DeLoach made his prediction in testifying at a closed-house appropriations committee hearing on an additional \$484,000,000 installment on the multi-billion dollar Savannah river atomic project. ### TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

**WASHINGTON**—The Truman trait most exasperating and frightening to Republicans apparently still is the one which makes the President liable to attack "roll with the punch." No President since Calvin Coolidge possessed such a gift for keeping his mouth shut, or such a skill in dodging the inevitable attack.

It is not that he is reticent or that he is lacking in confidence. It is that he has a demand that public officials and even the heads of the government should make public the income they receive from private employment and investments.

While House aides have accepted deep freezers, milk cans, canned goods, and other articles of value, Mr. Truman captures his own family lack of ethics.

### TRUMAN'S TRAIT

A vein of strong irony runs through President Truman's point that all top government officials, including judges, members of congress and national party officers, be required to declare annually all their income—whether from salary, loans or gifts.

Mr. Truman told congress he was offering the plan because "attempts have been made through implication and innuendo and by exaggeration and distortion of the facts in a few cases to create the impression that graft and corruption are running rampant through the whole government."

It is nice to know, anyway, that the President acknowledges a "few cases" where everything was not done exactly according to proper moral standard. It is the first concession to the truth he has made on this score.

But the whole tone of his message suggests that congress and other critics have vastly overplayed the moral mistakes of government officials. And to this extent the President is still persisting in bland denial of the facts.

Read in this light, his proposal for annual income disclosure can only be taken as a cynical diversionary tactic designed to "confuse the public and discredit honest investigation of government immorality."

How unfortunate it is that the President of the United States conceives his duty in this situation to shrug off charges of corruption morally as if he were a politician. How sad that he continues to condone moral wrongdoing in top officials and lesser figures alike.

His plan for coping with the problem is no different at all so long as he fails to act forthrightly in cleaning his administration house when the evidence so plainly warrants it.

Mr. Truman's cavalier attitude toward the mounting testimony of corruption reveals one of the weakest traits as a president. All the achievements by it is a redoubting of the attacks against him.

He exhibited the same falling in his stand on communists in government. Had he not lightlessly dissected those charges as a "red herring" he might have precipitated the deluge which later descended on him and has done so much harm to innocent men in government.

The President's message seeks to fasten on congress the blame for putting in jeopardy the reputation of government as a whole. The blunt reality is that his behavior is really responsible. Had he acted at all times to enforce a sensible moral code, government would not be looking at its evident low estate in the public mind.

Mr. Truman's new plan merits nothing but a dusty corner on a committee shelf. It is his way of saying that he is more interested in political maneuvering than in the moralistic party that in morality in government.

### STUMBLING BLOCK

How to revise the Italian peace treaty is the number one international issue in Washington nowadays. Main reason for wanting to revise the treaty is permit greater Italian rearmament. The treaty requires contribution to General Eisenhower's European Army.

The treaty now limits Italy's navy to two battleships, four cruisers, four destroyers and auxiliary vessels. It prohibits Italy from building any new warships, aircraft carriers and submarines. The navy is limited to 25,000 men.

Italy's air force is limited to 25,000 men, 200 fighter aircraft and 150 transport planes. The army is limited to 250,000 men and 200 tanks. These forces are obviously too small for Italy's own defense in case of communist aggression.

Revision of these restrictions is the principal business which brought Italy's Prime Minister Alcide de Gasperi to Washington. He came also to talk about settlement of the Trieste dispute with Yugoslavia, increasing Italian emigration to the United States, and admission of Italy to the United Nations and greater cooperation of Italy with other western European countries to promote economic development and a higher standard of living.

Prime Minister de Gasperi could just take home with him an answer to the treaty revision question, his trip would be worth while. If he doesn't get this answer, about all he stands to take home is good wishes and continued moral support from the American government for the Italian government.

What it boils down to is that this treaty, negotiated during the term of James P. Byrnes as secretary of state, made no provision for revision. The allied powers would appear to stand with it until some bright boy finds a way out.

The Italian treaty was signed by 20 allied powers—Soviet Russia, White Russia and the Ukraine. It was broken with the Russians and the Russians are making a Nationalist China. Try to get these five and the 15 other powers who are still allied to sit down in a new peace conference is of course out of the question.

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 8 (AP)—Representatives of 11 western states oppose a move to transfer Taylor grading lands to the custody of the forest service.  
Opponents to the measure, Senate bill 1149, was voted by executive committee of the Interstate Association of Public Lands Counties.  
Forrest E. Cooper, Lakeview, Ore., local counsel for the association, said the group opposes the bill because it would permit a "gradual land acquisition program" which would give the federal government control over additional land.  
In many cases, he said, it would remove from tax rolls land now assessed under private ownership. The result, he added, would be to "graft the tax structure" of many counties.  
The committee also opposed suggestions that counties assume the bulk of the cost of constructing access roads in national forests.

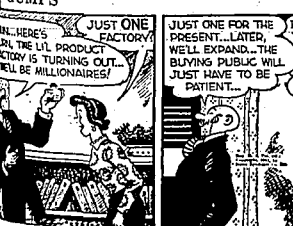

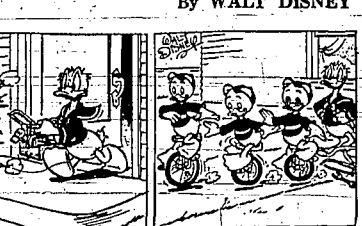

### Navy Erecting More Vessels To Up Power

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8 (AP)—The United States navy, already the world's biggest, is building about 100 more ships for the fleet, ranging from a huge carrier to radically new design destroyers and submarines.

A survey of available records today showed, among other things, that 15 submarines are being built now, not counting the experimental atomic powered ones that were recently authorized by congress. This is the largest submarine-building program since the mass production days of World War I.

About 400 combat ships are in the operating fleet now, not including several hundred amphibious, supply and auxiliary craft.

Much of the buildup of the operating fleet has come from pulling ships from the mobilization fleet, although some of the expansion includes new carriers, destroyers and other major combat craft.

The mobilization fleet of vessels built for World War I numbered 2,200 at one time. It still is a sizeable force in reserve, about 1,600 craft, despite withdrawals for return to the active fleet, transfer to navies of other friendly powers and dispositions by sale or other means.

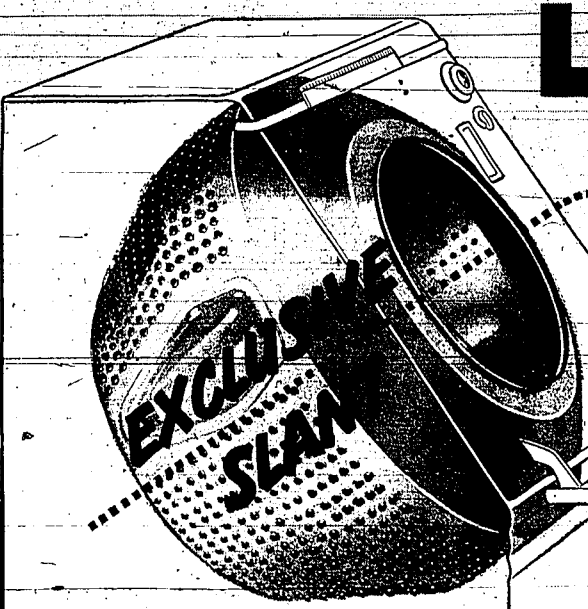
