Experts Scan Way to Save On Heat Bills

 WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—If a dripping faucet drives you nuts, you can add this to your misery—it's not just a nuisance, it's a waste of money.

I'm not talking about the splint on the left, the one that drips with hot water.

Housing officials figure if all the leaky hot-water faucets in the country were made undrippable we could save \$5,000,000 a year on public housing projects alone.

This came out of a practical demonstration of efficiency in the operation of housing in connection with the National Association of Housing Officials meeting here.

But winter's coming on and the visiting housing people were interested particularly on how to cut down the bill.

Save BTU

The talk was on saving a thing called the BTU. That is the British thermal unit, or the amount of heat required to raise the temperature of one pound of water one degree Fahrenheit.

Here are a few rules to help you save money:

Soak water by insulating boiler flues. Clean tubes make steam and save heat. Keep the boiler clean.

Good combustion gets more heat for less. Heavy smoke kills the little BTUs, and costs money. Keep your equipment in good shape.

Insulation Needed

A heavy draft pulls heat up the chimney. Is your boiler operating properly? Heat is lost through the walls and roof. Are you insulated? Distribute the heat by turning off the radiator in the right place at the right time depending on sun and shade on the house.

A leaky radiator—leak—allows heat to escape. Get it fixed.

If you have a fireplace be sure to close the draft if closed when the fire goes out. Air sucked into an open chimney can cool off the whole house and you might wake up in the morning and find a couple of cold pipes roasting on the kitchen sink.

Like I did the other day.

Truck, Bus Toll Gains on Roads, Council Advised

CHICAGO, Oct. 10 (AP)—Trucks and buses are taking an increasing toll of lives in road accidents, safety leaders were told here.

James K. Knudson, a member of the interstate commerce commission, said that highway accidents involving such vehicles had risen from 3.67 per cent of all reported accidents in 1920 to five per cent in 1933.

He spoke before the commercial vehicle section of the National Safety Council.

During the last decade, he said, there have been increases in the power and speed of big road vehicles and in the weights they carry and the distances they cover.

Knudson urged that all bus and truck drivers be required to take physical examinations from time to time. As a precaution against fatigue—he added—drivers should not be permitted to remain on duty for long periods of time.

Man Decapitated, Woman Injured in Grosseome King Hill Crash

KING HILL, Oct. 11.—Investigating officials were slowly piecing together Thursday the gruesome details of the grotesque crash near here Wednesday afternoon which decapitated a California man, dashed a King Hill grandmother to her death on the pavement and sent 18 other persons, mostly children, to the hospital. Elmore county officials said full details of the crash may not be learned for some time.

Exact cause of the accident has not been learned but several "guesses" have been made. Adding to the grotesque nature of the crash is the theory the wind was so strong and the accident scene it blew the two automobiles together. One motorist who passed the spot shortly before the accident reported to police he could hardly hold his automobile on the road.

Frank H. Ragans, Lawndale, Calif., still was seated behind the wheel when his smashed automobile was patrolled and sheriff's deputies arrived. Half of his head had been blown away in the crash. The broken body of Mrs. Clara DeLosh, was lying in the highway and the screams and cries of frightened children filled the air.

Covered With Blood State Patrolman Blaney Pace, Gooding, said he never had seen "a worse mess" than the wreckage in the crash was covered with blood, he said. Some were lying on the ground, some on the car, while other children, a 11½ year old than the rest, were trying to help their mother, although they, too, were streaming blood.

The only person not injured in the crash was 12-year-old Elizabeth Ragans. Only doctors and ambulance drivers on the scene didn't get covered with blood and dirt like the rest, she, too, was rushed to the Gooding Memorial hospital.

GUSTS UP TO 60 miles an hour, accompanied by some rain, blew over most of Magic Valley Wednesday afternoon, ripping out power lines in five communities and causing crop damage. In Hagerman valley trees were uprooted and telephone and power lines disrupted by the wind which began around 3:30 p. m. Dust was so thick it was impossible to see across the road at times, it was reported.

Damage to Apple Crop which is being harvested was not known. Wind velocity in Twin Falls varied between 30 and 40 miles an hour with gusts reaching 60 miles an hour in some spots, according to municipal airport recordings.

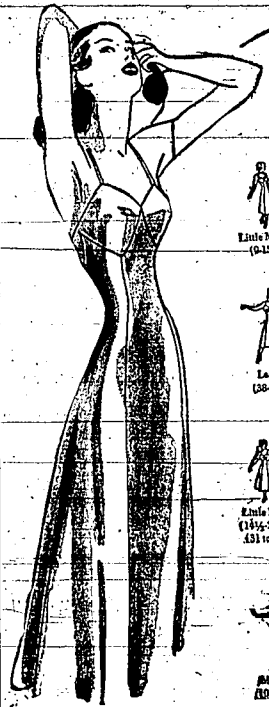

Shortages Cut Already Slight Power Supply

NEW YORK, Oct. 11 (AP)—Copper and steel shortages are slowing down the huge expansion program of the electric power industry in the United States, creating a higher demand than ever to be met.

The supply of power—public and private alike—is tight. Actual shortages are in the Pacific Northwest where large aluminum plants are located.

Combination of drought and growing industries has resulted temporarily in almost as bad a situation in the section where power plants are located.

The Edison Electric Institute, trade organization of the private power industry, says December peak loads will create difficulties in these areas although a number of about eight per cent between peak and capacity is expected for the country as a whole.

The action of the power men in providing facilities to increase their output with the better supplied regions has prevented a lot of headaches.

The huge expansion program of the industry—the most ambitious ever attempted—has been hampered in step with demand in most areas.

But the Pacific northwest, traditionally a problem, is in a bad way. The drought has cut water supplies of the northwest situation. Declining identification and direct quotas, which are what some regions had power available in this section have been overrode.

Large aluminum plants, one of the greatest users of electricity, have been encouraged to settle there, where they can get power.

The lure of less expensive power at the government's Bonneville dam has been a factor. Aluminum makers, they contend, when the importance of power to them has been available of power.

USDA Sights Record Crop Total for '51
WASHINGTON, Oct. 11 (AP)—A harvest time crop report showed today the nation is virtually assured of a record output of farm products this year.
The volume of crops will fall short of a record, but the production of livestock and livestock products will be sufficiently large to raise total farm output perhaps two per cent above the previous record set in 1947.
Combined Volume High
The report, issued by the agriculture department, said crop prospects declined slightly in September due to frozes in the corn belt and dry weather in the central and western states. Nevertheless, the combined volume of all crops, the department said, will equal that of harvest in 1947.
Crops losing a little ground in September were included corn, cotton, wheat, oats, flaxseed, barley, dry beans, soybeans and potatoes.
Improvements Noted
However, slight improvements were reported for hay, rice, sorghum grain, sugar cane and sugar beets.
Harvests of corn and cotton, despite reduction in prospects during September, will be much above average.
Production of corn—the nation's number one food raw material—is now forecast at 3,165,000,000 bushels, about one per cent less than a month ago.
Wheat harvest was put at 924,000,000 bushels, about 6,000,000 less than a month ago.
After World War II there were about 20 per cent more active bushels units than before the war, according to a report by the 25th Century Fund.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11 (AP)—"Seventy-five (1947) dollars a month!"

Headed that complaint recently from any young American who has just received greetings from his draft board.

Well, it's any consolation, the 875-a-month U. S. recruit is a rich man compared with the draftee in any other country of the North Atlantic treaty organization (NATO).

This draftee's salary starts at \$162.50 a month. The Greek conscript does not best an 110.00.

Low for Turks
—And so it goes on down the line to the Turkish draftee, whose monthly pay is—hmm, this is not a typographical error—11 cents a month.

These figures, supplied by U. S. military authorities, were made public by a house appropriations subcommittee.

The figure for the overseas NATO countries show France pays its draftee less a month than the United States; it costs the French government 31 cents a month and Portugal below 27 cents a month.

France, for instance, pays a major \$105 a month, compared with the pay of an American major—\$227.20.

Idahoan Explains Operations Netting Top Northwest Honor

DARLINGTON, Oct. 11 (AP)—About a mile west of here, in the Big Lost River valley, is a farm judged the best in the Pacific northwest as a potato farm. The owner, Harold E. Smith, received \$1500 at Portland as the "champion of the year." Yesterday he received \$100 for winning the Idaho contest. Smith has a 500-acre irrigated farm. He doubled his production in the eight years he has farmed it, and he thinks he can do even better in the future. "By completely leveling his farm—draining it properly and planning his irrigation, he's proved that twice as much land can be irrigated with the same amount of water and less work. There is no water run-off,

being rotated among four pastures. Smith started getting ready to use his improved range by buying 100 head of purebred Angus last fall. He picked that breed because it grazes at the higher elevations of his range and continues to put on weight during the late summer months when vegetation dries out. As the range develops, Smith plans to increase his livestock until he has 200 cows and their calves running on the range each year. The carrying capacity of the fully developed range will be 10 to 15 times what it was when he started the program. County and federal agents who checked Smith's operation say other financing it out of earnings on ranches can't do the same thing by their farms. In addition to his range improvement program, Smith has a reputation as a seed potato grower. In receiving his state award from

the Idaho Power company at Boise yesterday, Smith said that if other ranchers would do the same thing with the vast acreages of sagebrush in Idaho, the state's livestock industry could expand to "unbelievable" proportions. 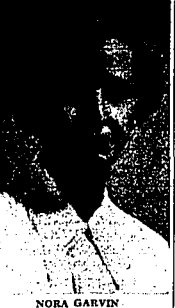

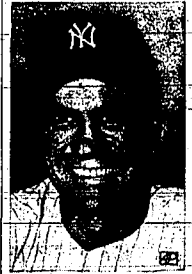

N. Y. No Spot for Fireplace, Henry Learns to His Sorrow

I have heard tell that the mink in Washington, D. C., has a furnace whose flames devour old and worn-out bills. I never have seen this mink, and have little or no interest in seeing it, because I am a cause in my own apartment I have the blood brother doubled in speed.



One of the reasons I rented the apartment was that it had a wood-burning fireplace in the living room. A crackling log and crackling flames means home to me. When I put my signature on the lease I pictured happy nights around the fireplace, roasting potatoes, with me curled up on the hearth with a wet sheepdog's feet on my back, and cats loafing idly by, inside the warmth.

Those things and all the others that go with a fireplace—wummy chestnuts in the coals, hissing sparks to fly out and burn the only decent rug in the joint, and smoke billowing out, because of a bad draw, to inflame the eyes of everyone in the room.

The very second Jack Frost's fingers reached into New York, driving the thermometer down to the low 50s, I looked up a wood seller and gave him a buzz. I told him I wanted to keep a fireplace most of the winter, and would send me enough wood to take care of my wants.

He said he would be glad to, but the cost would be \$300. Thinking that he misunderstood, I told him that my auditors did not hold emergency funds.

Turns out—shortly after my longer he explained to me that when you buy wood for a fireplace in New York, the internal revenue department automatically investigates your New York fireplace wood. It seems, is cut in Alabama, shipped around the cape, transported by mink-coated muskrat to Boston, and given four full years at MIT.

It is so hard to get New York and inland with mother of pearl and T-bone steak. For me to buy enough wood for the winter—and my fireplace is just about the size of a copy of "Gone With the Wind"—would drive me to the RFP for a loan, and to get a loan from the RFP involves home, television sets, mink coats, vacations in Florida and barbecued chickens, ready to eat.

If you are crazy enough to order wood in New York, you get a thrill

out of it. It is delivered by a man in an immaculate uniform, and it is wrapped in cellophane. The officer who delivers it hands it to you as if he were giving you the medal of honor.

A man's natural reactions is not to burn it. It's too precious. I bought four sticks—enough for a 15-minute fire—and it now occupies the place of honor in the living room. A recent visitor was Winthrop Rockefeller, and his first question was, "How can you afford it?"

Win hasn't had a fireplace burning in 12 years, and neither he nor his brothers are supposed to be regular Automat customers.

But to get back to that dollar-burning mink in Washington, I burned dollar bills in my fireplace last night, and saved the wood. Dollar bills don't have the brightness of color that wood does, but they do give you the satisfaction of feeling as if you are saving money.

Tonight, if it's cold, I am burning my coupons, which I borrowed from a friend. He told me he didn't want it back, and it doesn't fit me. It makes me look like Daniel Boone without a haircut.

A word of warning to all new New Yorkers: DON'T rent an apartment with a fireplace unless you are worth billions.

Fire Dousing Called Proof In Rain-Trial

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 11 (AP)—Robert D. Elliott, a scientific "rain-maker" believes that putting out an Oregon forest fire last month proved made-to-order weather was a practical thing.

Elliott is a member of the north American weather consultants, Pasadena, Calif. He spoke to the American Meteorological society here.

Elliott said the Tillamook burn in Oregon had forest fire season of logging operations about every six years.

Asked for Help

He said he was asked to help late this summer. He said he carried on "seeding" of clouds with silver iodide over a fire area 50 by 50 miles.

Inside the area, he said, there was rainfall recorded at 11 inches in one place and 12 inches in another. Outside the immediate area, he said, the rainfall was only two to three inches.

Elliott's discussion followed the pattern of that of Dr. Irving P. Krick of the Water Resources Development Corporation, Denver. Elliott formerly was associated with Krick.

"One thing is certain," Krick said.

New York resident buyers for out-of-town stores report records increasing this week. From cities where the first frost of the year has sent customers to the shops.

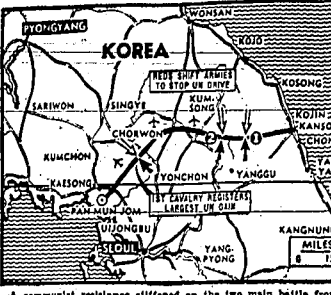

Empire Might Fading Out as Trials Mount

By HARRY FERGUSON
The slogan used to be "the sun never sets on the British empire." Now it has to be changed. It never rains but it pours on the British empire. Three troubles are coming to Britain these days. Any one of them would be a big enough crisis for one nation to cope with. But they all together make it easy to see why London at the moment is the world's most worried capital.

1. The nation is going through an election campaign at a time when a united front on foreign policy is needed to face external crises there is nothing but instant charges and counter-charges and the controversy that elections always produce in a democracy.

2. Egypt has just told Britain she will have to remove her troops from the Suez canal zone. This not only is a serious setback to London's position in the middle east, but it is a blow to the British navy ruled the seas the Suez canal was a vital link in the British fleet stretching from the Thames to India.

3. Some 300 British technicians have just been forced to leave the Transvaal because they were ordered out by the British government. The British now are before the United Nations security council and try to salvage something out of their oil interests in Iran.

The technical device by which Egypt dealt the latest blow to Britain was the denunciation of a treaty signed by the two nations in 1936. Under that agreement the British were allowed to station troops along the Suez canal.

It was a good move for the Egyptians because Hitler and Mussolini were mulling over the idea of aggression which led to World war II and any weak nation that could get protection was better off.

Hitler and Mussolini are dead, but the treaty still is alive and has four more years to run. At least it was alive until the Egyptians denounced it. Whether the British can bring it back to life remains to be seen.
