Use of Residue of Crops Suggested

GOODING, Oct. 6.—Suggestions have been made by County Agent Robert E. Higgins to farmers to show how to add to soil production by using all crop residues. Organic matter is the only way to keep soils in good fertile condition, he said. This practice can mean the difference between success and failure for a farm.

Agent Gives Tips On Spud Storage

GOODING, Oct. 6.—Farmers in this area can reap benefits by having good storage conditions for their potato crop. County Agent Robert E. Higgins, suggested Friday. Four points have been outlined by the Idaho Advertising commission to insure keeping potatoes in good condition during storage. Growers may grow a big percentage of No. 1 potatoes but without proper storage the percentage of number ones may be lowered considerably. If potatoes are sound do not cool them too rapidly; do it gradually over a period of two or three weeks to allow slight wounds to heal. If they are not all sound, cool cellar accordingly. If farmers plan to ship early, in January for example, a relatively higher cellar temperature should be maintained to reduce brittleness. Temperatures and condition of storage should be checked regularly throughout storage period. Controlling temperature of storage bins is of use.

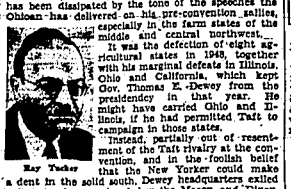

Record High Forecast for Cattle Supply

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8 (AP)—The number of cattle and calves on American farms will reach a new record-high of 90,000,000 head at the end of this year, the agriculture department said today.

At the start of the year 84,000,000 head of cattle roamed the ranges and pastures. This was the largest number since the January, 1945, peak and only about two per cent below that high mark.

If the pattern of previous cycles is repeated, the bureau of agricultural economics said, numbers will continue upward in the next few years though at a slower rate than this year. BAE said they may reach 100,000,000 head of the mid-1950's.

Most of the gain has been to the south and through the corn belt. Cattlemen have held their stock not only because of good grazing and continued interest in retaining cattle for breeding or feeding but also because of price uncertainties.

Priests of beef cattle have been under control since Feb. 1, as part of general ceiling price regulations and more recently under tailored dollars and cents ceiling set up by cuts, grades and acceptable cuts.

Minidoka's Labor Situation Is Stable

REPORT, Oct. 5—With harvest in full swing, the labor situation is surprisingly stable. Milton Rhoads, IRECA representative here, said Friday.

Local farmers are not experiencing any difficulty obtaining help and with students available during harvest vacation, Rhoads believes no other help will be necessary. It is believed however that more help will be needed on the north side. Pickers are asked to bring their own baskets.

There will be approximately three more weeks in the potato harvest. Best harvesting, starting next week, will be done by Waraho Indians and mechanical harvesters.

According to Robert Pittard, agricultural engineer for the bureau of reclamation, most of the potatoes harvested on the government land are pretty rough. Present indications are that there will not be as many No. 1's as compared to last year.

Firemen Slate Big Campaign During Week

(From Page One)
Firemen and other flammable liquids and rubbish.
Chief Bartlett has been on the fire force for more than 20 years. He has a good record during his rookie days has never left his post. He remembers the date as though it were yesterday, Jan. 1930.
According to the chief, four little children died that day when their gas-room burst at the east end of the city caught fire when an oil stove exploded. The fire occurred shortly before noon and the father was away. The mother was washing and went outside for water. When she turned around, the house was burning.
The mother rescued the baby, but it died shortly afterwards. Before calling the fire department she attempted to rescue the other children, all of whom were taking their nap, but the flaming building prevented rescue. The chief never forgot carrying the charred bodies from the ruins.
Chief Bartlett recalls about 10 deaths, including the four children, during his 20 years or more of experience. The last fatal fire occurred last Memorial day when two persons died in a fire which destroyed the fire station.
Literate firemen will be given an opportunity to be Junior firefighters for one day. Literature will be distributed and the children will be asked to take it to their parents, making parents help with the literature for fire hazards. Chief Bartlett urges parents to help children with the literature in the school where firemen will obtain them.
Special literature also is provided for merchants. Posters will be distributed about the city. Chief Bartlett believes that such a campaign will help in the prevention, and hopes some day to get a local service club to support the fire department in the effort to prevent fires in Twin Falls. The fire department would show fire prevention to schools, and club groups throughout the year.
Chief Bartlett points out per capita fire loss is greater in the United States than anywhere else in the world. In an effort to prevent fires in Twin Falls, the department is sending letters to various business places where it is believed furnace rooms are fire-prone. Owners will be asked to fire-proof these rooms.
Chief Bartlett says owners have cooperated 100 per cent and indicated their appreciation for the help given them by the department. The fire chief feels all heating units are potential fire hazards, even if they are supposedly fire-proof and can pass inspection.
Other local problems which are similar to those that exist in the nation are rubbish, dirty furnaces and chimneys and careless smokers.
According to Chief Bartlett, accumulated rubbish is an open invitation to a carelessly thrown match or cigarette. The chief insists that place hot ashes in metal containers as required by city ordinance, rather than in paper wrappers in containers.
He cautions against placing cigarettes on combustible material. Bartlett points out that the cost of the hazard, the chief believes...
The chief points out that people should be more careful in the nation's homes or business houses. He points out that many hazards would be noticed only by trained engineers who are constantly on the alert for such dangers. He feels warnings which point out such dangers are good public relations for the fire department.
The National Fire Protection association lists eight suggestions for the control. They include regular inspection of the premises, prompt

Early Mailing Urged for Yule Parcels Sent to Servicemen at Overseas Posts

Christmas packages to members of the armed forces overseas should be mailed between Oct. 15 and Nov. 15, announces W. W. Prantz, Twin Falls postmaster.
Parcels destined for Korea, Japan and Pacific Islands should be sent sometime this month in order to assure delivery by Dec. 25. Packages for navy and marine corps personnel serving in the most remote areas need to be in the mails by Oct. 15, officials say.
For accurate shipping, metal, wood, glass, fiberboard or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard boxes are necessary. Each box should be tied with strong cord, preferably four separate pieces, two lengthwise and two crosswise.
Sufficient cushioning to prevent rattling of goods will help avoid crushing and fiberboard boxes are strengthened if wrapped in heavy paper. Among the items that cannot be mailed are matches and lighter fluid. In addition, cigarettes and other tobacco products cannot be mailed to army personnel in Australia, England, France, Germany, Italy and Trieste.
Addresses should be complete and placed directly on the box instead of on a label which may fall off because of moisture. Names and addresses of both sender and addressee also should be placed inside the box in event the package is defaced in shipment.

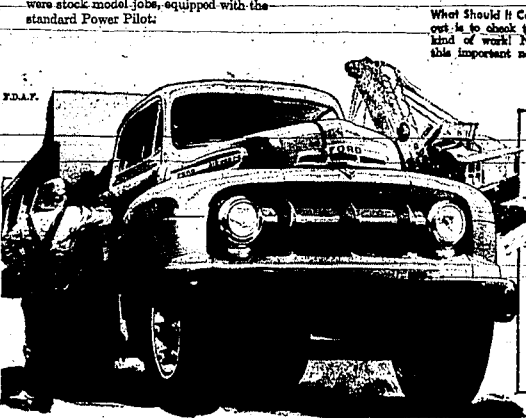

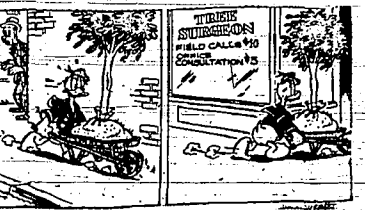
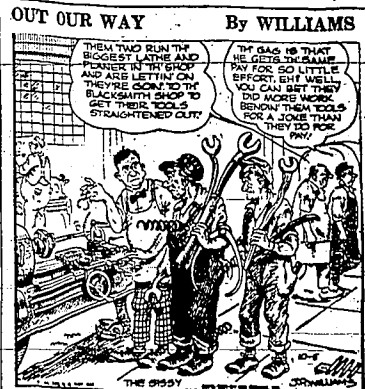
