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GOVERNMENT "ECONOMY"

Government bureaucrats are now going to be authorized to ride around town in taxicabs. On official business, that is. And they will be authorized to tip the drivers, too. As taxpayers.

—This is the upshot of the great congressional economy drive to reduce the number of government chauffeurs who had been riding government officials from conference to conference in government automobiles. The fact is that the bill has been passed and unworked to solve this latest government crisis—almost unbelievable. But it has now all been reduced to administrative orders. This is how it happened:

First, General Services Administrator Jess Lee Hansen, the government's chief housekeeper—asked Comptroller General Lindsay C. Warren, head of the general accounting office, to suggest another system in Washington, since the 18 chauffeurs' jobs in GSA had been abolished.

GSA then told GAO how it could be done. GAO then told other government agencies how to do it. But the pattern established for GSA will apparently be applied to all the other departments.

Every official wanting to go from A to B on government business must fill out form No. 1012. This is the official receipt which it's about the size of a bank check and isn't too complicated. But on form 1012, which must be filled out every month, every official must list every trip from point of origin to destination, time, cost and amount of fare.

If he goes by street car, he enters that. If he goes by taxi, he enters that. He may tip 10 cents on every fare up to \$1. On all fares over \$1—got this—he may tip only 10 percent "to the nearest nickel."

If he goes to the Pentagon, fare \$1.25, he may tip 10 percent or 12 1/2 cents. But which it he goes by street car, he enters that. If he goes by taxi, he enters that. He may tip 10 cents on every fare up to \$1. On all fares over \$1—got this—he may tip only 10 percent "to the nearest nickel."

Heretofore it has been almost impossible for government employees to get approval for taxi fares entered on their expense accounts. Reasons for taking a cab instead of a streetcar had to be explained in detail in every case, and sometimes it took GAO weeks or months to audit and approve these expense items.

The new authorization for taxi-riding is a quiet, unobtrusive change in the handling of the red tape which the "economy" legislation has made necessary. Since it would not be fair to ask government employees to finance their own transportation about town, an official sanction, a petty cash window is to be opened in every government office.

Here the bureaucrat who is broke may get and get his taxi or bus fare in advance. By filling out the necessary voucher, of course.

So, by cutting out the chauffeurs, congress has created new government jobs for cashiers in every department, and so increased government employment.

What's more, it is now estimated that it may cost the government from \$3 to \$5 to audit and process each monthly travel voucher. The increased paper work may be staggering.

NINETEEN FIFTY-ONE

An Inconspicuous Associated Press item from Houston, Tex., yesterday had an ominous implication. A man had been sent to a penitentiary by the police to keep constant check on prisoners in the city jail. He is going to set up a television system in every jail cell. Recorders will be located in offices in the police station. Everything a prisoner does will be flashed on one of the screens for police to watch. This will be a check on the police to keep tab on every activity of every prisoner.

But we couldn't help wondering when we read the report. It reminded us of the late George Orwell's novel, "Nineteen Eighty-Four," which is controlled by the telescreen. From the time he gets up in the morning until the time he goes to bed at night, he is under the constant surveillance of the telescreen. His every word and action are under its scrutiny. It is known that at the other end somewhere a member of the "thought police" sits at the screen, noting everything.

If a few telescreens can be placed in a city jail, it's not beyond the imagination to picture a similar device in a civilian home. If one were regulated, they might be placed in our homes and offices.

Even a prisoner's privacy should be respected enough to prevent his being snoozed on constantly in this manner—Lawton Tribune.

IT CREEPS

Officials Eye Wool Ceiling Price Change

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (P)—U. S. wool ceilings set last May, and in for a reduction if government price experts can find the right plan in view of the world wool price situation. The experts met yesterday to give the matter serious thought, but admitted they had come to no conclusions. They'll meet again Thursday to find out how the wool industry feels about the proposal. The industry will be represented by the new wool growers industry advisory committee.

\$3.35 Ceiling
Domestic and imported-wools now sell at a \$3.35 per pound ceiling for average, broad types. Wool tops go at \$4.13. The average wool price ceiling compares with \$2.12 a pound for a similar type on the Australian market about the time of the Korean difficulty. Wool prices since May have dropped off sharply. An OPS official said the current Australian auctions are bringing \$2.23 a pound, compared to \$2.41 on Oct. 8. About two weeks ago the Australian price was as low as \$1.85.

Far From Stable
One expert said the Australian market is far from stable. He told a reporter a close watch is being kept on the situation there. And he said the low prices are due to American military purchases reductions and the fact that civilian buyers are reluctant to go into the market.

Heavy military buying after the Korean situation was credited with jumping prices into 1950.

Plans for Halogeton Combat Mapped As Approval of U. S. Cash Expected
By DON SHANNON
Washington Staff Correspondent
WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—(Special)—Anticipating congressional approval of more than \$1,232,000 to combat halogeton, bureau of land management and Indian bureau officials already are ready to attack against the weed-killing insecticide.
Bureau of land management management director Milton W. Reid said he will call for bids on range reseeding as soon as the cash is okayed. The schedule for the remainder of this year is southern Idaho, 60,000 acres; Utah, 77,450; and Nevada, 200,000.
These three states contain the biggest areas of approximately 700,000 acres of public land where the poisonous growth has taken hold. Infestation has been reported in Wyoming, Montana and California but is not yet serious.
Reseeding of buffer strips is planned to halt the spread of halogeton. Reid said \$100,000 seedling will be attempted in infested areas where the type of soil gives a chance of success. Grasses, such as bluegrass, like halogeton comes from Russia, has been found most effective in crowding out the weed.
Although the BLM share of what will be the first congressional appropriation specified at halogeton will be \$1,934,400, it won't come close to the ultimate need. Reseeding costs a minimum of \$4 per acre for the drilling method and bids range up to \$7 per acre when the ground is thoroughly prepared by cross-plowing.
Some broadcast seeding has been tried but only in favorable locations. Burned over areas seem to "take" best.
Grass will be carried out in cooperation with the states along highways and railroads, but the trouble with this technique is that other

Aid in Weed Fight Sought By 10 States
SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 16.—A campaign to control halogeton, the enthusiastic support of agricultural officials from 10 western states who today started the second annual meeting of the Western States Agricultural Commissioners and Directors' association, voiced their opinion after listening to Tracy R. Wellington, Salt Lake City, describe the infestation which menaces grazing lands in Utah, Nevada and Idaho.
Weed spreading.
The poisonous weed also has spread into other western states.
"Considering the value of some of the grazing land," said Wellington, Utah commissioner of agriculture, "it would be too costly to launch a program of strict eradication."
"Control steps, to prevent long hope now being made by the infestation, could be taken, however."
Idaho Infested
Charts were used to illustrate today's talks. They revealed that halogeton has taken its strongest stand in Nevada, where it was first discovered. A small patch has edged into California from its eastern border. Utah and Idaho have relatively large infestations.
The agricultural commissioners favored an education program to inform livestock men about dangers of the weed. Research into its growing habit was also recommended as part of a control program.
The group passed a resolution favoring state control, instead of federal control, of commercial fertilizer.

DHIA Supervisor Reports on Herds
BURLEY, Oct. 16.—Kenneth Thomas, DHIA supervisor for 33,000 cattle units, reports that 330 cows from 33 herds in the association produced an average of 388 pounds of milk and 708 pounds of milk during September.
Of the 330 cows in the association, 284 were in production and 46 were dry. The high herd is owned by Harold Gooding, Rupert, who had seven cows that produced an average of 449 pounds of fat. The high individual cow was Goss, a Jersey owned by Rex Broadhead, Rupert, and high Guernsey was Clara, G.34, owned by Jack Merrill, Paul.

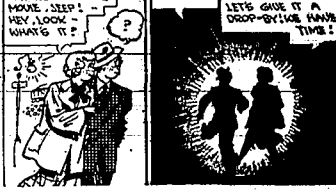

Norway Plans Break Treaty, Russia Warns

LONDON, Oct. 10 (AP) - Russia formally threatened reprisals today for Norway's plan to break the 1920 treaty which permits the North Atlantic pact organization to establish bases on Spitzbergen and Bear Islands.

The Soviet charge that Norway already has violated a nine-power treaty signed in Paris Feb. 8, 1920, by agreeing to place the two strategic Arctic islands within the "competence" of the commander of the western defense force.

The Soviet warning was contained in a stiff note handed the Norwegian ambassador in Moscow yesterday by Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky. A summary of the note was broadcast this morning by the radio Moscow.

It accused Norway of permitting Norwegian territory to be used for the preparation of war against the Soviet union and also charged the Norwegians with carrying out a "vast military program" of their own.

The note rebated Norway for joining the Atlantic pact. It said the Norwegians had assured Russia in a note on Feb. 15, 1920, that they never would consent in selling the territories to the Soviet union and never would permit Norwegian territory to be used for such purposes.

Spitzbergen Strasse

The Soviet note particularly sharp in their references to the status of Spitzbergen, which lies halfway between the North pole and the northern tip of Norway, and Bear Island, another 140 miles to the south.

The islands represent the last Western islands on the Arctic approaches to the Soviet union. From Alaska to Spitzbergen it is only 2,000 miles across the Polar region, and from Spitzbergen to Leningrad, 1,500 miles.

Divorces Granted To 2 Women Here

Mrs. Alleen Collier accused Leo Collier of excessive drinking and abusing her physically. They were married July 13, 1941.

The court awarded Mrs. Collier custody of their four children and a fifth upon his arrival. She also received a residence in Twin Falls, household goods and other personal property. Roy E. Smith represented the wife.

Disruption, idleness and physical threats were grounds for a divorce granted Josephine Ellis from Jack W. Ellis Boise.

Mrs. Ellis was given custody of their small daughter, \$50 per month for her support and household furnishings. The court rejected the couple's agreement whereby the husband would have custody of the child for three months each year.

The couple was married Nov. 6, 1940, at Elko. Nev. Rayburn and Rayburn were the wife's attorneys.
