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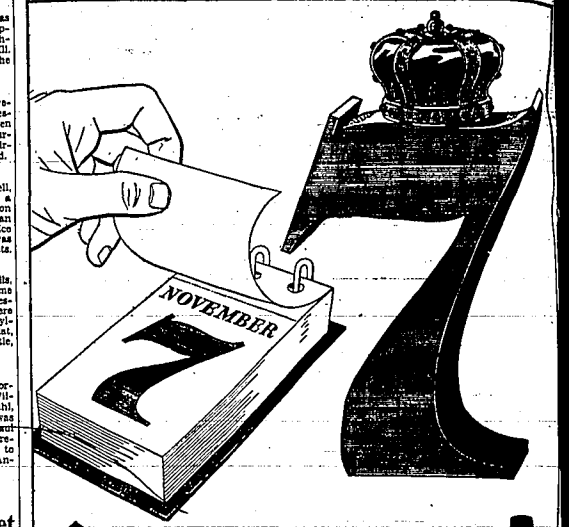
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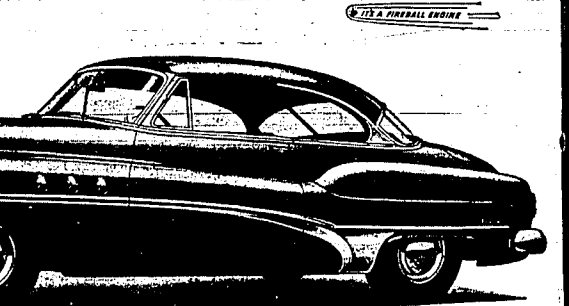

Ample Office Space Provided on Three Levels of New City Hall in Twin Falls

Of the three floors or levels at the new Twin Falls city hall, the upper level will house the most offices, most of which were jammed into the one room in the old structure. The floor also provides a small conference room and space for expansion.

The north and south sides of the upper level are almost entirely of glass. In the northwest corner, adjacent to the outside stairway, is a large unassigned space measuring 18 by 14 feet.

Offices are provided for both the city manager and his secretary. The city manager's office is considerably more space and his consultations with visitors, department heads and addressograph used by the water department. This machinery will be downstairs where it will not disturb other workers.

All offices are equipped with private clothes closets and built-in birch veneer plywood cabinets. The city manager's secretary, Mrs. Virginia Valley, will have a private office where she will not be disturbed by the public in general, only by persons wishing to see the city manager. At present she has a desk in the city clerk's office.

Adjacent to the city clerk's office is an office of similar size, 18 by 14 feet, for the director of public works, Vincent Young. This office was planned originally for the city attorney, Robert S. W. Ballou, but since that position was recently placed on a part-time basis, he must maintain his own office elsewhere.

At the northeast corner of the upper floor at the head of the east stairway to the intermediate level or ground floor will be the women's lounge and restroom, subdivided. Helping to beautify the modernistic structure will be a plantarium at the head of the east stairway.

An 18- by 14-foot space for the inspection office is located on the southeast corner and will be used by W. L. Hendricks, plumbing inspector, and Harry Smock, electrical inspector. There is provision for a third inspector if the city grows.

A 9- by 14-foot office is provided for Stuart Swan, planning and head of the inspection department. At present, Swan, Hendricks, Smock, Ernest Crater, parks and recreation superintendent; H. H. Ballenger, streets and water superintendent, and the switchboard are located in one room. Crater will have a 9- by 14-foot office and Ballenger will have a 12- by 14-foot office next to the conference room.

The 30- by 14-foot conference room at the southeast corner of the building is designed to accommodate 18 or 20 persons for meetings of department heads, department meetings and small public meetings. It is equipped with conference tables, Wendell Visits

Showdown in Korea Urged By Dworshak

TWIN FALLS, Nov. 7 (AP)—The United States should force an end to the Korean peninsula, Sen. Henry Dworshak, R. Ida., said here today.

There is no defense for the current policy which already has cost the lives of 100,000 men and women involved in a virtual stalemate, he added.

Explains Views Dworshak said, however, he doesn't go along completely with Gen. Douglas MacArthur's views, and doesn't mean by an "early showdown" that the United States should necessarily conquer all of Korea.

A truce, if negotiated on or about the present battle line, might accomplish a successful conclusion to the war, he said—depending on what the terms were.

The senator, who with Dworshak is spending a few days in north Idaho to sound out popular sentiment on the "Hells Canyon" dam, said he is hopeful an army engineer's report on the Mountain Sheep dam site, which would divert the Snake river, will be available to congress next January.

At the request of Gov. Len Jordan, I asked the public works committee of the House to send an army engineer corps bring in a full report on the Mountain-Sheep dam site, so it would be possible to discuss it in congress.

This site apparently offers many advantages for the Snake river, because a 7-mile diversion tunnel between the Salmon and the Snake rivers would permit water from the Salmon to be impounded in the reservoir at Mountain Sheep.

Engineering data shows the Salmon river has more than twice the runoff of the Snake, and none of the Salmon river water has been diverted for irrigation as is the case with the Snake.

Wherry also stressed the national defense aspect of the lawmakers' work. Eighty-five per cent of the past session's record of \$1,400,000,000 appropriated was connected with the preparation program, McFarland reported.

Wherry commented that "the congress may be called a 'preparations congress,' to be sure, but it is preparedness to bail out the administration's great mistakes and incompetencies."

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New Mexico Toll Highest Of All West

By The Associated Press Drive carefully on Western highways, especially those in New Mexico.

Despite unprecedented measures by traffic safety officials, New Mexico has the worst highway death record in nine western states surveyed by The Associated Press. The survey showed more people are being killed this year in five of the nine states. Concern of officials is growing.

327 Lives Lost New Mexico's bloody highways have claimed 327 lives so far this year—157 for every 25,000 population. That's an all-time state record and far worse on a population basis than any other state in the area.

The safest roads in the west are in Washington state where the rate is only 4.2 persons killed per 25,000 population. But the 418 total of fatalities is 19 more than the total for all of 1934. Arizona, Utah and California also have higher death rates than last year.

State Figures Here are the figures for the other states (this year to date, this time last year and current rate per 25,000 population): Arizona, 237, 265 and 109; Idaho, 150, 212 and 8; Montana, 165, 168 and 10; Utah, 168, 184 and 6.5; Colorado, 203, 222 and 8.7; Oregon, 220, — and 5.3.

Earlier this year, New Mexico authorities imposed a speed limit for the first time in the history of the state. The new limit is 40 miles an hour during the day, 50 at night, just last week, New Mexico Gov. Edwin Mechem ordered the state police to drop all other law enforcement work and concentrate on patrolling the highways.

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Private Autos Use Essential, Report Shows

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—The private automobile is essential to the national economy and must keep in use even during an all-out war, the defense transportation administration has reported. However, DTA warned that the nation's 40,000,000 private automobiles, possibly 14,000,000 of the road, leaving about 26,000,000 privately owned automobiles, perform an absolutely necessary function in no other form of transportation can provide. It estimated that this would be about 450,000 more than the country got along with in the World War II.

40,000,000 in Use
The nation's current registration shows some 40,000,000 such cars in use. DTA made its conclusions public in a booklet entitled "Automobile Importation in Defense War." It was prepared for DTA by the National Automobile Manufacturers Association, Washington, in an exhaustive survey into the use of private automobiles. The survey developed these facts: About 95 per cent of all private cars perform some necessary function at some time or other. Used by 2,000,000 some 22,000,000 people regularly

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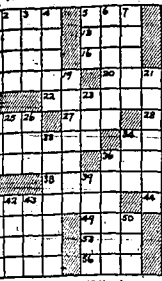

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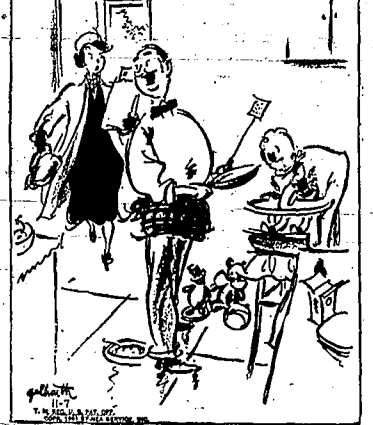

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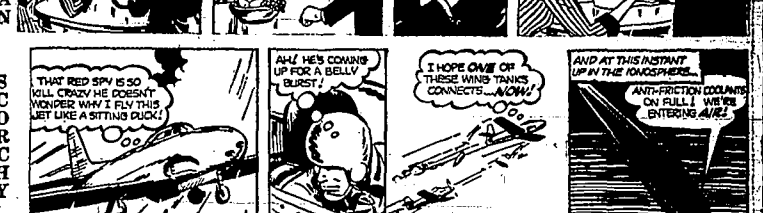
