Foreign Help Agent Hiring Ires Senators

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 (AP)—The Senate has learned today of a proposed plan to employ a large number of foreign agents to represent foreign countries seeking critical materials from the United States.

Senator Bridges, R. M. F. told today that he had learned from U. S. "spies" who would go from one defense agency to another presenting the claims of 48 foreign governments to secure tin and other supplies from the U. S. stockpile.

With plastic-tipped spectacles well down on his nose, the New Hampshire senator pointed on the floor to a list of names of the billions of "spies" in the countries, he declared, and "we have now reached the point where we are going to need a lot of people on the payroll to help them come and get it."

The crowd's feeling when it asked winners to kill all the porcupines they could during the Casita division special hunt. The winners are doing to trees in the Minidoka national forest. It is almost unbelievable.

There is hardly a stand of timber that has not been killed. The trees are dead and dying because these animals have stripped the bark for food or have riddled them until they are worthless.

Another thing against the porcupine is the fact that it could also be the vast deer herd in the division. This deer herd is one of the largest concentrated in any area in the nation.

Porcupines are ready carriers of diseases that can wipe out deer by the dozens. There are enough deer dying from lead poisoning or wounds from hunting without any killing to disease.

The Albion, Sublet and Black Pine special hunts open Saturday and the same thing holds true in the other divisions of the Minidoka forest. There will be up to 1,200 hunters in the three divisions and they are urged to kill porcupines.
