Arriving at the Hotel de Spencer, we found about 40 good, bad and indifferent men seated on benches on either side of several long tables, eating their supper with coats off and hats on hair uncombed, unshaven, some with some sober, some of the roughest specimens of the town, yet a sprinkling of knights-errant was there. When I appeared one after another, in recognition and respect for political intrusion, jerked off his hat and thrust it under the table or under himself.

1. President Truman to win the Democratic nomination again next year.
2. Senator Taft, Ohio, to capture the Republican nomination.
3. But Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, if he became the standard bearer of either party, could defeat either Truman or Taft.

The poll was made on the basis of returns from half the 350 managing editors attending a four-day convention in San Francisco.

Neither Governor Dewey, New York, the 1948 GOP candidate, nor Harold Blasen, president of the University of Pennsylvania, figured in this poll.

The leading "beat bet" as a dark-horse candidate was Gov. Earl Warren, California, with 54 votes.

PUBLICITY OUTBURSTS

Contradictory statements by headline hunting members of congress are one of the principal causes of all the current confusion in Washington and over the country.

One of the chief offenders in this respect is Senator McMahon of Connecticut.

His periodical announcements are played heavily by capitol hill reporters only because he happens to be the chairman of the congressional atomic energy committee. Actually, he knows no more of atomic developments than the humblest member of that body. But he uses the chairmanship to hit the front page every so often.

One year ago, Mr. McMahon proposed that the United States spend \$50,000,000,000 in a great peace crusade. At the rate of \$50,000,000 a year for 10 years, or about \$5,000,000,000 for five, the U. S. should finance every country in the world in peaceful pursuits, including Russia. He argued that this amount would be far less than the cost of another global war.

Now, however, he urges that the U. S. abandon its conventional weapons, and spend \$5,000,000,000 annually on atomic preparation alone. Again, he points out, this outlay would save billions by the economy it would permit in the military armaments race.

How can the American people, or our allies or enemies overseas, make head or tail of American policy and plans, in view of such a shift within one year? And it must be remembered that the chairman of such a committee has far more prestige at home and abroad than he rates.

It should also be noted that neither of the McMahon proposals has the approval of the White House, state or defense officials. In fact they were—and are—blatant opposites to both his suggestions. They resent his frequent outbursts.

BLOOD NEEDED IN KOREA

Many things have been said about the war in Korea.

Without war, a waste of lives and money, some called it. To men who see it as the product of administration blunder, it has been "Truman's war."

On the other side, statesmen around the world have hailed it as the first real battle since the first of free nations to quell aggression. Its onset. Many find it an effective warning to Russia not to venture forth on larger missions of conquest.

But however you look at it, one thing is plain. Men die—and are killed—in any other. Most of these deaths are unavoidable, they are the price of violent conflict. All of us have the responsibility of seeing that none is needless.

What we have to do with death on the battlefield.

Ninety-eight out of over 100 men were kept in Korea are saved. Most of them are wounded because they get blood plasma at the front lines and then whole blood at rear hospitals. Never before in the history of American wars have so many wounded been saved.

But to perform this miracle of mercy has required a most extravagant use of blood supplies. And at this moment reserves available to the armed forces are virtually exhausted.

Worse still, donations are lagging far behind minimum needs. In June they were only 50,000 pints, in July 36,000. If we do not swiftly make up the tragic lack, the time soon will come when blood in the battlefield for want of blood that could save them.

Former Defense Secretary Marshall appeals to us to begin building up the nation's blood bank within a second's delay.

REBUKE TO TRUMAN

The senate judiciary committee finally got around to giving President Truman the bad news. It killed his two nominations for federal judges in Illinois, on the grounds the choices were personally objectionable to Senator Douglas of that state.

The committee had allowed this thing to hang fire for several weeks in hope Mr. Truman and Douglas would settle their quarrel. Since the results were negative, as expected, in support of the colleague. The President could hardly have anticipated a different outcome. Senate custom gives the predominant voice in the selection of federal judges within their own territory. It was a foolhardy move for him to permit personal pique to Douglas to dictate this challenge to established tradition.

Mr. Truman was unwise, too, in thus displaying publicly his disapproval of Douglas. For many a month of his legislative program, both domestic and foreign, has had no more loyal supporter than the Illinois senator. To east away Douglas' backing and good will because the senator insisted on acting independently upon occasion, was a profligate waste of the assistance the President so badly needs in congress.

Moreover, it amounted to saying that nothing but partyhack loyalty was of any use in the White House. This hardly seems a proper encouragement to statesmen still remaining on Capitol Hill.

Douglas was a well-deserved victory in this encounter.

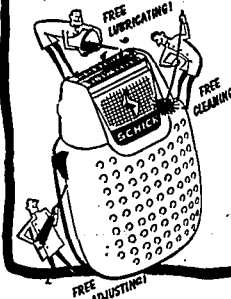

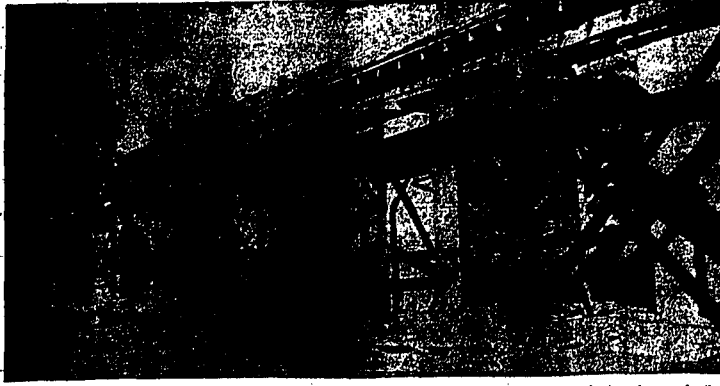

When Moving, King Hill Folks Take Their Houses With Them

KING HILL, Sept. 27—King Hill is on the move. But it isn't as though the people were packing their suitcases and going places. In King Hill they're taking their houses with them.

They're not moving far and King Hill still will be King Hill even after the move is completed. But a part of it won't be where it used to be. In that part will be a new highway.

King Hill isn't a very large place. It has only 50 or so buildings. But a dozen are being moved, lock, stock and barrel. The only buildings along the highway that are not being moved are six belonging to the Union Pacific railroad.

Rumors that King Hill was going to pack up and leave have been running for 20 years or more. Highway engineers periodically would survey the country between Glenns Ferry and Clover creek and when asked "what for" the stock answer was "a new highway."

At first this caused considerable excitement but when the surveyor was followed by construction crews residents of King Hill began to take the surveying with a grain of salt.

So, when a representative of the highway department arrived in King Hill early this summer and announced the road was about to be built, the people said "uh huh" and went on about their business. Imagine their surprise the following Monday when highway equipment was moved in and construction started.

The new highway is to run parallel to the present highway about 100 feet to the north and, in order to build it, part of King Hill had to be picked up and moved.

When the time came for the actual moving, although there had been talk about it for many years, some King Hill residents looked back on 30 to 40 years of work and their feelings were mingled. Lawns had to be torn up, trees chopped down and flower beds trampled. Paths that had carried the footsteps of

New Method Outlined for Eye Surgery

Associated Press Science Reporter
WASHINGTON, Sept. 7 (AP)—A Washington surgeon has described a new method, involving magnets, which electrical currents and surgery for getting stubborn bits of metal out of the human eye.

The heart of the technique consists of magnetizing metals that are usually non-magnetic—just sit, that is, when approached by a magnet. These metals, such as copper and aluminum, have been one of the eye surgeon's toughest problems.

Magnetic Metals Easy
 Magnets, like iron, are easier. Once located inside the eye by X-ray, they are pulled out, through a small incision, with the aid of a magnet.

Dr. Alfred A. J. Den, head ophthalmologist of Washington's Episcopal eye ear and throat hospital, described the new method of non-magnetic metals at the annual meeting of the American Roentgen (X-ray) Ray society. Dr. Den said it was developed by surgeons at the Washington hospital.

Statistics show that more cataracts, and in many cases, are still in considered experimental, but has been used successfully in about a dozen cases.

Electricity Used
 A small magnet is placed close to the affected eye and an electric current run through it. This sets up an electric field around the metallic object imbedded in the eye, but the object itself is not yet magnetic.

The researchers found, however, that by suddenly reversing the direction of electrical currents flow—so that the "poles" of the electric field within the eye are reversed—the imbedded object does take on a certain amount of magnetism.

Then, the surgeon can make an incision and lift the particles out with a small magnet.

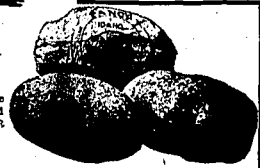


