Two Tornadoes 24 Years Ago Lead to Holland Man's Visit

As an indirect result of two tornadoes 24 years ago and some 6,000 miles apart, J. P. Drost, burgemeester of Borculo, Holland, was a visitor in Twin Falls Thursday evening, when he was a guest at the Blue Lakes Country club, and Friday morning, when he was taken on a tour of points of interest by R. J. Schwendman, chairman of the board of city commissioners.
It was in 1925 that Borculo was struck by a tornado. The devastation of the town, which now has a population of 6,700, was still fresh in the memories of Borculo residents when a tornado hit Warren, Ark., Jan. 3, 1949.
Residents of the Dutch town immediately sent a message of sympathy, began a relief fund raising campaign and sent 40 chairs plus tables and chests which now are in use at the Warren YMCA.
The sent was a chandelier with a parchment shade. Drost chamber-of-commercialized enough to say Borculo has Holland's only genuine parchment industry, emphasized it is not paper parchment. The town has an agricultural economy and exports much wheat.
Drost was invited to visit Warren and see how the Borculo gifts were being used. He extended his visit to include Florida, Twin Falls, Michigan and parts of Canada, where he is meeting former residents of the Netherlands.
In Twin Falls, Burgemeester Drost visited Mr. and Mrs. J. Hill. Mrs. Hill's mother, Mrs. D. Schepper, was born near Borculo and returned to visit there during the town's cookie sales and theater parties held to raise funds for tornado-stricken Warren.
Drost explained a burgemeester is appointed for six years by the queen and usually is reappointed. It is a full time job. He serves as president of an elected council and an executive board of councilmen and aldermen they elect.

the new city hall in which the visitor was extremely interested as a municipal administrator, the new hospital, and the business, industrial and residential sections of the city. Drost said he was particularly impressed by the agricultural industries and by the city's public golf links. He said golf courses are only for the most wealthy residents in his country. Space in the United States also impressed the visitor—his nation has about one-fourth as much acre as Arkansas.

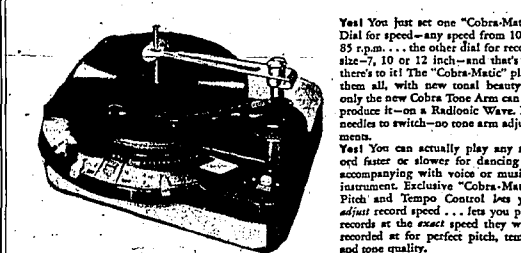

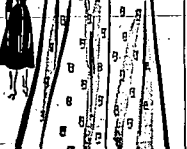

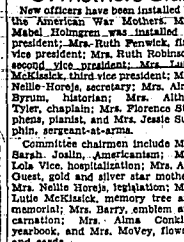

TWIN FALLS AWAITS CHARGES OF BOISE IN CRUCIAL CONTEST

Big Six Title at Stake in Monday Clash of Rivals

All chips will be down and the fur may be flying here Monday afternoon when the fired-up Twin Falls Bruins take on the Boise Braves in what may prove to be the Big Six conference game of the year. The 1951 conference title will be decided in the clash.

Both squads took a new look at title possibilities when the Nampa Bulldogs defeated the Caldwell Cougars 15-6. The defeat forced Caldwell completely out of the title race and opened the way to three possible outcomes for coveted conference honors.

Kick-off for the holiday contest will be at 2 p.m. Monday at Lincoln field. A crowd of 4,500 is expected.

It was Caldwell who threw the conference into a tizzy two weeks ago by upsetting previously undefeated Twin Falls 14-13.

A Twin Falls victory Monday will give the Bruins undisputed claim to the Big Six championship.

However, if Boise should win and then defeat Nampa in a Thanksgiving day game, the Bruins would be the crown. If Boise should beat Twin Falls Monday and then lose to Nampa, a three-way tie between Twin Falls, Boise and Nampa would be the final outcome.

Coach Harold Brown reports an Saturday line-up ready to "lay it on the line" against the Braves. Twin Falls has two weeks to prepare for the contest and the Bruins have not been idle.

The Bruins' attack was hurt badly by the loss of Eddie Allison, brilliant fullback and leading point-maker in conference. Allison returned a broken shoulder in the loss to Caldwell in a head-on collision with Caldwell's Ed Lodge. Lodge received five broken ribs and did not see action Friday against Nampa.

Brown has moved Dennis Walker, 200-pounder, up from the junior varsity and has been preparing Dick Flynn, reserve halfback, for the fullback duties.

Line Must Improve

The line has been shown extreme importance on the work of Twin Falls defensive line. The Bruins with scoring punch out must play stronger defensive ball than in the past three games. Brown and Allison have placed emphasis on the defensive line in pre-game practices.

Probable starting lineup will see Bud Cross and Leo Bartlett, end; Keith Jensen and Jim Whitesides, tackle; Larry Church and Ed Reed, guards; Clark Whitehead, center; Ralph Cohan, quarterback; Dick Flynn, fullback; Dick Flynn or Dennis Walker, fullback.

Both Boise and Twin Falls are expected to uncover new plays for the contest as both teams have been heavily scouted all season. Both use straight "T" formation attacks. Boise uses many flankers in its "Z" while Twin Falls "T" is similar to the power "T" employed this year by the University of California.

Twin Falls declined Boise's earlier engagement in Boise, but both coaches and players at Boise have optimistically expressed confidence that history will not repeat.

The game could prove to be the last conference football game for Twin Falls. The Bruins declined to schedule Boise Valley schools following a special meeting in October when differences in opinion arose. Unless circumstances change, it could mean Twin Falls will not draw from the conference for next season.

Officials named to work the important clash are Rudy Ashenbrenner, Twin Falls, referee; Howard Matthews, Hoyburn, umpire; and Paul Taylor, Jerome, head linesman.

Clemency for 2 Is Sought By Ministers

In his statement to the judge, Gresson said Mahler is married and has a minor child. He said his client did not know the legal consequences of his act or the age of the girl. The complaint against the two young men was signed by the mother of a 17-year-old girl. This act was charged as having been committed Tuesday at Heyburn.

The Rev. Carl G. Gresson, pastor of the Pentecostal church, Rupert, appeared as a character witness for Mahler and asked for clemency for both Mahler and Kemner. He said if parole were offered to Mahler he would assume responsibility for the young man.

Clemency Sought

Gresson also claimed Kemner did not know the legal consequences of his act nor that the girl was only 17 years old.

The Rev. Philip Daniels, pastor of the Nazarene church, appeared as a character witness for Kemner and asked for clemency for the defendant even though Kemner previously had been sentenced for driving and theft charges. He also asked that the defendant be paroled into his custody.
