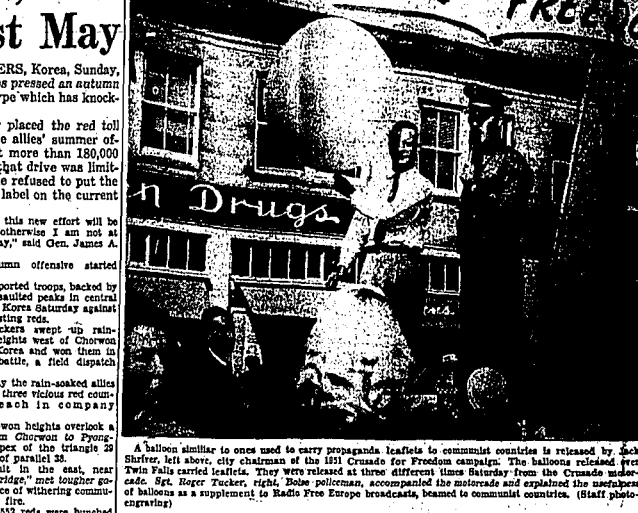

New Local Rules on Burning Of Rubbish Reviewed Again

To make sure local residents thoroughly understand provisions of new regulations for disposal of garbage and rubbish, city officials again emphasize the pertinent rules, this time concerning burning of combustible rubbish. Residents are urged to clip the list:

1. No garbage can be burned anywhere, anytime within the city.
2. Only paper and dry products can be burned.
3. Burning may be done only from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. weekdays and from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sundays.
4. No burning of any kind may be done on any street, alley or other public area.
5. All burning must be done in metal containers with screen-type covers and vent-pipe for draft, or in closed masonry-type incinerators with adequate draft installations.

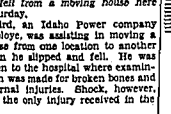

Carey Parley Discusses Elk Open Season

CAREY, Sept. 22—Reasons for the open season on elk about Klukskoon in the Little Wood river area were discussed at a Carey meeting of Commerce meeting Thursday evening.

Claudio Matthews and Robert P. Beal of the forest service were the main speakers. They explained that the herd of 20 to 25 elk is clearing the area of grazing, threatening not only their own existence, but that of deer in the area.

Overgrazing is destroying the natural watershed, causing landslides and the loss of timber. It is this that is allowed to continue farmers will feel the effect within a few years, Matthews warned.

The price of elk, when the price of lamb ranged on the land, is peanuts compared to the produce raised on Carey farms. Beal declared, "The watershed is very important to the existence of the community."

Site Stagnant Matthews said the herd has remained stagnant for a number of years proving the territory is not suitable. Consequently they should either be taken out or moved from the area, he added.

The chamber members also discussed installation of heavy weighing scales for elk. The scales are located in Carey at this time. Pete Conrath was appointed to investigate and act as the recorder.

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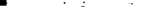
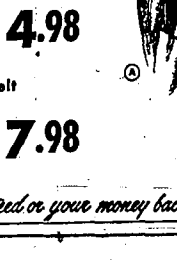
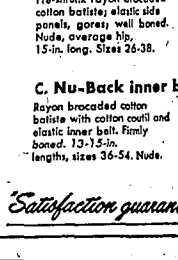
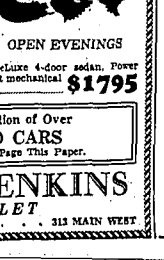
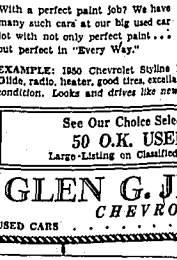
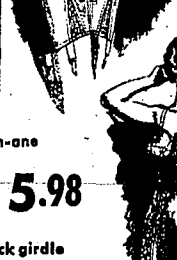
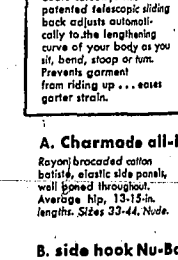
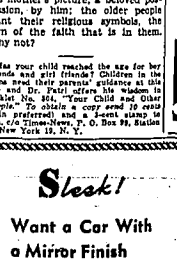
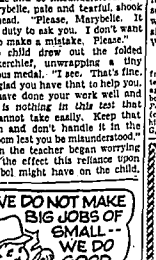
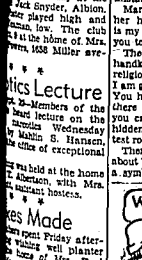
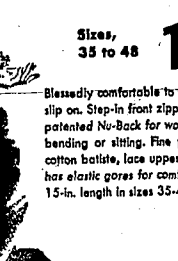
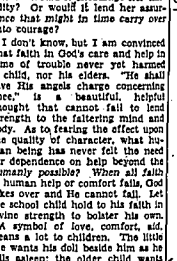
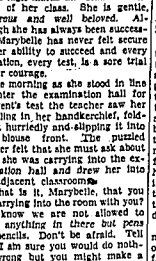
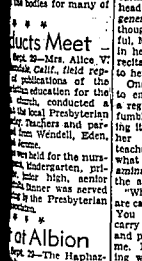
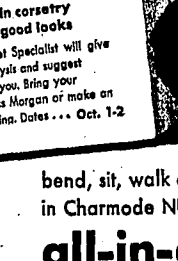
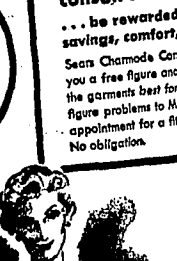
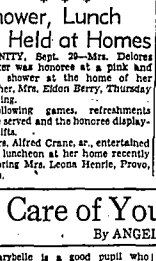
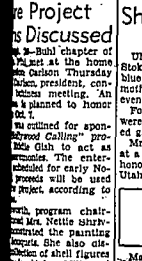
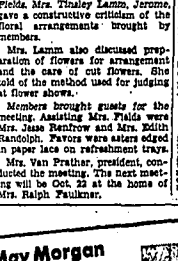
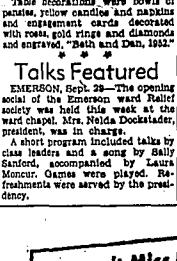
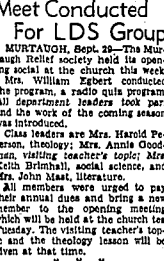
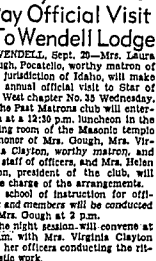
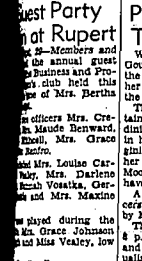
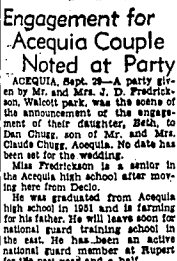
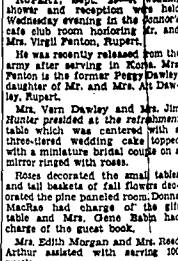
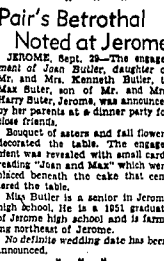
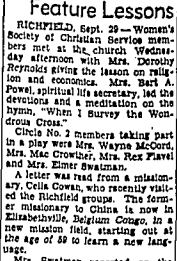
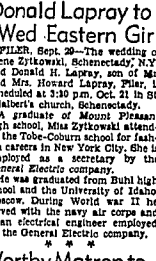
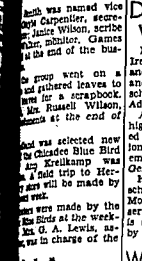
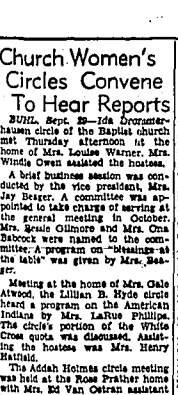
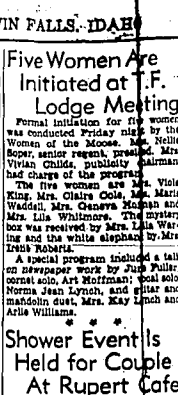
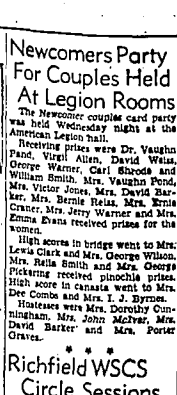
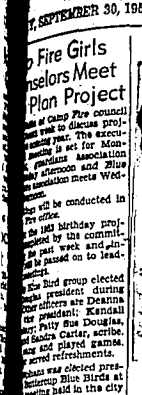
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Hailey Frosh Keeps Idaho From Being Whitewashed

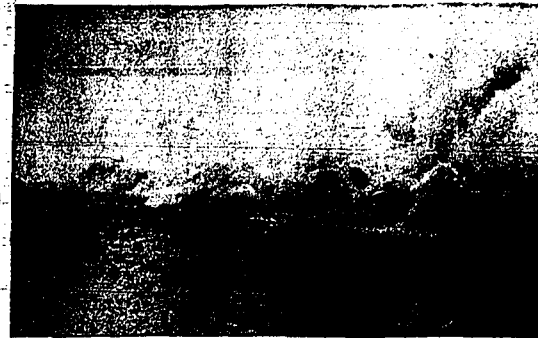

Blasting Is About One-Third Complete on Highway Project

Blasting of rock is about one-third completed along the route of the new highway between the Ferrine Memorial bridge and the Jerome airport Y. Wendell Frederick, construction superintendent, announced Friday afternoon following the latest blast so far in the project. Approximately a carload of dynamite was used in one explosion to break up rock in a section 1,100 feet long, 100 feet wide and 12 1/2 feet deep. Rock of this and other blasting sites will be removed later in the project for which Peter Kiwili and Sons company has the contract. Frederick said the company recently completed about 18 miles of highway through similar lava rock in the Arco region. Blasting in lava rock presents its own special problems, the superintendent commented.

Much of the explosive force is lost because of seepage of the expanding gases through the porous lava. Frederick also said the force of the explosion follows the course of least resistance, which in lava rock is entirely unpredictable. He indicated the trickiest blasting will come where the new highway will join the Ferrine Memorial bridge.

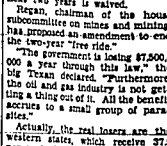

Public land lease racketeering may be put to rest by a bill introduced by Rep. Ken Reed, D. Tex., which is in the process of being passed by the House.

The bill would prohibit the leasing of public lands for oil and gas for a term of more than 10 years. It also would require that the lessee must be a citizen of the United States and must be a resident of the state in which the land is located.

"The Reno office, on the other hand, is able to verify leases almost immediately, so the racketeers steer clear of Nevada."

Filing at one of the "long delay" offices, the racketeer always includes a letter in his tract on which the title is not clear. Then if no office gets around to verifying the formal lease, the racketeer points out the bad title and rejects the deal. He collects his original payment and the three-year speculation period costs him only the \$8 filing fee.

Only one witness appeared in opposition to the bill at the hearing this week, although western congressmen reported letters and telegrams of protest.

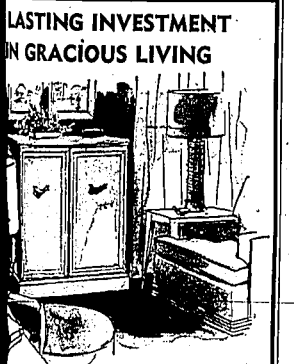

Chicago Meet On Safety Set For Oct. 8-12

CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—On the sixth anniversary of the great Chicago fire, safety experts from all parts of the country—1200 of them—will arrive in Chicago next week to attend the national safety congress and exposition.

They will focus their attention on accident and fire prevention, but it is the fire from "Mister C" that will draw the most attention. It is the atomic age hazards that will confront delegates to the National Safety Council's 39th annual convention.

The atomic bomb itself will get its share of attention when Lt. Col. Allen W. Kenney, safety officer of the medical department, U. S. navy bureau of medicine and surgery, discusses the blast, radiation and heat effects of an atomic explosion which could reduce the Chicago fire of 1889 to the status of a bonfire.

The Chicago fire, one of the greatest disasters of all time, killed 300 persons, destroyed 17,450 buildings and cost an estimated \$200,000,000.

During the five-day congress, Oct. 8-12, delegates to the national safety congress will discuss everything from rocket engines and hydrogen bombs to radioisotopes and holding ropes. The congress is the nation's only national safety convention and the world's largest safety event.

Headlining the speakers will be Robert Young, motion picture star who will address more than 2,000 persons at the annual congress banquet in the grand ballroom of the Stevens hotel Oct. 10.

Star of the radio drama, "Father Knows Best," and his father of motion picture fame, will give continuing support to teen-age driving safety for several years, and he has been active in the motion picture and radio committees of the council, which is composed of parents and the entertainment world. He devotes their talents to accident prevention.

Speakers at the opening session of the congress on Oct. 8 will be Millard Caldwell, administrator of the federal civil defense administration; Lt. Col. Helen Hull Jacobs, U. S. navy and former instructor in tennis championship; and Ned H. Dearborn, president of the council.

The annual Bessie Coleman memorial award lecture, sponsored by the Society of Automotive Engineers will be made by Rudolph F. King, Massachusetts registrar of motor vehicles, at a general session on Oct. 9. King is a leading authority in traffic accident prevention.
