a prototype.

Hill quoted CAA Administrator G. P. Horns as saying: "In this, the CAA is more than an interested spectator. The CAA desires not only to promote safety, but we want to see that the new agricultural tool, the airplane, does the best job possible and is utilized to the fullest extent possible."

"The plane not only can do a job no other machine can do, but in these days of manpower shortage, it can do many jobs in a much shorter time which otherwise might be only half done, or done not at all."

The plane was designed to fly with heavy loads from unprepared fields. It fly low over crops at relatively low speed, and climb over obstacles and turn back quickly for the next pass. It climbs at the rate of 600 feet per minute.

It is a single plane, cantilever, low wing, all-metal monoplane with a 30-foot wingspread. It has a 27-cubic-foot dust hopper in its fuselage and has a gross weight of 3,400 pounds. Wing tanks hold 150 gallons of spray fluid.

It provides an exceptional field of view for the pilot, particularly forward and downward while in flight. For protection against electric wire it contacted in flight, the plane has sharpened landing gear legs, guide tubes over the cockpit and a cable from the cockpit to the top of the fin.

A special safety seat, belt and shoulder harness, as well as cockpit placement, provide additional protection for the pilot in event of a crash.

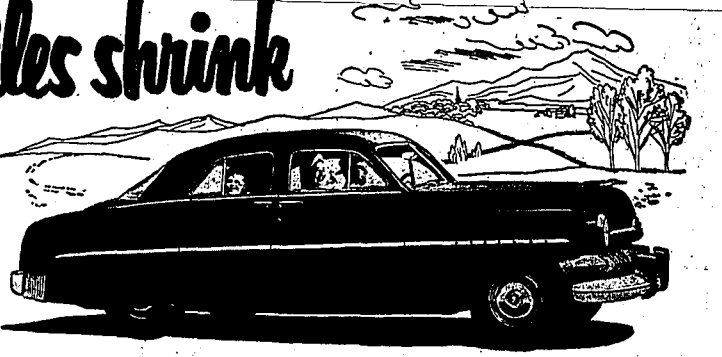

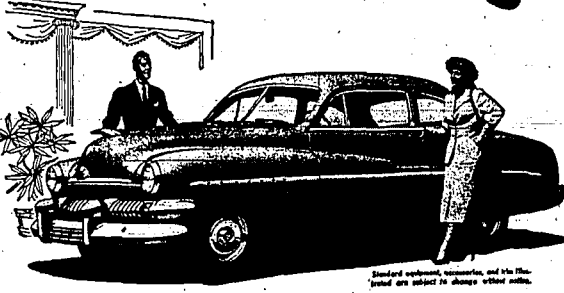

### AFL Desires Labor Unity; Keeps Chiefs

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 25 (AP)—The American Federation of Labor went into its 75th year today supporting a broad-based labor unification—and with the same officers which have guided its recent history.

Delegates to the AFL's 70th annual convention late next year unannounced re-elected President William Green to his 25th successive year. Thirtynine vice presidents and 1300 members of the executive committee also were given unanimous support for another year in office.

New York was named 1957 convention city.

On the policy side, the 5,000,000 member group—largest in American labor—adopted a resolution calling for organic unity with other American unions.

Although it called for meetings with CIO leaders to the two big (the CIO has an estimated 10,000,000 members here), it made it clear the union must be the AFL's terms.

"The AFL means whoever," the resolution stated, "for any bona-fide free trade union organization working for the benefit of the AFL."

Talks broken

Unity talks initiated by CIO President Philip Murray, broke down last week because of the organization's insistence on unification in program first—and the AFL insisted on membership first.

Unions conceded there was small possibility the CIO would accept the program as it stands. But the AFL executive board was empowered to begin negotiations.

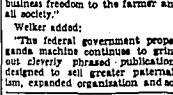

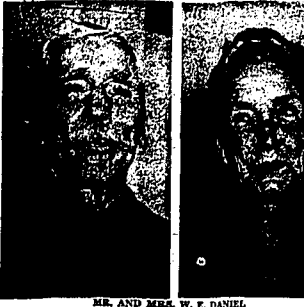

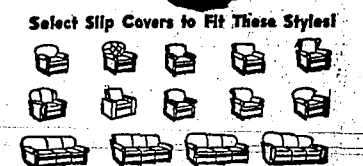
