Bank Loot Reported Found by Lincoln Man; He Says "Metallic Object" Being Assayed

SHOSHONE, Oct. 10—Before you could gossip the rumor buried treasure has been found in Lincoln county, heed the remarks of Bill Woods, North Shoshone, the man who found the treasure.

"We found something," Woods says, "but, as yet, we don't know what it is. The metallic object has been taken to Boise for an assay."

The rumor of buried treasure in Lincoln county communities Monday and Tuesday he admitted there was "a lot of money" spread like wildfire. By Tuesday it had crowded out practically every other topic of conversation.

Not all the tales were the same but they agreed in several respects. All pointed out that it was Woods who had found the treasure along the little Wood river. One story had it that Woods had stumbled over something in the path and knocked open a box containing the gold. Another rumor had it he had found the gold in the river. Still a third said he had dug it up along the river bank.

But they all agreed his "treasure" was \$50,000 in gold dust.

Wid Combs, Shoshone, said he had talked to Mrs. Woods and that she had told him Woods said a man by the name of W. L. Prullbrugh, Nampa, had dug up "something" along the river.

Late Tuesday afternoon Mrs. Woods was contacted at her home in the Cottonwood district and she said she had been working as a potato picking foreman for Verle Wood on the little Wood river. She added Woods was working as a potato picker and would not be home until this week-end.

When Woods finally was contacted about the "revelation" until one day last week when four men from Boise drove up to his house in an automobile. They told me they had heard Woods knew where the bank loot was buried and asked him to take them to the place. Woods said they were equipped with two mine detectors.

The Cottonwood district man said Tuesday night he took the men to the spot. Shookly had pointed out and that the mine detectors indicated a buried "buried" cache. He added that they unearthed a metallic object approximately two feet square and probably thicker. He said the men took it to Boise to have it assayed.

The question of using such weapons was one of the reasons for the recent hurried trip to Tokyo and the fact that Gen. Douglas M. Brantly, a well-informed government source today reported.

Brantly's report was against use of A-bombs at this time because he regarded the prospects for a military victory as being slim. He said the source, who declined to be quoted by name, "In addition to being chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, he is by the principal military adviser of the President. Thus it may be presumed his recommendation was conveyed to President Truman by the President's military energy act, is the final authority for use of the bomb by the armed forces."

Idaho Solons Are Resentful On Dam Plan

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (Special)—Idaho's congressional delegation has expressed resentment over an administration plan to build a dam on the highly controversial Snake canyon dam on the Snake river.

Francis Budenz declared he added that his proposal, complete with DEPA and budget approval carrying President Truman's name, was sent to Idaho Monday night after adjournment, in place of customary introduction from the floor.

He said he had no objection to the dam project as long as it would not interfere with the power company's operations.

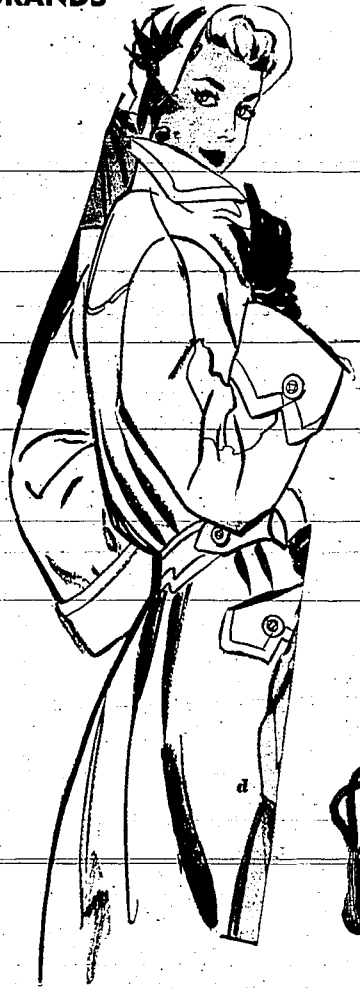

The St. Louis Post-Dispatch said Mr. Truman disassociated himself from the campaign and authorized this direct statement: "I don't know anything about the letter, and if I had known anything I would have stopped it from being sent."

The letter was drafted by Senator Anderson, D., R. M. The newspaper said yesterday it had received a copy of the letter from a prominent and indignant Washington resident. It quoted the letter as saying business had a great opportunity to legally contribute tax free five per cent of its earnings.

At his home in Albuquerque, N. M., Anderson declared: "I simply say the letter was not broadcast. It was sent to between 50 and 100 people that I thought were well known to the friends of the President and who couldn't be accused of buying influence by their connections."

The senator added: "What the newspaper quotes is a review I made of a report by the business committee of the National Planning association prepared by the National Planning association, and Theodore Geiger, chief economist of the National Planning association."

Further Loan Approved for War Veterans

World war II veterans, who previously have used all or part of their GI loan benefits to buy homes, farms or businesses, may be eligible for additional GI home loan guarantees under the newly-passed defense housing act, Arnold Helweg, local VA contact representative, said Tuesday.

He explained the 1950 housing act raised the maximum guarantee on a GI home loan from 50 to 60 per cent of the loan and from \$1,000 to \$2,000, but only for veterans who previously had used none of their guarantee entitlement.

The new law grants to most veterans who used all or part of their guarantee rights the difference between what they already have used and \$7,500 for additional home loans. No additional guarantee is provided if the veteran obtained a home loan after April 20, 1950.

"Hurry," said the new law—also reduces the minimum down payment

required for GI loans on homes valued up to \$12,000 and reduces the direct loan program for veterans in rural areas where four per cent mortgage financing is not available from private lenders. He said the new minimum down payment schedule is four per cent on homes costing less than \$7,000, six per cent on those from \$7,000 to \$10,000 and eight per cent on those from \$10,000 to \$12,000.

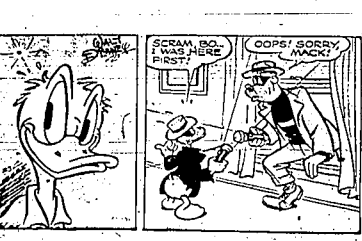

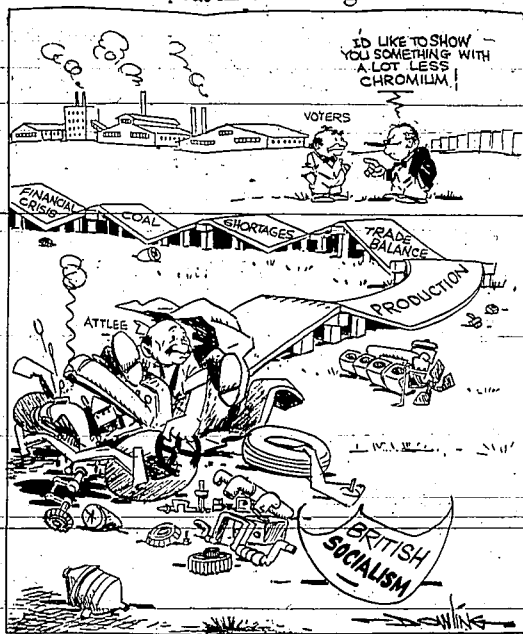

Director Explains Alcoholism Recovery Clinic's Operation

Details of an alcoholism recovery clinic at Lava Hot Springs, a new development in the treatment of alcoholism, was announced Monday by Mahlin B. Hansen, Boise, director of the state office of exceptional education, department of law enforcement.

He said the new development includes the first establishment of revolving funds for treatment of the disease. Applications or correspondence may be sent to Hansen at Boise or to Grant H. Verrick, clinic director at Lava Hot Springs.

Hansen emphasized the clinic is for the treatment of alcoholism only, which he defines as a condition of uncontrollable, compulsive and impulsive drinking. He said no cases are accepted where drugs, narcotics or sedatives are part of the problem.

Cases of alcoholism are received direct from doctors, hospitals, welfare agencies, churches, charitable institutions, employers, lodges, or towns and cities.

However, individuals may make application directly themselves. Hansen said such applications will be accepted where alcoholism is known to be the primary problem.

Part of the therapy is a program of developing self discipline, Hansen explained, and in keeping with this program no free treatment is available.

However, assistance is given those persons needing immediate funds to cover the cost of treatment. Several revolving funds are available from which money can be borrowed for this purpose. Quotas are being established.

Truck, Bus Toll Gains on Roads, Council Advised

CHICAGO, Oct. 10 (AP)—Trucks and buses are taking an increasing toll of lives in road accidents, safety leaders were told here.

James H. Knudson, a member of the interstate commerce commission, said highway accident deaths involving such vehicles had risen from 2.7 per cent of all reported accidents in 1940 to five per cent in 1933.

He spoke before the commercial vehicle section of the National Safety congress.

During the last decade, he said, there have been increases in the percentage of big road vehicles and in the weights they carry and the distances they cover.

Knudson urged that all bus and truck drivers be required to take physical examinations from time to time. As a precaution against fatigue, he added, drivers should not be permitted to remain on duty for long periods of time.

The federal civil service commission announces examinations for appointment to the position of wage stabilization investigator, \$2,100 to \$3,825 a year, in the wage and price control division of the department of labor in Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Arizona, California, Nevada and Utah.

The commission also announces examinations for the position of automotive transportation specialist, \$4,000 a year. In various federal agencies in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington. At the present time this position exists only at 15th and 16th district headquarters in Seattle.

No appropriation was made by the commissioners Monday and no action was taken other than the decision to cooperate with the university to retain the agents.

The commissioners also agreed to act in an advisory capacity to the civil defense director for Jerome county. The action was taken upon the request of Fred Abrams, director of civil defense.

Bills were read and the annual report was approved.

Fire Truck Pact Okayed by Board

MURTAUGH, Oct. 10—The Murtaugh town board Monday signed an agreement with the county mutual fire insurance company for the housing of the fire truck recently supplied the town by the company.

The town officials had requested the fire truck and will pay the rent for a garage to house it. The garage was inspected by representative of the company and found to be satisfactory.

Men riding the fire truck are covered by accident insurance by the company if they are hurt on their way to or from a fire if their names have been written on a piece of paper prior to the fire and the paper is carried on the truck.
