## 10-Year-Old Event Is Marked As U. S. Observes Thanksgiving

The 10th anniversary of the U. S. general election was observed today in a special ceremony at the Idaho State Capitol building in Boise. The occasion was marked by the reading of a proclamation by Governor B. M. French, which recalled the historic event of 1904. The ceremony was held in the presence of members of the Idaho Historical Society and other dignitaries. The proclamation highlighted the significance of the 1904 election, which resulted in the establishment of Idaho as a state. The event was a poignant reminder of the state's long history and the sacrifices made by its citizens.

## Jan. 3 Confab Of Churchill, Truman Eyed

Washington, Nov. 22 (AP)—Three Democratic senators reacted with no enthusiasm today to reports that the state department may congress next year for more foreign aid funds for France, Britain and perhaps other countries. The senators expressed concern over the potential impact of such aid on the domestic economy and the balance of payments. They also questioned the effectiveness of such aid in addressing the needs of the recipient countries. The reports of a possible meeting between Churchill and Truman in January 1951 were also mentioned in the discussion.

## Files Refused In Tax Probe

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22 (AP)—The Internal Revenue Service today refused to file tax returns for 12 taxpayers who had filed them with the department in its refusal to turn over its tax division case files to house investigators. The taxpayers argued that the refusal was an attempt to circumvent the law and that they had a right to their files. The IRS officials stated that the files contained sensitive information and that their release would be detrimental to the national security. The taxpayers are planning to appeal the decision.

## Egypt Wants Ban Now on Atomic Arms

PARIS, Nov. 22 (AP)—Egypt called today for immediate prohibition of the atomic bomb as the first step toward disarmament. The Egyptian government argued that the atomic bomb was a threat to world peace and that it should be banned immediately. Egypt also called for a ban on the production and stockpiling of atomic weapons. The United States and other major powers have been reluctant to agree to such a ban, arguing that it would be difficult to enforce and that it would put them at a disadvantage. The Egyptian position is supported by many other nations, particularly in the Middle East and Latin America.

MOSCOW, Nov. 22 (AP)—The Soviet government officially protested yesterday that the United States is financing the underground movement against the USSR. The Soviet government argued that the United States was providing financial and logistical support to the underground movement, which was engaged in activities that were detrimental to the Soviet Union. The Soviet government also accused the United States of using the underground movement as a tool for espionage and sabotage. ## \$50 Punchboard Tax Required of All Taking Bets

BOISE, Nov. 22 (AP)—Curtis E. Wright, collector of internal revenue, has notified Idaho's 500 punchboard operators that they must pay a new \$50-a-year occupational tax to be paid for all employees who accept wagers. The tax is to be paid by the operators, not the employees. Wright argued that the tax was necessary to fund the state's education system and other public services. The operators argued that the tax was excessive and that it would place a heavy burden on them. The tax is expected to take effect in January 1951.

## Protest by Soviet Dismissed by U. S.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22 (AP)—Government officials here dismissed a Soviet protest about the FRODOX (Foreign Relations Office) agreement in Moscow yesterday. The new protest was headed by U. S. Charge d'Affaires Stuart C. Clegg. The Soviet government argued that the agreement was a violation of international law and that it was detrimental to the Soviet Union. The United States government argued that the agreement was a necessary step towards resolving the Korean conflict and that it was in the best interests of both sides. The protest was dismissed by the State Department, which stated that the agreement was a legitimate and lawful arrangement.

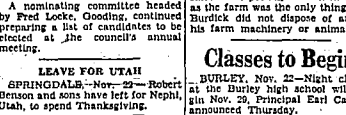

He has been active in state and national affairs of the Elks for 25 years and is a leader in providing organized aid for physically handicapped children. Until his retirement two years ago, he was managing editor of Civil, a nationally circulated weekly newspaper, on which he started as a copy boy. ### Results of Mass Chest X-Ray Program Are Noted in Idaho

During the first nine months of operation, 57,570 free chest X-rays were taken by Idaho's mobile chest X-ray unit, Frances Goodwin, Boise, executive director of the Idaho Tuberculosis association, announced Thursday. The unit will remain in Twin Falls through Dec. 2.

Of the 57,570 checks, 803 were determined to have suspicious signs of tuberculosis. 396 suspicious signs of cardiac abnormalities and 402 suspicious signs of miscellaneous diseases such as tumors, cancer of the lung, silicosis, and others.

By Oct. 19, 47 cases of tuberculosis, previously unknown, had been found, of which 29 were active, infectious cases, and 18 were inactive, Miss Goodwin pointed out.

She added this represents only a portion of the total number of films taken as it requires time for the physician to make a definite diagnosis of tuberculosis. She emphasized the fact that this is only a screening process and only your physician can make a definite diagnosis.

"There is an intense interest in Idaho in the mobile chest X-ray program," Miss Goodwin said. "In many communities we have taken X-rays of 100 per cent of the estimated population. This interest is further indicated by the fact that only 18 persons have not yet reported for follow-up X-ray films and diagnosis.

"We believe this interest is the result of the intensive educational program carried on through the years by the Idaho Tuberculosis association and its local affiliates, a program that has been made possible by the sale of Christmas seals.

"The mobile chest X-ray unit, purchased with Christmas seal funds, already has proved itself a valuable health aid in Idaho. The program is jointly sponsored by the Idaho Tuberculosis association and the Idaho department of public health."

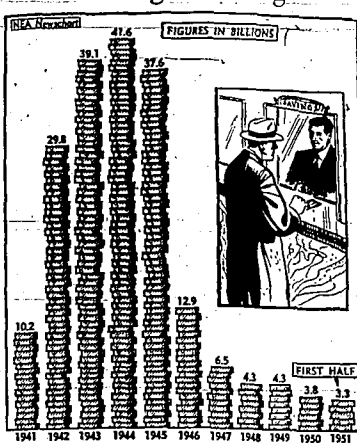

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22 (AP)—American servicemen from Korea to Berlin are feasting on turkey today. The defense department said the army quartermaster corps, which buys perishable foods for all the services, began shipping turkeys overseas last May so the armed forces everywhere will have traditional turkey dinners on Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's days.

The quartermaster corps contracted for a total of 15,000,000 pounds of turkeys. The first shipments went to remote Arctic posts in Newfoundland, which can be supplied by ship only during July and August.

The far east command got 200,000 pounds of turkeys by Nov. 1, with another 800,000 pounds on the way. 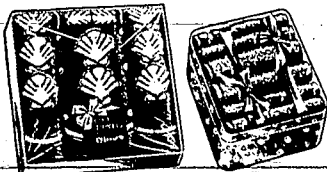

Blame the vagaries of the Oregon calendar, which, this year, blames your governor or state legislature.

Follows Law But lay off the President. In proclaiming Nov. 22 as Thanksgiving day, he just did what the law required him to do.

By joint resolution, the house and senate ruled in December 1941, that the fourth Thursday of November should be proclaimed each year as Thanksgiving.

In five-Thursday November, like this one, the holiday came earlier than it would in a four-Thursday month.

Calendar's Fault But not over the fault is at blame for a five-Thursday November. That's the calendar's fault.

That's the calendar's fault. Over a long period, five-Thursday November will occur on the average once every three or four years.

In any case, there is a law that says the states have to follow the lead of congress and designate the fourth Thursday as Thanksgiving day.

There is no such thing, legally speaking, as a national holiday. Congress and the President can set holidays for the District of Columbia and for federal employees elsewhere.

But they don't set the states into the state holidays are designated either by legislative enactment or by executive decree.
