# Community Safety Units Proposed; Valley Meeting Urges Limits for Speed

Formation of safety councils in each Magic Valley town and community, with frequent meetings of their secretaries to exchange experiences and problems, was a highlight of recommendations made Wednesday by spokesmen for five groups which held individual caucuses to determine how they best can meet traffic safety difficulties. Among other significant recommendations at the second annual Magic Valley traffic safety conference were: 1. Establishment of a blanket maximum speed limit of 60 miles per hour throughout Idaho and posting of zones for lower speeds where 60 miles per hour is dangerous.

## 38th Auto-Death of Year Adds Determination to Safety Parley

Magic Valley's 38th traffic fatality Wednesday—a record high at this time any year—added grim determination to the wealth of information taken home by nearly 175 persons attending the second annual Magic Valley traffic safety conference Wednesday afternoon. Gaily photographs, maps and graphs brought by state police added a further grim note to the conference. They were set up in the entrance to the Radio Rodeo where the conference was held.

A number of women, representing various groups, attended the conference in an indication of the conference's wide appeal. ### Hearing Ends For Railroad Wool Service

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 15 (AP)—A two-day hearing on application of nearly 20 railroads to discontinue certain services in shipment of western wool ended yesterday.

Interstate Commerce Commission Examiner Myron Winters took the evidence under review and said a commission ruling would be announced later in Washington, D. C.

Representatives of railroads operating in Utah, Nevada, Colorado, Idaho, Wyoming and California asked the ICC for permission to discontinue the practice of furnishing checkers to supervise marking, weighing and loading of wool. The roads handled a sizeable volume of wool in 1950, the first nine months of this year.

### Sheepmen Oppose

Sheepmen and wool marketing officials oppose the application. They claim it would be "uneconomical to all interested parties."

J. E. Melia, Omaha, and Otis J. Gibson, San Francisco, attorneys for the railroads, introduced witnesses who testified that increasing costs have made the service "seem not a part of the transportation business—burdensome." Witnesses said the cost of the railroad thus far in 1951 was \$17,000.

### Introduces Witnesses

Charles H. Haines, Ariz., manager of the National Wool Growers association, introduced witnesses opposing the application. James A. Hooper, Salt Lake City, manager of the Utah Wool Marketing association, called the services furnished by the railroads as vital.

The checker acts as a vital man between the producer of wool and the consumer. Each party considers the railroad representative as impartial and important in securing proper weights," he added.

### Former Employee Sues City on Pay

A civil suit for \$400 was filed in probate court Wednesday by A. T. Flynn against the city of Twin Falls, his former employer, for overtime pay and the use of his pickup truck.

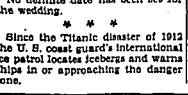

# Speaker Urges "Middle Class" to End March of Socialism in This Country

(From Last Col.)  
 "The economic and political situation," according to Dr. Alexander, "is a case of distraction. It affects the purpose of most," she said.  
 However, she said it is "not too late, but very late, to save capitalism—democracy and that a 'third party' of the middle class of some 'qualitative ability to the Communist party, could do it."  
 "Marx feared the middle class would awake to put the locomotive of capitalism in reverse," the speaker reminded.  
 Dr. Alexander said she had "hoped the second World War would rid America of the 'middle class' of the 'middle class' trend of the 'times' is that we don't want to go down with the times," she said.  
 "Managed money and controlled prices that we have today are characteristic of the Soviet Union, Nazi Germany and Italy under Mussolini, according to the speaker. She explained that the people from those countries but absorbed in our government institutions many of their ideas."  
 Two Types of States  
 "Probing deeper into the problems, she analyzed attitudes toward the state. She listed two types of states, the organic and the atomic. The former is similar to the physical organism of the body where no part functions independently. The atomic theory of a state is that individuals act independently with the state being the sum of the parts.  
 She termed the organic state the competitor of the capitalist-democracy type society.  
 "It makes no difference who owns the tools of production, provided they are in private hands and production is large and distributed and consumed by all the people," she said, attacking the theory of state ownership of tools under the organic system.  
 State Ownership  
 She pointed out that government control and taxes in this country almost amount to state ownership. "A state is nothing more or less than a group of men in power. She called them men who do not produce, who do not create but parasites who live off the productive efforts of citizens and taxpayers."  
 "We have to have a government," she explained, "because there are certain things the government can do for the people that they cannot do themselves. But government is legitimate only as long as it is concerned with the state and their welfare. When it assumes the functions of feeding and production and other things, it destroys the state and changes in its nature, she said.  
 Not Productive  
 "The state produces nothing in any case... and everything it does it must first take away from someone else," she charged. "It concentrates on special groups, the return of votes at the expense of others," she continued.  
 "And," she said, "the state can

operate at a loss by subsidizing the loss with taxes."  
 "What's cheap about TV? Power? Capital? Pointing out that 'the capitalists' with an accounting system, no one can understand and tax. Answering another self-proclaimed question regarding comparative efficiency of government and private operation, she said government production runs by 'bureaucrats who may or may not know anything about the business.'"  
 Opening a discussion on profit she contended that it is not anti-social and is the only incentive to accumulate risk capital which in turn is the only way to get tools of production.  
 According to Dr. Alexander, it takes approximately \$7,000 to employ one worker in industry and about \$300 to employ one in agriculture. No one will deny themselves to provide the money.  
 The only alternative to reward is punishment and it also is the only other way to get maximum production since the incentive or reward, no one will deny themselves to provide the money.  
 Source of Employment  
 She attacked a theory that property and its accumulation are evils by pointing out that they can be a source of employment.  
 "We have already lost economic freedom. You cannot decide what you will spend or retain—only what is left after taxes," the speaker said. "When the state takes that right, he loses his incentive."  
 As an example she cited the cases of people who desired to work to improve their position because it would throw them into a higher tax bracket. This situation does not maximize production, according to Dr. Alexander.  
 The man used to have the right to any house he could afford. Now he has the right to any house his income will buy through the intervention of the government," she said.  
 "Faceless Men"  
 "Turning to the effect of socialism on individuals she said our standard education system is producing a "faceless man." "It is the individual who is the creator, not society. The relationship between an individual and his God is an individual and is not on a collective basis."  
 "When a man loses that right, he loses his incentive."  
 "Production is the first thing in an economy. The distribution of the product which gives the greatest production gives the greatest distribution."  
 "Socialism produces scarcity," she stated, pointing to the experiment in Great Britain. "We subsidized it and it still failed. There is no incentive to accumulate—no reward. It just doesn't produce."  
 Falls Everyone Down  
 "Communism provides an equality of misery," she explained. "The neighbor is just as poor. Making the streets cleaner, up the weak and make them strong."  
 "The only economy that can produce the maximum is capitalism." Our is the only country that can contribute to the welfare of the world she reminded.  
 "America is not strong because of its natural resources and manpower," she explained. "India and Burma have more of both but they lack the spirit and the indifference to risk, she said.

Only One Choice  
 Taking up the socialist argument that welfare is a prime concern of the state, she asked, "voluntarily, there is no point in penalizing production, she said. "Capitalism penalizes with its own success. If you cannot have both, that is fascism."  
 Among the groups that are advancing the cause of socialism in this country, according to the speaker, are organized labor (including the majority of the rank and file),  
 certain farm groups, city machine bosses, all who want to dip their hands in the tax bucket and pocket-house plinks. The latter she described as the most despicable for living on untaxed riches while advocating socialism."  
 Laashes Politicians  
 "Minority groups are pointing out the danger of socialism," she said. "Also responsible are politicians who have overturned our franchise."  
 "Politicians today employ people to work for them in order to vote for them (politicians)," she said. "The party's vote is free who is in fear of losing his job."  
 In conclusion the economist advised three means of stopping the socialist trend.  
 Urges Voter Care  
 She said voters must be careful and sure about precinct committees and about local elections. In these places you can know personally the character of the politicians and can build a strong political base, she pointed out.  
 Next, she advised the middle class to organize, warning that invasion from within is more dangerous than from without.  
 Finally she asked members of the audience to protect the many calm-

### Grand Jurors End Inquiries For Blackfoot

BLACKFOOT, Nov. 15 (AP)—The Blingham county grand jury has been dismissed after presenting a 10-page report giving the office of the Blingham county prosecutor a clean bill and clearing up misunderstandings about the purchase of school property.

The findings were presented to Judge Preston Tucker. He ordered the grand jury in June after a district jury brought in an innocent verdict in the case of the late R. A. Craig, gravel contractor.

Officials charged the indictments returned by the grand jury included those against Craig, Kenneth Taylor, Blackfoot city councilman; A. Davis, Blackfoot street commissioner; and Frank Smith, former mayor.

Smith was indicted on a perjury count and the others were all indicted on several counts involving perjury and for alleged falsification of claims. All were bound to the district court scheduled to open today in Blackfoot.

The other indictments were against prisoners arrested in the city or county and held in jail since the grand jury probe opened.

BURLEY, Nov. 15—Mrs. Kenneth Henderson, Burley, was selected on Tuesday as the new probation officer for Cassia county.

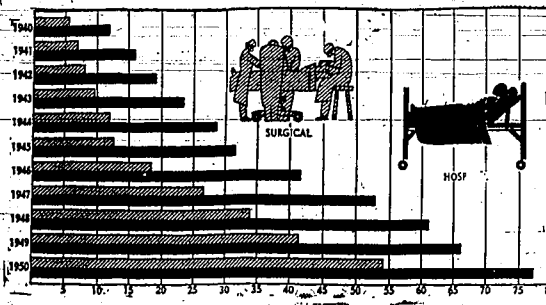
After considerable discussion by the county commissioners, the appointment of a probation officer for the county was left up to a committee.

### ed Doctor pended for g Support

Nov. 15 (AP)—Dr. Arthur, vice president of the American Medical Association, declared today his investigation of cancer treatment despite opposition by the Chicago society for "unethical practice" in "promoting" the subject.

Dr. Arthur's statement said, "Dr. [Name] was found guilty of unethical practice for three months by the Medical Society for the promotion of cancer treatment in promoting the use of 'krebiozen,' in the treatment of cancer."

Dr. Arthur said the suspension was upon "after several studies by its cancer committee and the fact that it was regrettable that it would associate himself with a man whose physical and mental qualities were kept a secret by a specific violation of medical ethics," the statement said.

Dr. Arthur said he had no personal or financial interest in the case, but he believed more than 100,000 people were misled by the interpretation and use of the word "krebiozen."

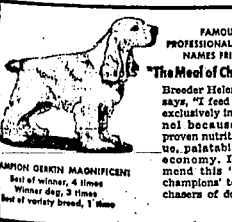
