Free Instruction in Rifle and Pistol Use Set by Club, Civil Defense Group

Free instruction in the use of rifles and pistols is being offered at the residence of the Twin Falls Rifle and Pistol club in cooperation with the Twin Falls civil defense unit, officials of both organizations announce.

Expanding the rifle program offered the past few years, this year the club will give instructions in the use of pistols. Schedules for the rifles are 9 p.m. Saturday and for the succeeding five Saturdays for rifle students and 8 p.m. Tuesday and following Tuesdays for pistol students.

Work covered in the instruction will be similar to that given by the army in basic training and is authorized by the National Rifle association. The pistol instructors, M. J. Bays, Jr., James Sidwell and Clifford Sharp, and the rifle instructors, Clyde Ross, Lewis Hull and Herman Ripley, are certified by the national association.

Weapons will be furnished by club members to those who do not have them. Personal weapons may be used but must meet club safety requirements. Only cost to the students will be for ammunition which can be purchased from the club at wholesale prices. Approximately 30 rounds will be fired during each lesson.

All instructions will be given with 22 caliber weapons at the club's range at the end of Washington street north. Last year 35 persons completed the rifle course.

Persons who want to enroll are requested to contact Grant Sanborn, club president, or Joseph Seaver, civil defense director. Only requirement is that a person be at least 16 years old.

Port Rations Remain for British People

LONDON, Nov. 1 (AP)—There is eating in all of western Europe these days, but Prime Minister Churchill will have to be satisfied with the British people on short rations for months to come. Churchill means an egg a week, a pound of meat a week, and a pint of milk a day. In England it is cut thin as paper. There is plenty of fish and it tastes like it, too. The British have fruit now, but it is mostly imported. It is rummy stuff except for the apples and other imports which taste as good as any.

Subsidies to continue Churchill will continue food subsidies as paid from tax revenues. They keep down the prices of foods such as meat, fat, sugar, and other staples. The subsidies come off. There seems to be no end in sight. There are full of unemployed and non-military food as imported cheese, tinned meat, and the like.

Food is so expensive the average Briton cannot afford it. An Irish employe of the United Press arranged for 200 sandwiches for the staff on election night. Churchill told the voters they are in some more hard times, but he did not promise much except administration of government food spending. But the government is housing the British are fully short of homes.

Men and women who voted for Churchill realized they still would have to wait two years or more for an automobile. They do not expect Churchill to find any eggs for them soon in a magic way. Churchill can cut government subsidies, but Churchill may be able to give the British the greatest boon since production of the sales taxes, but they are terrible. The lowest is 10 per cent and that applies to everything except food and very essential of life.

Agents Break Moose Battle, But One Dies

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Nov. 1 (AP)—A moose which had fought two weeks for his lady loves have been slain by a United States agent of wildlife service agent. Rescue was too late for one—it had died of a broken neck.

The blame, said Wildlife Agent Woodford, could be traced to the United States air force. Woodford was flown to the widely-wounded fight some 30 miles south of here in a small plane which landed nearby. There, he said, he found two huge wood animals tied to a tree by wires which had become tangled in their horns as they fought. The wire was identified as an air force snare used to capture remote Tanana river area during the war.

"We threw a rope around the live one and snatched him to a tree," Woodford related. "Then we cut and pulled their broken horns apart. The live bull made charges at us, but the rope stopped him. When we cut the rope, he came at us but he finally changed his mind and retreated to a woods," presumably to seek the cows over which he and his rival were believed to be fighting. The battle had been spotted from the air by a United States pilot. The other wildlife agent, Wolves and others were lurking nearby. Gray ruffed grouse waiting for two animals to succumb before charging in their grizzly feast. That is what the rescue efforts in motion here. But Woodford gave the spectators satisfaction—he left the carcass in the hands of the live moose. Woodford said the two moose had locked in battle at the scene for three to four weeks.

Evolt Attempt Is Quelled at Prison

ASHTON, Nov. 1 (AP)—Fifteen convicts overpowered seven guards in an unsuccessful attempt to escape from the Oregon state penitentiary here last night.

Walter O'Malley, who became warden of the prison, said the attempted break was controlled without violence, although 400 convicts were outside their cells and started at one time.

The 20 convicts, led by three convicts, were held by the armed guards one by one as they were taken back to their cells. O'Malley said.

Two Sets of Negotiations Are Going on at Korean Conclave

Two sets of negotiations are going on in Korea. First the North Koreans negotiate with the Chinese communists for getting into the war. They have different ones in wanting to get out.

The Chinese don't want to use up any more of their trained troops. Disease took a heavy toll of the Chinese soldiers last winter and their battle-field losses at times have become prohibitive. A cease-fire along the present battle line would leave the U. N. army still a long way from the Manchurian border. Peiping can sink or lose better things to do with an army than to have it continue to fight an inconclusive war in Korea.

Second, the North Koreans are the ones who probably are being so stubborn about where the cease-fire line should be. It is not surprising about Formosa or the Chinese casualty lists.

Only three companies reported a loss, however, and most highly profitable first quarter of 1951 keeps earnings on level for the year so far.

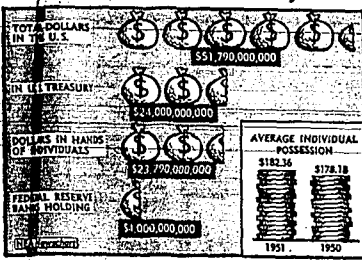

Jerome Postal Employee Retires After 40 Years in U. S. Service

JEROME, Nov. 1 — Wednesday marked the end of 39 years and seven months of service with the United States postoffice department for C. J. Carlson, Jerome. He is "retiring" after working on Jerome's main street since 1917.

Carlson was born in Leo Qui Parle, Minn., Oct. 6, 1881. He married another Minnesotan, Rachel Eakelsten, at Dawson, Minn., in 1903 and the next year they headed for Idaho. Carlson came to the north side tract to prove up on some land which "turned out not to be worth the trouble." But he liked the country and the climate and so stayed on, working as a laborer. In Minnesota he had farmed and operated a dray line with his father.

Carlson started his career with the postal department on April 1, 1913. He was appointed a rural carrier following civil service examinations taken at Gooding. The first week he carried mail on horseback, north of Jerome on rural route 1. After a week of horseback riding he obtained a buggy and finally two horses, using one every other day. Carlson was proud of his "trained" horses, horses which never failed to turn just right for each mail box and who started on their way as soon as they heard his alarm the mailbox door.

For winter travel he made himself a sleigh, used the top of his buggy to keep out the snow. He was appointed assistant postmaster July 1, 1917. He held this position until his retirement.

In all these years he has never been late to work and usually arrives from a half-hour to 15 minutes early. He has taken very little sick leave.

Outlook Dark For Improved Aircraft Soon

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (UP)—Prospects are dim that the air force will get for use in Korea new jet fighters definitely superior to the same-type Soviet-made MIG-15s, unless the war drags on for a long time.

Air force experts said today they knew of no "radically new" type fighter now in production which can outperform the P-51 or other American jets in their almost daily duels with MIGs in the high, thin air above the Yalu river boundary area. The P-51 and the MIG-15 are rated about equal.

There are in the U. S. better planes and engines in development or approaching the production stage — as there probably are in Russia — but they aren't ready now although they may have advanced to the experimental model stage several years ago.

The warplanes coming out of American factories now are aircraft designed and ordered before or in the early days of the Korean war. A recent news conference remark by Secretary of Defense Lovett points this up. He said he'll begin to get early in 1953 completed aircraft provided for by funds appropriated in 1950 (either before the outbreak of the Korean war or soon thereafter).

Because there is some flexibility in the design of a plane even when mass production lines have started, certain changes made in equipment or parts may produce some degree of improvement. Therefore, the present series of North American P-51s flying in Korea will not be as good as P-51 "E" series planes now starting to come off the line.
