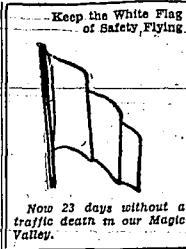

### If It Wasn't for Gathering Eggs Chickens Would Be Soft Touch

**BURLEY, Nov. 14—Horticulturalists** in the chicken coop is not what it used to be, Olen L. Bodily, Casola county extension agent, said. Not only are the daily chores reduced to a shadow of their former labor but the major job of house-cleaning needs to be done only once a year.  
 That is one of the advantages of a modern laying house, Bodily said. Idaho farmers who have tried the building recommended by the University of Idaho have found greater efficiency, healthier birds and less work, he added.  
 Trying up in the pullet parlor is a soft touch, he intimated, because of sweeping changes in building saving gadgets. The roosts, for example, are not tucked away under an overhang so a man must break his back every time he goes out the residue. The dropping pits are out in the open, sometimes right in the middle of the room. Drinking fountains are over the dropping pits and very little water is spilled because the devices are automatic. What water is dribbled, falls where it can do no harm to sanitation.  
 And in the winter, Bodily says, the poultryman need not struggle with windows, shoving them up and down day and night with changes in the weather. Windows are closed for a cold snap and automatic fans ventilate the house.

Miss Garbo was smarter than a buggy whip when she quit the movies. Moviegoers are much more critical now, and she would draw practically nothing but laughs if I looked back at reviews of this old movie and read where critics considered her a woman of great depth, an actress whose spiritual qualities fairly leaped from the screen, and whose love would make a trout jump from the Colorado river to the Mississippi river.

She was straight hair to me. In her love scenes she panted like a resistor after bringing a duck ashore, or like a freshman on his first date.

She blinked her eyes 10 times as often as the average traffic light, and every once in a while would lift up that size 11 foot as if to show that with her female frailty there was a rugged quality about her.

I understand now her motto, "I want to be alone." She picked up those easy dollars in Hollywood, and is smart enough not to come back and buck actresses whose shoes she can't carry, even if they are half as large as hers.

I understand that Hollywood studios are bidding for her services, and offering her fantastic sums to make a picture. Being a thrifty Swede, she may fall for the dough and make the picture. But, it had better be a comedy because she is plumb, plain funny as an actress.

I go to the museum of modern art every so often just to make a quiet study of this pseudo-intellectual who clutter the place. There you will find the men and women who think it's smart not to comb their hair, wash their necks, or shine their shoes, because to do such civilized things would cost them time from culture.

One look at them and you know they wouldn't consider reading "The London Times" when they can get the Upper North Dakota Quarterly Review. They do not think you could enjoy a Van Gogh while wearing clean socks or lipstick. They are the kind of people who use Ohtani bottles for candle holders.

For some reason they all seem to have bad eyes and wear horn rimmed glasses, find flaws in the service, then catch the subway home.

I never know whether to get mad at them, or to be sorry for them. They are such posers that it is impossible for them simply to say, "I don't like you." But I can't help feeling sorry for them because the girls look so sad, and the men have such weak little faces and weak little beards, they are living in a dream world that will never come true.

The only ones who bother me more than these people are college freshmen in white buckskin shoes and their little dates who giggle at every statue.

I'm getting old, Father William. I mean Father Henry.

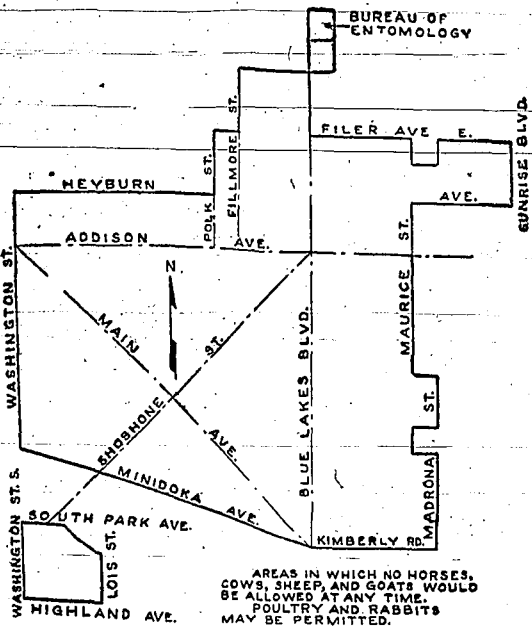

# College Officials Take Action to Curb Grid Policy

Dr. John A. Hannah, Michigan State college, is chairman of the committee of college presidents. Other members are the Rev. Father J. Cavanaugh, Notre Dame; A. Whitney Griswold, Yale; Raymond B. Allen, the University of Washington; R. C. Gustavson, Nebraska; John S. Mills, Western Reserve; E. M. J. Ryan, Loyola University; Albert J. J. Pyler, Furman; Albert J. J. Pyler, Furman; Albert J. J. Churchill is unlikely to receive the same kind of bad news when he and Mr. Truman sit down for their 1935 conference. But he will bring plenty of other bad news with him.

Truman is already in serious financial difficulties just at a time when her power and authority is being stiffly challenged in many parts of the world.

She is fighting a small-scale war in Malaya, she has been kicked out of her big oil refinery in Iran, she is holding grimly on to the Suez canal zone. At home she is going broke fast trying to finance a rearmament program and at the same time keep up with the expenses incurred by her social welfare program.

Churchill doubtless will review all these difficulties, but he probably will go much further. He will come up with suggestions for a course of action. Churchill never has been one to temporize with a crisis. He meets them head on.

Three Choices

Britain at the moment has three choices:

1. Reduce her armament program and save money.
2. Reduce the cost of her social welfare program.
3. Accept vast sums of dollars from the United States in an attempt to keep both No. 1 and No. 2 going.

There is reason to believe Churchill will accept No. 3 only as a last resort. He likes to have Britain stand on her own feet and be an equal partner with the United States in either war or peace. If he cuts too deeply into the nation's social welfare program, he runs the risk of alienating the voters who have just put him in office.

### New Citizens
