Report Avows U. S. Workers' Integrity High

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (UP)—A senate subcommittee on ethics reported today the integrity of the federal government's relationship with U. S. workers "is high" but should be higher. Most public servants, the five-member subcommittee said in an 82-page report, "are honest and faithful." It added that the "ethical standards of public officials are probably higher than those prevailing in business and other walks of life." But, the senators said, the need for high standards of integrity "has grown even faster than the standards have risen." The subcommittee is headed by Sen. Paul H. Douglas, D. Ill. Its recommendations included: 1. A 15-member commission on conduct and standards in government. A resolution by Sen. J. William Fulbright, D. Ark., to set up the commission has been approved by the labor committee and is on the senate calendar. 2. Changes in the law to provide for firing of employes who make personal profits from their jobs, except valuable gifts or favors from persons doing business with the government, discuss future jobs with such persons, divulge confidential information of economic value, or become "unduly involved" in "extensive social engagements" with outsiders with whom they are doing business for the government.

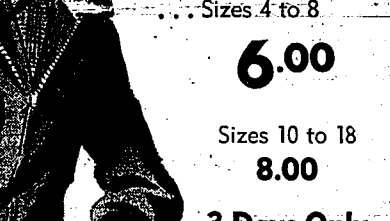

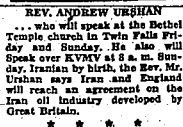

Eight Gridmen at Glenns Ferry Are Dropped by Coach

GLENN'S FERRY, Oct. 17—Eight first string members of the Glenns Ferry high school football team were suspended Tuesday for the remainder of the season for breaking training rules, Coach Les Clark reported. Identity of the eight men will not be released.

Clark said it is doubtful if Glenns Ferry will be able to win the remainder of the season. The eight boys will remain in school, but will not be allowed to participate in athletics, the coach announced. The suspended players had been regular players for the team.

Clark worked with the remaining players on his team Tuesday afternoon along with a group of freshmen in an attempt to ready a team for Friday's game at Halley. He said he would try to have a team ready for the Halley game, but it was doubtful the team would be ready.

In addition to the suspended regulars, two key backfield men are nursing injuries. The combination of the suspended regulars and injured players leaves the team without enough manpower.

Clark said the players were warned two weeks ago and again last week to stop breaking training rules. He said he was forced to take drastic action with the approval of Glenns Ferry school officials.

The coach explained the action was taken "not only for the good of the players concerned, but for the good of the school and the effect it will have on younger boys coming up on the team. We had no alternative."

Glenns Ferry had one of the top 10 teams in the state at the start of the season and was tabbed as a contender along with Halley for the state title.

After winning four straight games, Glenns Ferry dropped decisions to Kimberly City, 3 and to Blonhatch last Saturday, in both games Glenns Ferry took three touchdowns leads early in the game, but saw their offense falter in the last half to win.

Clark said his team lacked the "grit" to win under game pressure because of the violations of training rules. He said it was his opinion that the players were not in good condition.

Drinking alcoholic beverages and smoking were given as the major factors in the action.

Cal Expects Hard Game With Troy

O'Connor told a house judiciary subcommittee that he had urged Landis never to like the farm systems. But O'Connor said, "Judge Landis did not appear to be a farm system."

New Pact for Coast League Is in Making

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—Congressional baseball investigators looking for a new agreement between the Pacific Coast league and the majors is in the making. The new pact is being worked out by the major league ball players in the west.

Leslie O'Connor, counsel for the Pacific Coast league, told the house judiciary subcommittee a new pact drawn up by the major-league executive council is under consideration by club owners.

He said he was not at liberty to divulge details of the agreement. But he said any new pact would not represent everything the Pacific Coast league wanted. It does provide for a change in the system's structure.

In response to a question by Representative Charles McNary, O'Connor said it is a change in the system's structure that is being worked out.

He indicated the provision would permit players to indicate in their contracts that they shall be subject to the draft.

Under present baseball regulations, one player from each Pacific Coast league team may be claimed by the majors at a stipulated price.

O'Connor also told the committee that the Pacific Coast league is becoming an "independent" league, treating itself as one of organized baseball's rivals.





WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—Robert Alphonso Taft is the tall, sober son of a fat, jovial father who became President of the United States.

The son long has aspired to follow in his father's footsteps.

Senior senator from Ohio, chairman of the senate's Republican policy committee, the son of William Howard Taft twice has been within striking distance of his party's presidential nomination, and in two other presidential years has been "among those mentioned."

It's been a national figure for more than a decade.

A sometimes impatient man, with a quiet sense of humor, Taft often has taken the unpopular side of a question—has raked political scandals more than once—with the calm assertion that time will prove him right.

Can Change

He also has been known to change his position on occasion and—in the case of the communists in government—entirely—of Senator McCaughy, for instance, to adopt a policy of silence that could be interpreted either as secret approval or as aloofness.

Taft's backers are offering him to the voters as plain "Bob" Taft. It is unlikely they will try to make a glamor candidate out of him.

No Glamor Boy

At 62, Taft is balding, slightly above the middle and is partly bald. His voice is starchy but incisive. He wears rimless spectacles.

A movie director might cast him as the vice president of a bank, a man who passes the collection plate in church on Sunday.

Politics is in the senator's blood. It was at the White House that Taft met his future wife, Martha Wheaton Bowers, daughter of his father's attorney-general.

Vivacious, with Martha, Taft is one of the best known women in Washington. She's regarded as a shrewd politician in her own right, has not been well for the past year. She and the senator, who are financially well off, are the parents of four sons.

Blood Bank Need Reflected in List

The continued need for cooperation from organizations participating in the community blood bank is reflected in the donor list for last week and so far this week reported Wednesday by Maslo Valley Memorial hospital laboratory personnel.

Of 24 donors last week, only two were provided by participating organizations, one each from the First Christian church and from the American Association of University Women. Three police officers donated blood last week as individuals, and 19 other individuals donated.

Two donors were reported Monday and none up to Tuesday noon. One of the Monday donors was replacing blood transfused under the previous blood bank system, and the other contributed as an individual rather than for an organization.

At a meeting of organizations representatives last Friday, Dr. J. Woodson Cress, hospital pathologist, emphasized the increased need for blood means the blood bank will be needing between 40 and 50 pints of blood per week instead of roughly one-half that amount as planned previously.

Southern Illinois has been dubbed Egypt since the early 1800s. A legend on the name's origin has wide acceptance. During the winter of the deep snow, the rest of Illinois had a corn failure and looked to southern Illinois for grain. The famine-stricken situation was linked with the biblical passage—"and all countries came unto Egypt."

Promoting Egypt, U. S. A., as the promised land are two Chamber-of-Commerce-like groups—O. A. T. Egypt, Inc., and Southern Illinois, Inc.—along with a state agency. The movement was set off by a declining economy a few years ago. Relief agency maps show much of the region has been in a low ebb.

Frontier southern Illinois was the most prosperous end of the state. The first Illinois bank at old Shawneetown on the Ohio river refused to loan Chicago money because it was too "venturous" and regarded as a town without a future.

Modern southern Illinois woods diversified industries as coal-mining declines. It has won nearly 100 new small industries in the past decade.

Biggest construction job on in progress is a \$40,000,000 power plant at Joppa to power an atomic project in Kentucky. The latest promise is in talk of a \$100,000,000 synthetic fuel plant.

To tap one of Egypt's assets, promoters have been seeking tourists to its scenic playgrounds. Three big rivers—the Mississippi, Ohio, and Wash—wash its boundaries.
