LABOR'S POSE THREATS

Organized labor needs to toss away its well-thumbed dictionary and get a new one. The language its leaders use is overloaded with epithet and vituperation; it engenders nothing but sympathy for those against whom it is directed.

The CIO, convening in New York, took some standard labor pot-shots at its political opposition. Philip Murray, CIO president, struck at the congressional coalition of Republicans and Democrats as "reactionary, backward, extraordinary and plenipotentiary for a host of venal special interests."

Later on he generously lumped all opponents of labor's wishes as "reactionaries."

"Reactionary" of course is one of the most abused words we have. In labor's lexicon, there is no such thing as sincere conservatism, or even a liberalism which happens to disagree with labor on specific issues.

Labor subscribes to the democratic system, which is founded on the theory that men must be able to choose among alternatives. Yet in practice it talks as if only one viewpoint—their own—has any right to expression.

Their slogan is that the public remarks that labor would like to fill congress with men who parrot its views.

Union officials punch away, too, at the "special interest" theme. They appear to forget that labor is itself a special interest. A sound democratic government is not a government designed particularly for the benefit of the farmer, the worker, the businessman or any other single segment of society. It must be designed for all.

The art of governing lies in a democratic society is the art of balancing and reconciling all the various special interests which clamor for attention. American labor leaders regard any effort to achieve this balance as an attempt to destroy their movement.

It is certainly true that when the farmer or the businessman or somebody else is stepping out of line and gaining too much advantage from government. Our history indicates that labor is often no less glibly on their side, and that the government is often on their side.

Labor's criticisms of government or of other elements in society would be taken much more seriously if its leaders dropped their absurd insistence that, they themselves are above criticism. The day that one of them stands up and admits labor's imperfections will be a joyous occasion portending well for the mental health of the nation.

Up to now we have had precious little sign that these men have any capacity for learning from experience. Rebuffs in congress and at the polls give them no instruction. Their conventions rumble with the same old raffle talk. All who are not within labor's ample are sinners. Labor's cause is just and the followers have a special duty.

The time is right for a reformation in labor as in every segment of our national life. Can the present leaders ever profit from the lessons of reality? Or must we wait for the coming-of-a wholly new leadership?

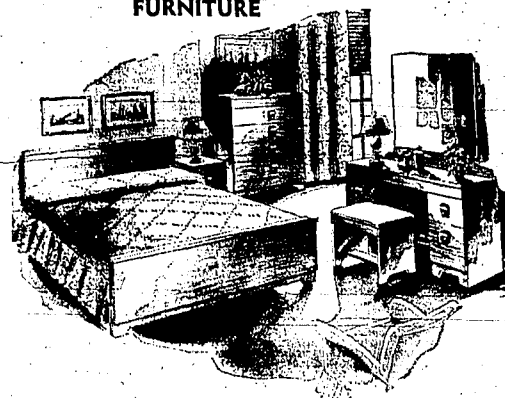

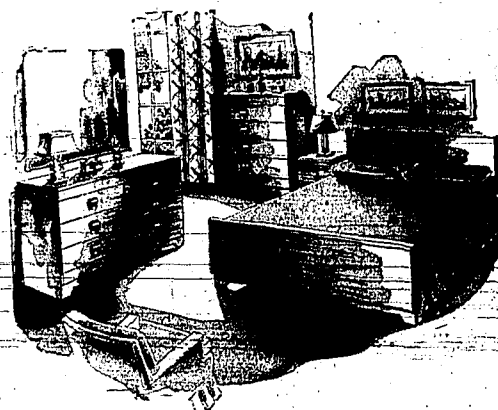

Prices Index Revise Eyed For January

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—The government is planning to take a long stride toward recognizing that a new economic era was touched off by World War II.

The experts who get up the monthly wholesale index—which tells whether prices have gone up or down—will stop using 1926 as their base period and use 1942 instead. Those beyond days of the 20s are considered old hat now, statistically speaking.

Beginning in January, the bureau of labor statistics will report average wholesale prices of the 1942-43 period as 100. Up to now, the bureau has considered 1926 prices to have been a good measuring point, and used those prices as 100.

They don't say 1926 was necessarily a normal year, or that 1942-43 was normal. Those are dates to make a comparison with, that's all.

Current prices are fitted to the prices prevailing in the base period. If they are the same, the index remains at 100. If they're 10 percent higher, the current index goes up to 110. If they're 10 percent lower, the index drops to 90.

Actually, fitted to the 1926 prices, the current wholesale index has been away up—177.2 per cent of the average 1926 price, the index stands at 177.2.

That's interesting but the budget bureau thinks it would be more helpful to have a comparison with a postwar period. That's the reason for the change.

U.S. Jet Pilots Use Wing Tips to Bring Unconscious Flier Home

TOKYO, Nov. 14 (AP)—The air force today told an almost unbelievable story—a drama of two Thunderbolt pilots who used their own wing tips to help lead an unconscious flier back to safety.

"It can be done," said the far east air force public information officer, himself a pilot of veteran combat experience. "But it takes a delicate touch. When wing tips get together it usually is bad news."

But it was good news for Capt. John L. Paladino, North Little Rock, who gave thanks for the "colossal touch" of two buddies—Capt. Jack W. Miller, Dayton, O., and Lieut. Wood H. MacArthur, Little Rock, Ark.

The three Thunderbolt pilots of the 35th fighter-bomber wing were

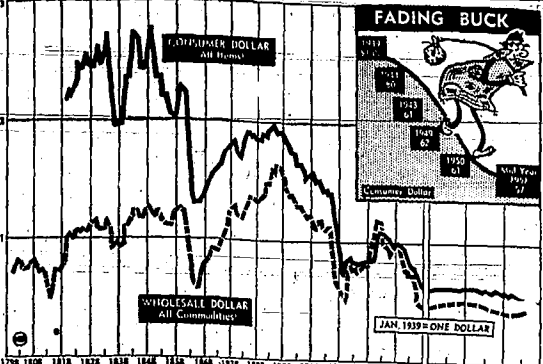

Senator Says Baby Decree Violated Law

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 19 (AP)—Senator Watkins, R. Utah, declared it was apparent to him that regulations had been violated in transportation of the body of an Indian baby from Utah to New Mexico last week. Watkins conferred with Salt Lake City police and Dr. James Z. Davis, city health commissioner.

The senator said the violation was prompted by sympathy for the mother of the Navaho baby rather than by disregard for her feelings.

The baby died on a bus en route from Burley, Idaho, to Gallup, N. M. It had become ill while its parents worked in the sugar beet fields of southern Idaho. The parents, according to hospital spokesmen in Burley, took the child from the hospital despite warnings that the youngster still was ill.

The child died on the bus near Salt Lake City. When the bus stopped here, police and the city physician, Dr. Adolph Nielsen, were called. Dr. Nielsen attributed death to pneumonia. The story here becomes clouded.

Mary Chase, mother of the baby, said Salt Lake City officials were cautious in their attitude and forced her to keep the body of her daughter on the bus the remainder of the trip.

Officials here deny this. They claim the parents insisted that they be allowed to keep the child with them.
