Miners Hear Of Shortages In Stockpiles

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 23 (AP)—Shortages may arise in more than 50 per cent of the 90 minerals and metals needed for U. S. defense efforts, the western division of the American Mining congress was told yesterday.

Wesley Larson, administrator of the defense materials procurement agency, said the shortages will exist "in the near future at least in current military and civilian requirements are a gauge."

Hard to Gain
Many existing shortages have been a long time in the making, he added. "It will take a long time to make up the deficiencies and some of them may never be made up."

DMPA, he added, is making a study of metal shortages and will launch an aggressive program to expand domestic sources of supply, emphasizing the development of new resources through exploration.

Funds Increased
Since the Korean war started, the appropriation for stockpile purchases has been increased to a total of \$1,500,000,000, Larson said.

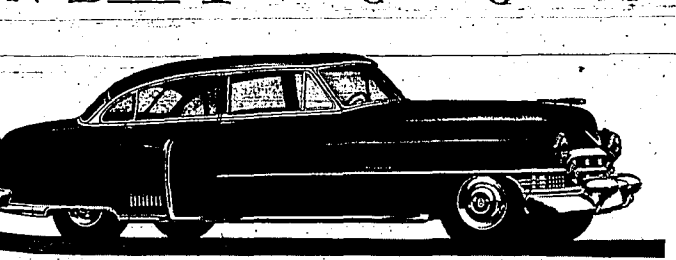

New Bites for Wage Checks Slated Nov. 1

BOISE, Oct. 27 (AP)—Employers will be required to withhold income tax from wages paid on and after Nov. 1 at higher rates provided by the increase in income tax. The collector of Internal Revenue, Calvin E. Wright, has announced. Wright said revised withholding tax rate tables are being printed and will be available at his office soon. Wright said pamphlets containing the revised tables will be mailed to Idaho employers as soon as they are received. That's because every effort has been made to make the historic old place look about the same.

First Use of Colorado's New Hunt Deer Law Is Reported

GENESEE, Colo., Oct. 23 (AP)—Harry Hodson, who shot and killed a father of seven children while hunting deer during a raging snowstorm today was the first person to lose his license under a new Colorado law for wounding or killing another hunter.

The 31-year-old Leadville, Colo., sportsman smashed his rifle and vowed he never would hunt again after he shot and killed the father.

Trailing deer in the snow-covered California gulch area of the upper Cache la Potaqui Sunday, Hodson saw the forms of Belber-Winkler, 46, Monte Vista, Colo., and B. E. Balms, Truth or Consequences, N. M., through the heavy storm.

Sheriff Charles McCormack said Hodson apparently mistook the men, standing behind bushes, for an elk and fired. The high-powered bullet struck Winkler in the stomach, killing him almost instantly.

Hodson told officers later that he fired from a distance of 70 yards, and realized his mistake almost instantly. He dashed to the aid of the wounded man, but Winkler already was dead.

From by remorse, Hodson smashed his rifle across a tree and said, "I'll never hunt again."

The hunter attempted to carry Winkler's body out, but was forced to obtain a pack horse for the five-mile trip to the nearest camp.

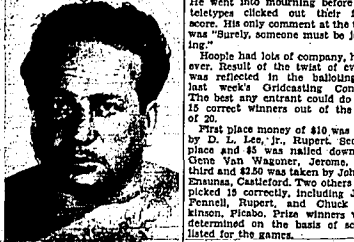

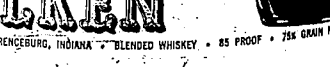
