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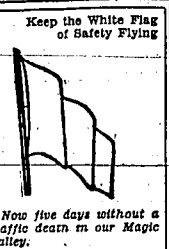

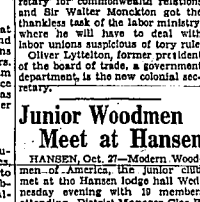

Audience Captivated by Charm And Talent of Violin Player

 The personal charm and outstanding talent of Carol Glenn, young violinist, completely captivated the audience Friday night at the opening of the Community Concert series. More than 700 persons heard the selections which included several and lighter music.
 Miss Glenn played Concerto in C Minor, "Il Bopetto," by Vivaldi for her first number. These rare selections have been discovered only recently and Miss Glenn was able to procure an edition for her audience.
 Antonio by Bach and two caprices, Theme and Variations in E flat and A minor, offered a completely opposite interpretation. The Antonio was serious and slow moving, as compared with the light, lightly fingered Triana and Variations. The two selections showed the outstanding versatility of the violinist as interpreter and artist.
 The three numbers from the Symphonie Espagnole were easily the most popular of the evening. From the first melodic and flowing number to the lighter folk tunes, the Latin melodies were interpreted with ease.
 The accompanist, Robert Turner, played a selection from Scarlatti, two sonatas, C minor and E major.

 On the roof, by Milhaud, was something new to the audience. A post-World War I melody, it featured the violin and piano to envision Paris nightclub life and is interpreted, supposedly by the characters in nightclubs in Paris.
 The final numbers were Estrellita by Ponce and Zigeunerweisen, Sarasate. Both are songs-of-the-gypsies. Estrellita is the Mexican style and the other, Hungarian. The slow plaintive tune of Estrellita gave a sparkling contrast to the light, rhythmic number of the Hungarian song.
 Miss Glenn played three encore numbers of Banjo and Fiddle, Fiddle Fiddle and waltzes. She said the Fiddle Fiddle composition originally had started in the Boston Fops orchestra and was popular because it offered a light and beautiful simple tune which could be interpreted many ways. The two light numbers were actually high-lights.
