Booklet Tells Of Raspberry Plant Growth

In response to a number of requests from local persons desiring information on growing raspberries for home use, County Agent C. W. Dalgh has received a pamphlet on the subject from Left Verrier, Iowa, agricultural experiment station horticulturist. Copies may be obtained from the county agent's office.

Dalgh points out there is little growing of raspberries for commercial purposes in this part of the state. However, people with gardens of any size raise them for their own use. They have considerable difficulty because the soil is not suitable.

Four general rules are recommended by Verrier in growing raspberries successfully. First, start with disease-free plants; second, plant in good soil; third, control insects and diseases; and fourth, give the plants good care after harvest as well as before.

Disease-free plants are available from a reliable nursery. If diseases show up later, die out and burn the diseased plants immediately, Verrier suggests. Some diseases cannot be controlled by spraying. Best varieties for Idaho climate and soil are the Latham, Newburg, Chief, Merve Taylor, Washington and Indian Summer, all red raspberries; Cumberland and Loan in the black variety; and Solara and Polomise in the purple classification.

Black and purple berries suffer more from virus disease than reds and should be planted apart from the reds. Planting should be done in the spring as soon as severe frooding weather is over.

The pamphlet gives information on soil, methods of training and building a trellis for support of the plants, weed control, planting of cover crops, fertilizers, irrigation and care after harvest.

The pamphlet also may be obtained from the University of Idaho and the extension service at Boise.

Explanation Received by Farm Bureau On Dismissal of Five Agency Workers

An explanation of the termination of the positions of five local bureau of entomology employees here last month is given in a letter received by officials of the Twin Falls county Farm Bureau.

The letter was written by Hugh F. Hall, Washington, D. C., assistant legislative director of the American Farm Bureau Federation to John H. Webb, Pocatello, executive secretary of the Idaho Farm Bureau Federation.

Commenting upon "manipulations of USDA funds," as mentioned in a letter from Melvin C. Ogilvie, agricultural appropriations act authorizing states such as the secretary of agriculture, based upon authorizing states such as the agricultural adjustment act, the soil conservation and domestic allotment act and others.

Within the confines of these laws, he explains, there still is administrative discretion over selection of various activities, especially in respect to research, for which the funds can be spent.

Concerning the local situation, Hall writes: "I am informed by the head of the bureau of entomology and plant quarantine that the men who were cut-off were engaged in what the terms experimental demonstration work."

"This work has been carried on, he advises, for two or three years and it was felt that, in view of the reduction which congress has made in some of the research appropriations, this would be one place where a cut could be made without jeopardizing fundamental work."

"He advises that the 'true' research work is not being reduced. This is done by the personnel which remained. . . . It is the experimental and demonstrational work that is being discontinued, and it is argued that, in view of the fact that it has seemed to have performed its function, there was justification in so doing."

The county Farm Bureau had protested the dismissal of local employees as "false economy" on the part of the federal government.

Hall also writes he is advised the state of California has appropriated some \$200,000 to \$300,000 in state funds with which to carry on the experimental demonstrational work as well as control work on the leafhopper insect which carries a bean disease.

Hall points out—the American Farm Bureau Federation requested a reduction in agricultural conservation program work for next year by cutting the appropriations to \$150,000,000, and urged research work be continued at the level recommended by the budget bureau.

"It was hoped that direct federal payments to farmers . . . through the ACP program could be reduced so substantially that we could maintain the research funds indicated and thus justify the maintenance at the budget level," Hall writes.

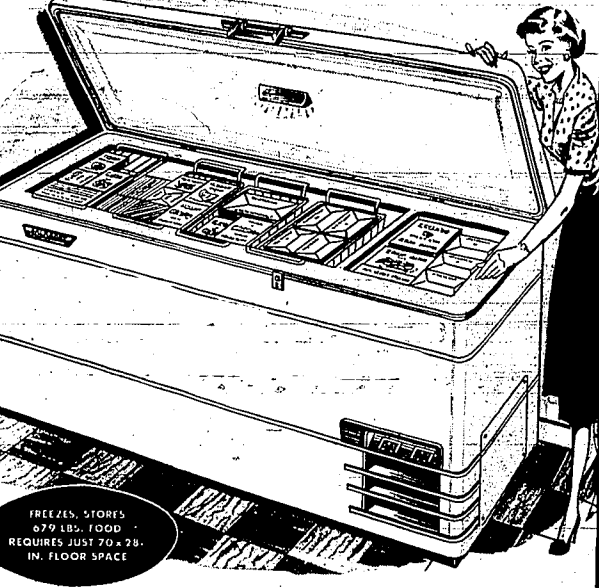

DiSalle Flays Meat, Cotton Price Raises

Pilotless Bombers, Other "Fantastic Weapons," Revise Aviation Planning

By C. C. PEARSON

BALTIMORE (NEA)—Guided missiles, pilotless bombers, high altitude rockets and other members of the family of new weapons now coming to light are changing the whole course of aeronautical engineering research, practice and organization.

Guided missiles were the first aircraft to make full use of ultra-powerful jet and rocket power plants, the first to travel at super-sonic speeds and "execute" the first to operate instantaneously acting, automatic controls with reactions measured in thousandths of a second.

Since there could be no thinking human pilot at their controls, guided missiles were the first aircraft designed with electronic "brains" which control all functions.

This meant that the conventional design emphasis was reversed. Instead of the airplane and power plant receiving primary consideration, the design of those elements had to be upon intense new development work in electronics and electro-mechanical research.

Development of jet power and transonic flight has posed many of the same problems for the designer and manufacturer of military airplanes, "inhabited" aircraft.

Without mechanical assistance, man is built to move at three miles per hour; to see and hear for only a few hundred yards; to react in large fractions of a second, and to live in an oxygen atmosphere at surface pressures and temperatures of thousands of a second, but unscathed, shoot down enemy leaders in zero-zero weather or sink advanced submarines, man must have the aid of mechanical and electronic senses, muscles and nerves.

To develop such electro-mechanical aids and integrate them into the aircraft, guided missiles, and aircraft for executive air defense and air travel—that is the challenge the aircraft industry is facing.

Our company made a start in this direction as early as 1948 when a trio of engineers, including me, were assigned as "special weapons group" within our engineering division.

Under guidance of Dr. B. Bengen, now vice president and chief engineer—one of that small original team—a new design philosophy called "systems engineering" has evolved during the last five years.

"Systems" engineers working under the systems engineering concept give simultaneous consideration to all details of the three major elements: airframe and power plant; electronic flight and navigation devices; military armaments; or in the case of commercial aircraft, passenger and cargo facilities.

There is no point in having an airframe, for example, ready for flight while the electronic system, which may alter the airframe, is still only a gleam in the designer's eye. Martin development progress, therefore, is scheduled so that each element exerts its rightful influence on the design, and the end product is an efficient integration of all components.

The original small special weapons group at Martin now has been expanded to include many hundreds of engineers. From its efforts, in cooperation with the military service, have come the new Martin

Although these and other "fantastic" new weapons are now actually in production, new possibilities are plentiful.

That's why radar, servo-mechanisms, automatic control, electronic computer and antenna experts—as well as aerodynamicists, structural engineers and electrical, hydraulic, armament and power plant installation specialists—are part of the well-integrated engineering team it takes to do today's job and plan tomorrow's surprises.

RENO, Oct. 24 (AP)—Reno's local bookmakers screamed today. The new 10 per cent federal tax on gross gambling receipts "will put us out of business."

Bookmakers must pay the government 10 cents of every dollar bet, with them under a new law effective Nov. 1.

"Why, we don't even figure to make a profit of 10 per cent," said Nevada turf club owner Joe Horning in a survey by the Reno Evening Gazette.

Louis Maberly of the Cal-Neva book said:

"We couldn't even pay 10 per cent on gross winnings at the end of the year and break even. It's a good bet the Cal-Neva horsebook won't be operating long."

Bookmakers estimate their profits range from 7 to 13 per cent of the money bet.

Stock Cited Cause for Stock Decline

TWIN FALLS, Oct. 24 (AP)—A sharp decline in the stock market Monday was attributed to corporate profits reports showing poor earnings.

Analysts say poor earnings were one of the factors. Early reports show three things: (1) A large proportion of the companies giving out third quarter reports, but are reported to be the nine months period ending Sept. 30, with some people saying that could be because the third quarter is particularly poor.

(2) A wide variation in earnings and higher tax is being reported by accountants—a few due to the increase in the tax rate, some spreading it out over the year, some waiting till the end of the year to adjust it—so that earnings statements are not all that they seem, either good or bad.

(3) Companies giving third quarter reports—with a few notable exceptions—in July, August and September, corporations were making lower net earnings than in the first quarter of this year.

Analysts had been expected, at this time, the summer quarter to be the season of the lowest earnings for most companies, but this quarter is traditionally better than in the first quarter of 1950. Analysts expect the third quarter to show a larger drop—material and labor shortages, and other shortages in production; price ceilings and operating profits.

Reds Making New, Bigger China Purge

TAIPEI, Formosa, Oct. 24 (AP)—The Chinese nationalists say they are rolling again in a new and greater blood-purge on the communist mainland.

The defense ministry asserts that the new program of bloodletting calls for the extermination of anyone suspected of secret disaffection with the red regime or with the previous purge.

The military estimates more than 200,000 Chinese have been massacred in Kwangtung province alone in the new phase of the blood purge. Kwangtung is the south coast province, long a seat of revolt and unrest.

Ex-Officials Watched

The communists are supposed to be paying special attention now to former employes of the nationalist government—run once high officials.

The communists absorbed thousands of these public servants into their ranks when they seized control of the mainland. It was a case of necessity. The reds simply did not have enough trained personnel.

The ministry says the communists are trying to eliminate eventually every Chinese who ever served under the Nationalist government.

Labor and farmer unions also are reported under close scrutiny.

"All falls on the mainland," the ministry says, "are packed, imprisoned and executed."

Some Chinese fence sellers in Hong Kong supposedly were lured to Communist Canton only to find themselves under arrest or surveillance.

Another device is to entice nationalists to their death by sending reds to Hong Kong posing as nationalists.

Buck Rogers Era Speeded By Invention

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 24 (AP)—The "Buck Rogers era" was one step closer today with the announcement that a rocket-powered, one-man jet-propelled plane is in hedge-hopping troops in battle was in the test stages.

The helicopter currently is undergoing ground tests at a military base near here. It was invented by Gilbert Magill of the Rover-Craft corporation, who calls it the "pinwheel."

The device has not been flown yet, but Magill said, "it is an approach to a man's having wings on his back."

Rockets on Blades

It was developed for the office of naval research and consists of two small rotor blades, each with a rocket at the tip.

Running down from the rotors is a steel tube which supports a bicycle-type seat for the pilot, a cargo hook and two fuel tanks.

Another steel tube extends about three feet to the rear with a small rudder at the end for use in controlling the direction of flight.

The whole business weighs less than 100 pounds and can be parked in spaces no larger than the top of an office desk.

Single Control

A single stick is used to govern the speed of the rotors and to control the action of the rudder.
