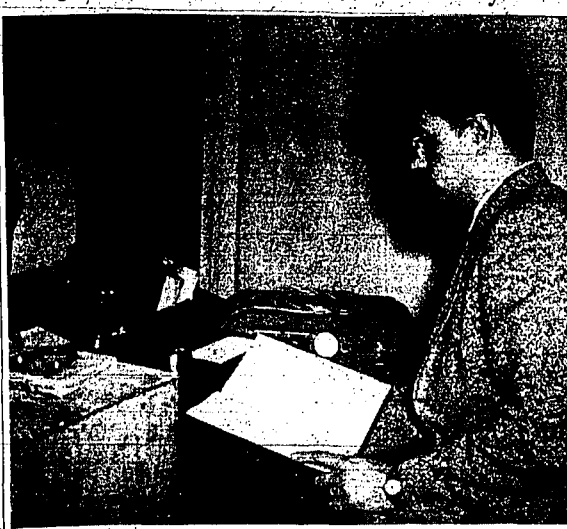

Jail Cell Becomes Science Laboratory



The women's cell at the city jail became a scientific laboratory for 48 hours Saturday and Sunday when Dr. John T. Pettit, Institute of geographics, UCLA, set up his equipment to study the periodic variation of gravity. Dr. Pettit termed the jail cell the "most unique place" he has used in his research so far. Scientist Measures Forces of Gravity From Unique Laboratory in City Jail

Strange activities were going on in the women's cell at the city jail Saturday and Sunday while Dr. John T. Pettit, Institute of geographics, UCLA, was using a gravimeter in a 48-hour study of the periodic variation of gravity. It's the first time the doctor has been in jail, but he isn't a prisoner. The jail cell was the best facility available Friday when he asked space to carry on his work.

Dr. Pettit states his equipment, constructed by the university especially for the project, measures gravity as close as one part in 10 billions. A reading is recorded every 15 seconds. The machine measures the movement of the earth. "So what? What will he do with the information after he gets out?" He replies the purpose of the research, is to study the structure of the earth. It is 4,000 miles to the center of the earth; yet the deepest hole drilled in its surface is about three miles deep.
